Community Forest Management

 Community Forest Management Plan (CFMP) adopted in February 2022

Set new direction for forestry management

Added staff in DOT and PRNS

Established 12-year pruning cycle

Funding allocated to plant 1,000 trees per year

 DOT funding an additional 1,000 trees for total of 2,000 annually

 Audit conducted and findings presented to Council January 2023

Findings in four broad categories

Ten recommendations



Accomplishments

- 2,034 trees planted exceeding goal of 2,000
- Added 880 new trees to Parks
- Awarded an Inflation Reduction
 Act grant from the USDA Forest
 Service. \$5.6 million for DOT and
 \$1 million for PRNS
- Two staff members accepted to the Municipal Forestry Institute
- Completed more than 1,000 requested inspections
- Built relationships with partner agencies



Streamlining Governance

Recommendation: Consolidate tree responsibilities to one division


Status: Evaluating

Recommendation: Include trees in the beginning of the design and

planning process

Status: Forestry Team now integrated at beginning of planning process

- Recommendation: Provide an arborist review of all Planning Division tree responsibilities
 - ✓ Status: PBCE reaches out to DOT Forestry Team for technical assistance



Ensuring Urban Forest Sustainably



Recommendation: Tree planting activities will promote a sustainable urban forest

Status: Trees selected following the strategy of right tree, right place, right reason in the right way for a future climate

Recommendation: Increase tree canopy cover across all census tracts and neighborhoods


- Status: Mitigation funds and Federal grant funds in place to ensure the entire City has access to new trees
- Recommendation: Continually review the City recommended tree species list to ensure trees are adapted to climate change and support local habitat and wildlife
 - Status: Planting of a wide variety of tree species encouraged to avoid monocultures and even aged stands

Finding 3: DOT Has Not Been Spending In-Lieu Fees Timely

- Unexpected amount collected
- COVID procurement and vendor impacts
- Staff and partner capacity challenges

Recommendation

- Identify planting locations or uses for accumulated fees
- Create guidelines for how fees should be spent
- \$1.27 million spent/obligated

Efficient and Effective Tree Management


- Recommendation: Maintain current community forest information to ensure management decisions based on best available data
 - Status: Funding secured for inventory data collection for one third of City's street trees. All City park trees to be inventoried this year
- Recommendation: Ensure City Tree management activities and design standards reflect current understanding of community forest sustainability
 - √ Status: New Design Standards adopted after CFMP in 2022
- Recommendation: Community members and private property owners will understand their role in growing and maintaining the community forest
 - Status: Funding secured for a public awareness of tree campaign.

Support for diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging

- Recommendation: Ensure the demographics of the City are represented by stakeholders who participate in guiding the community forest program
 - Status: Progress being made to reach all groups of cultural communities in the City - CFAC
- Recommendation: Prioritize increasing canopy cover in disadvantaged communities
 - Status: Funding secured from the USDA Forest Service specifically for the White House's Justice40 disadvantaged census tracts



Standardization of Planning and Development Practices



- Recommendation: Protect and preserve mature trees
 - Status: Accomplished during plan review process
- Recommendation: City planning and development will contribute increasing tree canopy cover
 - Status: Planting ratios continue to be met. Design Standards mandate 50% of parking and public space be shaded

Challenges

New Pest Identified: Invasive shot hole borer *Fusarium* dieback

- Found in November 2023
- Affects possibly 15% of urban forest
- Could cost at least \$19.7 collectively for property owners
- Approximately \$5000 per individual property owner for a large tree
- Data analysis is being performed to guide policy decisions in the future


Tree Care Industry Practices:

- Deliver year 1 plan for the \$5.6 million IRA Grant
- Understand and mitigate ISHB threat
- Update portion of tree inventory
- Seek additional partnerships and funding
- Partner with CMO to update metrics
- Complete remaining audit recommendations
- Launch free tree planting program!







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
