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Improving Services to Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) Survivors

YWCA of Silicon Valley Partnership

- October 2016 to present
- Fulltime bilingual domestic violence advocate at the Family Violence Center
 - Counseling, lethality/risk assessment, safety planning, restraining order assistance, aid in accessing services, referrals
 - 1,614 follow-ups.
 - Services and referrals provided to 306 survivors
- 24-Hour hotline for calls from victims, potential victims, and San Jose Police Department personnel







Domestic Violence- High Risk Response Team (HRRT)

Goal: Reduce lethality and improve service delivery to IPV survivors by having a YWCA Advocate available for in-person response after hours

Program Launched June 1, 2019

- Five deployments to date
- Program growing as YWCA Advocates are hired & trained
- Ideal hours:
 - 8:00 pm through 8:00 am weekdays
 - All Day Saturday and Sunday
 - 24-hour hotline available if in-person response is not possible







Four Main HRRT Strategies

1) Early Identification of High-Risk Cases

SJPD Patrol Officers conduct a "Lethality Assessment" at every IPV investigation. This is used to conduct a thorough investigation and to determine if HRRT response is appropriate or not.

2) Engagement of Multidisciplinary Team YWCA Advocates respond and join Patrol Officers after hours at High-Lethality IPV incidents. These advocates are able to establish rapport with survivors, help with a safety plan, evaluate the condition of the survivors and offer appropriate services.





Four Main HRRT Strategies

3) Ongoing Monitoring and Containment of Offenders Whenever possible, suspects are booked into County Jail. Unit members monitor high-risk and repeat offenders and work with partners from Probation, Parole and the District Attorney's Office.

4) Victim Services

The YWCA is SJPD's contract partner. They continue to work closely with fellow IPV advocacy groups and Victim Services (DA's Office) to offer every available resource to IPV survivors.







Alignment of City Resources to Maximize Domestic Violence Services

Staffing at Family Violence Unit

- Unit is authorized for 20 sworn staff
- Unit is currently staffed with 14 sworn staff. Vacancies to be filled when Department staffing level allows backfills.
- One Sergeant and Five Officers assigned to DV team
