

Community-Led Solutions to Domestic Violence Background: Identifying Priority Projects from Reimagining Public Safety Advisory Committee Recommendations

City Manager's Office collaborated with advocates (REAL Coalition)

- Three priority projects identified (complimentary FY 2023-2024 budget direction)
 - Local Government Violence Prevention Research
 - ✓ Presented to City Council February 2024
 - ✓ Subsequent MBA issued May 2024
 - Exploring Alternate and Co-Response Models to Select 9-1-1 Calls for Service
 - ✓ Presented to City Council February 2024
 - ✓ Follow up direction brought to City Council February 2025
 - Community-Based Solutions to Domestic Violence
 - ✓ Project update during February 2025 alternative and co-response models report
 - ✓ Final consultant report is before City Council today



Community-Led Solutions to Domestic Violence Background: Community-Led Solutions to Domestic Violence

Reimagining Public Safety

Community Advisory Committee Recommendation #9

Gender-based violence

[AS3] The City of San José will develop alternative community-based response programs for gender-based violence that provide an alternative to law enforcement involvement.

Programs may involve community teams designed to safely intervene in incidents of domestic violence, and survivor-led restorative practices for low-level gender-based violent crimes.

- Mayor's March Budget Message for Fiscal Year 2023-2024 directed, and Adopted Budget included, \$400,000 for a Community-Led Solutions to Domestic Violence project, funding a previously identified priority project.
- Intended to engage the community on gaps in domestic violence services outside of law enforcement.
- (3) RFPs issued; final procurement process selected Battered Women's Justice Project, who partnered with (2) local non-profits – Maitri and Caminar

City of San José Study: Scope

- Literature review of domestic violence frameworks and models
- Community needs assessment and asset scan for domestic violence services in San José, especially examining services available to underserved groups
- Community outreach process centering those affected most by domestic violence
- Final report with findings and recommendations based on trends and community needs
