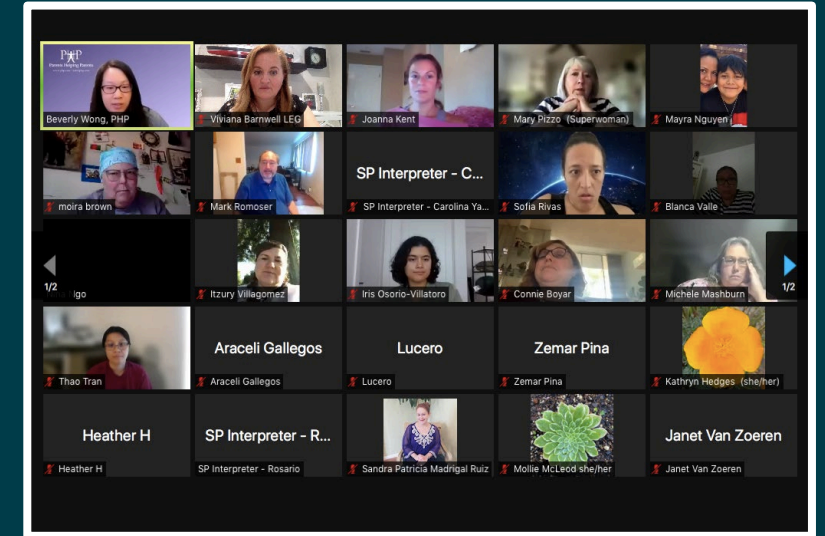

# Task Force Process

- ❑ **12** virtual meetings held with live interpretation in Spanish and Vietnamese.
- ❑ In February 2022, the Task Force established **nine** committees to undertake the recommendation formulation process.

  - ❑ Housing
  - ❑ Just Recovery for Airport, Hotel and Arts Workers
  - ❑ Steering Committee
  - ❑ Supporting Small Businesses
  - ❑ Workers' Health, Safety, and Rights

# Community Engagement Goals

- Reach those most impacted by the pandemic
- Build trust
- Inform residents about existing City Recovery Initiatives – services and resources
- Gather input on what is working, what is not, what is missing
- Use Promotores model
- Incorporate feedback into final report for City Council consideration

# Who We Engaged

- ❑ **771** people completed Community Survey
- ❑ **500** people attended Community Resource Fair
- ❑ **31** activities led by Lived Experience Group and Task Force:
  - ❑ 12 Community Pop Ups
  - ❑ 2 Community Forums
  - ❑ 16 Focus Groups
  - ❑ 1 Community Resource Fair
- ❑ **1,500** total people engaged
- ❑ **9** Lived Experience Group members
- ❑ **21 Promotores** hired and trained

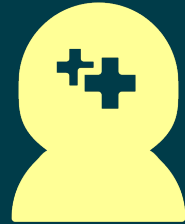

# Community Engagement Highlights



## Economic Insecurity

Strong need to continue rental assistance and food distribution services.



## Mental Health

Need to strengthen mental health support capacity, especially among youth and frontline workers.



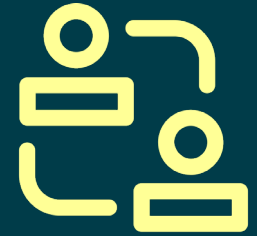
## Childcare

Shortage of accessible childcare opportunities, particularly among parents of children with disabilities.



## Workers and Small Businesses

Many businesses and people who lost their jobs are still struggling. Health and safety conditions are a challenge for workers.



## Outreach and Awareness

Majority of people do not know the resources available to them nor how to access them.

# Recommendations

- ❑ Vetted through the committee process; developed a template to help formulate goals, strategies and actions
- ❑ Total of **88** recommendations:
  - Informed by community feedback
  - **10** recommendations with funding from the \$2 million set aside in FY22-23 Budget
  - Align with existing Recovery Initiatives: Housing Stabilization, Food & Necessities/Wellness, Child Care/Youth/Families, Workers, Small Businesses
  - Organized by three implementation categories:

Category Number	Category Description	Number of Recommendations
1	Already underway/in a department work plan	43
2	City Council policy decision	13
3	Additional evaluation and/or resources required	39

## Next Steps

- ❑ Develop Implementation Framework – Q1 2023:
  - ❑ Work plans for 10 recommendations with funding allocations
  - ❑ Finalize impact metrics with City staff and partners
  - ❑ Coordinate with lead departments/entities on other recommendations
- ❑ Updates to Community Economic Development Committee
- ❑ Promotores Pilot program to continue through FY 22-23
