

Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Incident Type Distribution






- Fire-based first responder EMS is an essential component to prehospital care

Major Observations on Patient Primary Impressions




- 8% increase in Traumatic Injury and General Weakness
- Traumatic Injuries make up approx. 26% of total patient primary impressions
- Downward trends seen in FY 2023-2024:
 - Alcohol Intoxication/Overdose (-32%)
 - Altered Levels of Consciousness (-7%)
 - Chest Pain (-8%)

- Greater frequency in Department-assisted transports due to County's contracted ambulance unavailability
- 1,447 Rescue Medic Transports
- 1,113 BLS Ambulance Escorts
- 66% increase in SDO 10/11 Activation Minutes

Public Access Defibrillators (PAD Program)





 International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation (ILCOR):

Most adults who can be saved from cardiac arrest are in ventricular fibrillation (VF) or pulseless ventricular tachycardia. Electrical defibrillation provides the single most important therapy for the treatment of these patients. To achieve the earliest possible defibrillation, the International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation (ILCOR) endorses the concept that in many settings nonmedical individuals should be allowed and encouraged to use defibrillators.

- 9 AEDs were utilized in FY 2023-2024 with 100% success rate for return to spontaneous circulation
- 236 AEDs located at 96 locations throughout the City

PulsePoint App





 Early intervention for out-of-hospital cardiac arrest is critical:

A study published in the Journal of the American Heart Association in 2018 concluded that each 1-minute increase in EMS response time was associated with a 10.7% (95% confidence interval, 10.0%—11.4%) decrease in favorable neurological outcome for out-of-hospital cardiac arrest victims¹.

 PulsePoint will alert skilled individuals, including offduty health care professionals who have the PulsePoint App when SJFD receives 9-1-1 calls for cardiac arrest.
