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## REDISTRICTING UPDATE

#### Phase |

- Present August 2022
- RFP for a consultant / vendor (closed)
- Establish a working group of Department subject matter experts
- Selection of a consultant / vendor

#### Phase II

- Expected Start Date June 2023
- Consultant / vendor analysis of: call volume and severity; response times; staffing and personnel deployment options; equity assurance; foot patrol options; technology and physical infrastructure; population density; geography. Will also consider any changes in policy, such as through the Reimagining Community Safety process.

#### **Current Position**

#### Phase III

- Expected Start Date January 2024
- Cost analysis & acquisition of funding
- Development of a strategic implementation plan
- Redeployment/addition of Department personnel, as appropriate, to support the recommended model

#### Phase IV

- Expected Start Date July 2024
- Deployment of recommended staffing model and redistricting
- Continued analysis by the working group for evaluation and review of implementation

#### Phase V

- Expected Start Date January 2025
- Adjustment of staffing model and redistricting (if necessary)



## G.H.O.S.T. UNIT MISSION STATEMENT

The Gun & Hazardous Offender Suppression Team's mission is to increase public safety in the City of San Jose through the suppression and interdiction of illegal firearms possession, trafficking, and manufacturing.

## G.H.O.S.T. UNIT OBJECTIVES

- Identify and apprehend Priority Gun Offenders involved in illegal firearms possession, distribution and trafficking, possession of illegal firearm accessories such as suppressors, silencers and fully automatic switches (machine gun conversionary devices).
- Conduct intelligence gathering on firearm-related crimes through investigative methods including human sources, social media, prior case knowledge, and follow-up investigation.
- Collaborate with other law enforcement agencies on major gun investigations.
- Serve as a resource for other units within the Police Department.

## G.H.O.S.T. MOVING FORWARD

- Working toward an MOU with the ATF
- Working with the Santa Clara County District Attorney's Office as part of a Crime Gun Intelligence Center (CGIC) model
- Working on streamlining the processing of firearm & ballistic evidence:
  - Integrated Ballistics Identification System (IBIS): Captures ballistic information
  - National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN): Allows for the comparison of ballistic evidence to aid in solving and preventing violent crimes involving firearms
