

# **Project Overview**



#### Report commissioned to help SJPD enhance community trust.

Report focuses on *community engagement,* defined as "intentional interactions between the police and members of the community in a nonenforcement setting."

#### Research conducted through:

- » Review of SJPD operations
- » Interviews with SJPD leadership
- » Literature review regarding best practices and national models
- » Statistically-valid survey in three languages
- » Community meetings
- » Focus groups
- » Community interviews



# **Community Survey**

#### Random sample of 1,201 San José residents

Administered in English, Spanish, and Vietnamese

# Statistically significant results

I feel safe when a Police Officer is around
When Police officers patrol on foot or on bicycles, it improves how they engage with the community
I trust the San José Police Department to protect and serve our community
I have seen San José Police officers patrolling my neighborhood in cars or motorcycles
The San José Police Department treats people fairly
The San José Police Department works with the community to solve problems
The San José Police Department treats people the same regardless of race, ethnicity, or identity
The San José Police Department is sensitive to cultural diversity and related issues
I have seen a San José Community Service Officer in my neighborhood
The San José Police Department communicates well with residents
The San José Police Department responds to and follows-up on calls for service in a timely manner
The San José Police Department actively seeks input and feedback from the community
I am well-informed about the activities and programs offered by the San José Police Department
I enjoy the events and programs hosted by San José Police Department
The San José Police Department communicates well with local businesses

## Recommendations

### **Report contains 29 recommendations, organized as follows:**

- » Strategic Plan Revisions
- » Officer Expectations and Support
- » Enhanced Community Engagement Function
- » Community Cooperation
- » Internal Coordination
- » Enhanced Web and Social Media Presence
- » Events and Programs
- » Ongoing Tracking and Evaluation









18 of the 29 recommendations have cost implications.

#### Total costs:

- » \$47.6 million annual ongoing costs.
- » \$73.4 million in one-time start-up costs.

Bulk of the costs = hiring more officers (Recommendations 3, 4, and 10).

Without those hiring costs, recommendation costs are reduced to:

- » \$5.1 million annual ongoing costs.
- » \$654,000 in one-time start-up costs.

# **Moving Forward**

Prioritize recommendations based on their impact, budget, staffing, and workload.

Immediately implement that can be completed within existing budget, staffing, and workload.

Continue those we already do.

- Consider recommendations with a fiscal impact through the budgetary process.
- Continue to hire more officers to fill existing staffing gaps.
