


## Vision Zero Action Plan and Data Trends

### **2025 Vision Zero Action Plan**

#### **Priority Action Areas**

- 1. Prioritize Equity and Vulnerable Road Users
- 2. Center Data Analytics and Report Metrics
- 3. Strategize Traffic Enforcement
- 4. Engineer for Safety
- 5. Engage the Community and Message Safety





### **2025 Vision Zero Action Plan**

#### **Near-Term Priorities**

- Create user-friendly <u>public facing dashboards</u>, available in multiple languages.
- Collaborate with other jurisdictions on data sharing. Formal outreach started with:
  - City of Santa Clara Vision Zero
  - Federal Railroad Administration (FRA)
- Provide timely reporting of findings from <u>before/after project evaluations</u>.
- Lower speed limits through Engineering and Traffic Surveys, where appropriate.
- Collaborate with the Police Department to partially automate/streamline the crash data entry process
- Automated enforcement programs: Speed safety and red-light running cameras



### **10-Year Fatal and KSI Traffic Crashes**


(KSI = Killed + Severe Injury)

#### 10-Year Traffic Fatalities

- Fluctuated year-to-year
- o Peaked at 65 in 2022
- Declined to 50 in 2023 and 49 in 2024

#### 10-Year Traffic KSI

- Peaked during COVID-19 years
   in 2020 and 2021
- o Declined to 237 in 2024









#### **10-Year KSI Trends**

- 10-Year Pedestrian and Bike Traffic KSI
  - 11% of total crashes, 42% of traffic-related KSI
  - o Declined during COVID-19 Stay-at-Home order


- 10-Year Speeding and Red-Light Running Traffic KSI
  - Peaked during COVID-19 years in 2020
     and 2021 due to less congested roads

- Saratoga Avenue to Boynton Avenue
- Completed fall 2024
- In approximately 12 months



#### **Snell Avenue**

- Highway 85 to Santa Teresa Boulevard
- Completed fall 2024
- In approximately **10** months





### **Quick Build Projects: Intersection Treatments**

Design and implementation
 of these standard quick-build
 improvements, depending
 on complexity, typically take
 less than six months,
 aligning with <u>City Council's</u>
 <u>directive</u> to complete quick-build projects within a year.

### **Grant Funds Awarded for Safety Projects FY 2024-2025**

Project	Amount Awarded	Funder / Grant Program
Multi-Intersection Signal Improvement Project 2024	\$509,670	HSIP Cycle 12
FY 25-27 Accessible Pedestrian Signal Community Improvement Project	\$658,278	Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) FY 26-27

- Several prior federal grant agreements from recent years, both executed and unexecuted, have not yet been obligated.
  - Approximately \$50 million.
  - Including over \$21 million in combined U.S. DOT's Safe Streets for All grants for funding safety improvements at key intersections and for the City's new automated speed enforcement program.



### **School Safety Program**


- Completed 31 access and circulation studies
- Installed 282 high visibility school crosswalks

High Visibility Crosswalk Improvement at Forrest Hill Elementary






### **Walk and Roll Program**

- Working with approximately 90 elementary, middle, and high schools
- Events include: Safety assemblies, Bike rodeos, Walk n' Roll Days, International Walk to School Day, Viva EscuelaSJ










### **Automated Enforcement: Speed Safety and Red-Light Running Cameras**

- Speed Safety Cameras
  - 33 proposed locations
  - \$15M \$17.9M one-time and ongoing costs for 5-year program
  - \$8.5M Safe Street for All grant funding pending FHWA review of grant agreement
- Red-Light Running Cameras
  - 4 proposed locations
  - Installation anticipated in summer 2025
