Please see the following comments regarding **Item 8.5** from the Silicon Valley Council of Nonprofits (SVCN), an alliance of community-based organizations working to support thriving and equitable communities in Santa Clara County.

The Silicon Valley Council of Nonprofits (SVCN) respectfully expresses concern about the proposed change to the City of San José's General Plan update process, which would replace a broad-based, cross-sector task force with the smaller, less representative Planning Commission. While we acknowledge the memorandum from Councilmembers Mayor Mahan, Vice Mayor Foley, Councilmember Campos, Councilmember Cohen, and Councilmember Casey recommending enhanced community outreach to offset this shift, SVCN emphasizes that meaningful public engagement must go beyond informing residents of public hearings. Consistent with our longstanding policy priority advocating for deep, inclusive community engagement by local governments, we urge the City to proactively involve its existing bench of engagement specialists—including nonprofit organizations and professional consultants—in designing and facilitating a robust outreach process. This should include interactive methods such as focus groups, surveys, and community town halls to ensure that diverse voices across San José are authentically heard and reflected in the General Plan update. We caution against setting a precedent that reduces community representation in shaping the city's future.

Dear Mayor Mahan and Councilmembers,

The undersigned organizations support staff's recommendations for both the scope of the Four-Year Review, and for the Planning Commission to be designated as the Four-Year Review Task Force for the third Review Cycle.

In particular, we support excluding areas with immitigable Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) impacts from any potential new growth areas. The city's VMT maps clearly illustrate the negative environmental impacts that would result from increasing growth in the outlying areas of the city, such as Coyote Valley, Alviso, and the Evergreen and Almaden Valley neighborhoods. Any potential expanded growth areas must be in San Jose's infill areas, close to existing transit and other amenities, in order to avoid significant increases in greenhouse gas emissions and potential impacts to open space and wildlife.

We also support the recommendations in the Memorandum from Mayor Mahan, Vice Mayor Foley, and Councilmembers Campos, Cohen, and Casey with regard to the importance of providing meaningful opportunities for residents and community stakeholders to share input throughout the Four-Year Review process. We agree with the concerns expressed by other nonprofit organizations regarding the need for meaningful public engagement that goes beyond merely informing community members of public hearings. Such engagement efforts must include elements such as community workshops, engagement with neighborhood associations, and public surveys. We recommend that staff utilize the resources of community-based organizations in public outreach and engagement efforts.

In addition, while designating the Planning Commission as the Task Force for purposes of this Four-Year Review cycle makes sense given the limited scope of this review and economic


conditions, we wish to emphasize that the model of a diverse 40-member Task Force representing a broad array of perspectives should not be abandoned going forward. The staff memo states that a General Plan amendment will be brought to Council in Fall 2025 to effectuate this change in the nature of the Task Force; this General Plan amendment should specifically state that it is limited to this Four-Year Review cycle due to its limited scope and the current budgetary constraints, and should not be considered precedential for future Four-Year Review cycles.



Vibrant San Jose is a new local group advocating for policy changes that will result in abundant, affordable housing and walkable, bikeable neighborhoods with access to transit.

We support city staff updating the general plan to allow small multifamily housing in more places (housing element strategy p-35) as stated in the planning department's scope of work for the 4 year general plan update that you are voting on on June 3rd. We urge you to direct staff to allow these 2-4 unit buildings on all residential land.

We are aware the city is off track on our RHNA housing production goal and will likely come up 40,000 units short if the city continues at the same pace of building as the last 7 years. That is why it is crucial that we make big changes to our zoning laws during this 4 year general plan update and allow our neighborhoods to become denser with these missing middle housing types.


The status quo of only allowing single family homes on 94% of our residential land, as the city tells us is the current state, is not sustainable. Our rents and homes prices are too high. Our homeless population is too high. I implore you to direct city staff to update San Jose's zoning to allow small multifamily homes of up to 4 units in all areas currently zoned for single family homes, in addition to exploring other locations like areas currently zoned for commercial. Small multifamily homes like 6-8 unit buildings should be allowed on all larger streets like Meridian and Hillsdale.

Let's make San Jose affordable for young families, the middle class, working class families, the elderly, and everyone who works and belongs to our community.



This should include interactive methods such as focus groups, surveys, and community town halls to ensure that diverse voices across San José are authentically heard and reflected in the General Plan update.



Dear Mayor Mahan and City Councilmembers,

Vibrant San Jose is a new local group advocating for policy changes that will result in abundant, affordable housing and walkable, bikeable neighborhoods with access to transit.

We support city staff updating the general plan to allow small multifamily housing in more places (housing element strategy p-35) as stated in the planning department's scope of work for the 4 year general plan update that you are voting on on June 3rd. We urge you to direct staff to allow these 2-4 unit buildings on all residential land.

We are aware the city is off track on our RHNA housing production goal and will likely come up 40,000 units short if the city continues at the same pace of building as the last 7 years. That is why it is crucial that we make big changes to our zoning laws during this 4 year general plan update and allow our neighborhoods to become denser with these missing middle housing types.

The status quo of only allowing single family homes on 94% of our residential land, as the city tells us is the current state, is not sustainable. Our rents and homes prices are too high. Our homeless population is too high. I implore you to direct city staff to update San Jose's zoning to allow small multifamily homes of up to 4 units in all areas currently zoned for single family homes, in addition to exploring other locations like areas currently zoned for commercial. Small multifamily homes like 6-8 unit buildings should be allowed on all larger streets like Meridian and Hillsdale.

Let's make San Jose affordable for young families, the middle class, working class families, the elderly, and everyone who works and belongs to our community.



Dear Mayor Mahan and San Jose City Councilmembers,

On behalf of the South Bay Labor Council, AFL-CIO, and the Santa Clara and San Benito Counties Building and Construction Trades Council, we are writing to ask you to include specific language today to ensure strong participation from Labor in the Envision San José 2024 General Plan, particularly from the Labor Council, the Building Trades Council, and the Mechanical, Electrical, Plumber, and Sprinklerfitter unions (MEPS).

As staff notes, the General Plan review is a critical process for San Jose's future, outlining a pathway to build more housing, create good jobs, and comply with state regulations.

Labor has proudly participated in past processes. The Task Force model ensured broad stakeholder engagement, including Labor. Although it was occasionally unwieldy, so is democracy. Ultimately, the City arrived at a thoroughly vetted General Plan. Now, with a review ahead of us, San Jose deserves nothing less. Labor needs a seat at the table.

Finally, the staff memo emphasizes the need to add housing capacity to the General Plan and the resulting requirement to adjust the jobs/housing balance. San Jose requires housing and jobs, but the jobs must be well paying, quality jobs. To develop family-sustaining jobs in San Jose and nurture thriving communities, we must ensure that the General Plan focuses on connecting people to quality jobs. It is essential to promote quality jobs, especially in the construction trades, and these measures should be included in the review.
