Greetings Mayor Liccardo, Vice Mayor Jones and councilmembers,

I am visiting my sister in Minneapolis, and on a trip to the store she mentioned that the speed limit in Minneapolis is 20 mph except where posted differently. That is the whole city, not just parts of it. It might be a way to go in San Jose, instead of my proposal for just residential neighborhoods (copied below for reference). Office parks would benefit as well, and the 20mph habit everywhere but arterials and expressways would make it seem normal for drivers. It seems to be here in Minneapolis. It was a very pleasant drive.

My proposal to council on August 15 is below for reference.

Since Covid, in the neighborhoods in San Jose I frequently visit, I have noticed people and children walking, running, using personal mobility devices, and playing in the streets. They simply have taken control of their neighborhood residential streets. In one neighborhood I visit frequently the residents have posted signs "20 is plenty" referring to the speed limit they want. I always set my cruise control at 20 mph to respect their wishes.

It is time that the city of San Jose recognize this reality and adjust the residential speed limit to 20, to discourage excessive speed frequently over 35 mph on these streets.

Thank you for considering these proposals.

Dear Mayor and Council Members:

Thank you for the opportunity to watch last week's meeting via Zoom. It was disappointing!

As a retired teacher serving East San Jose, I am aware of over 47 different immigrant communities. Last night, for over two hours, only one immigrant group spoke. That was not fair to the residents of San Jose. There was almost a complete absence of other viewpoints.

On June 27, New York Justice Ralph Porzio ruled that non-citizen voting was unconstitutional. There have

now been additional rulings. How is it that the Council didn't know this, and proceeded in a very unkind manner to lead these speakers on?

Also, it became aware to me, that the organizers did not themselves have a basic knowledge of civics. States have the right to choose the method of holding elections in their states, and only the California Legislature can make changes regarding this. The United States Constitution is the ultimate authority on who can vote. Any changes must come from an amendment voted on by both houses of Congress.

Wouldn't the time have been better spent on educating the Council and attendees on the legal process of acquiring citizenship, explaining each step, and sharing helpful resources here in San Jose that can assist? How about sharing a list of immigrant attorneys, charities that teach English as a second language, and groups conducting citizenship classes? I imagine that there are even groups that would assist with some legal fees.

Was this deception, ignorance, or hubris? If the Council voted to allow this, the City would be hit by a number of very costly lawsuits.

I appreciated Councilwoman Davis', Councilman Mahan's, and Mayor Liccardo's thoughtful balanced remarks.
