 - (2) From 28% to a maximum of 30% of the principal amount collected for delinquent accounts that are more than one year from their past due date, with payment made upon successful collection and remittance of funds by Collection Bureau of America, with no fiscal impact to the City as the fee is paid directly by the customer; and
- (d) Exercise up to two additional one-year options to extend the term of the Agreement ending on or about June 30, 2028, subject to the appropriation of funds.
