SUBJECT: ACCEPTANCE OF THE OFFICE OF JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION PROGRAM FISCAL YEAR 2017 INTERNET CRIMES AGAINST CHILDREN TASK FORCE INVITED AWARDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$425,769 AND ADOPTION OF THE APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE AND FUNDING SOURCES RESOLUTION AMENDMENT IN THE GENERAL FUND

RECOMMENDATION

- (a) Adopt a resolution accepting the FY 2017 Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force Invited Awards in the amount of \$425,769 and authorize the City Manager to execute the Grant Agreement and all related documents and to execute additional amendments and related documents, including online certifications at time of reimbursement request, without further City Council action; and
- (b) Adopt the following Appropriation Ordinance and the Funding Sources Resolution amendments in the General Fund for Fiscal Year 2017-2018:
 - (1) Increase estimate for Revenue from Federal Government by \$425,769; and
 - (2) Establish a new City-Wide appropriation to the Police Department for the FY 2017 Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force Invited Awards in the amount of \$425,769.

OUTCOME

The City Council's approval of this recommendation will provide continued funding for the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force to train, investigate, and allow for the prosecution of child predators.

BACKGROUND

Since 1976, commercial child pornography has grown and become more sophisticated as the technology to reproduce and distribute pornography has developed. The internet has enabled child predators to form clubs and other organizations to expand their exploitation of children. The internet provides predator's easier access to children and it allows them greater anonymity. Law enforcement very quickly recognized the danger these predators pose to children and began efforts to combat their activities. The U.S. Department of Justice's (DOJ) Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency and Prevention (OJJDP) began development of nationwide law enforcement training on child sexual exploitation in the early 1980s.

In February 2003, the Department applied for and was awarded its first ICAC grant from the OJJDP. Since that time, the Department has applied for and received several ICAC continuation grants. ICAC grant funding has provided overtime, equipment, and vehicles for investigations; training of investigators; and hosting of two national ICAC conferences. Funding has also provided equipment and training for investigators from eleven Bay Area counties who participate in the Silicon Valley ICAC Task Force as the Department serves as the Fiscal Agent for this regional award. Investigators from the Department's Child Exploitation Detail were instrumental in developing the first series of nationwide investigative trainings for ICAC. The most recent award, the FY 2016 ICAC award, was approved by City Council on November 1, 2016¹.

On June 30, 2017, the Department submitted an application to the OJJDP to continue its work in the area of ICAC. On July 27, 2017, the Department was informed that all FY 2017 grant awardees (recipients and sub-recipients) will be required to comply with terms and requirements specified in the award documents, including compliance with Title 8 United States Code Section 1373 (8 U.S.C. § 1373), as applicable. Section 1373 prohibits restrictions on the exchange of information regarding citizenship and immigration status among federal, state, and local entities and officials. Each agency now must assure and certify compliance with all award conditions that affect the obligation, expenditure, and drawdown of award funds as well as all related requirements that appear in the certification and assurances for the award, specifically including any restrictions concerning obligations set out in requirements related to 8 U.S.C. § 1373. The FY 2017 ICAC award certification (see attached Grant Conditions) does not specifically require the City to certify as compliant with Title 8 U.S.C. § 1373. These dynamics are fluid with federal grants, and if this or other requirements change, the Department will return to the City Council regarding any new requirement, as appropriate.

This grant is reimbursement based. Beginning on October 1, 2017, DOJ award recipients are now required to certify each payment reimbursement request before submission. The certification represents the recipient's compliance with all applicable terms and conditions of the award, as well as statutory and regulatory requirements, and all related requirements that appear in the certifications and assurances for the award. The Department's Grants Manager will be required to scroll through the entire certification text prior to clicking the "I Agree and Submit"

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button. Once users click the "I Agree and Submit" button, a payment reimbursement request confirmation is displayed. The Administration is seeking authorization by the City Council for the City Administration to affirm this certification as part of this memorandum.

Below is the certification statement that the Department's Grants Manager must now accept for every future DOJ reimbursement request:

"Declaration and Certification to the U.S. Department of Justice as to this Payment/Drawdown Request:

I declare the following to the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), under penalty of perjury: (1) I have authority to make this certification on behalf of the award recipient; (2) I have conducted (or had conducted for me, including by the recipient's legal counsel as appropriate) a diligent review of all award conditions that affect the recipient's authorities and responsibilities with respect to obligation, expenditure, and drawdown of award funds, as well as all statutory and regulatory requirements pertinent to such financial actions that appear in award-related certifications and assurances; and (3) I also have conducted (or had conducted for me) a diligent review as to all other matters encompassed by this certification.

To the best of my knowledge and belief, on behalf of myself and the award recipient, I certify to DOJ, under penalty of perjury, that the following are true as of the date of this request— (1) The recipient is in compliance with all award conditions that affect the obligation, expenditure, and drawdown of award funds, as well as all related requirements that appear in the certifications and assurances for this award, specifically including any restrictions concerning obligations set out in requirements related to 8 U.S.C. § 1373 (applicable to state and local governments, which concerns communications between government agencies regarding immigration status); (2) If this request is for reimbursement: the request is accurate and complete; all obligations, expenditures, and cash receipts are supported by the requisite accounting records; and all costs included in the request are reasonable, allowable, and allocable to the award; and (3) If this request is for an advance: all obligations, expenditures, and cash receipts will be supported by the requisite accounting records; and (absent a specific statute that provides otherwise) the recipient will disburse the funds for costs that are reasonable, allowable, and allocable to the award within 10 days, or return the funds to DOJ.

I understand that, in making payment pursuant to this request, DOJ will rely upon this declaration and certification as a material representation. I also understand that a materially false, fictitious, or fraudulent statement in this declaration and certification or otherwise in this payment/drawdown request (or concealment or omission of a material fact as to either) may be the subject of criminal prosecution (including under 18 U.S.C. §§ 1001 and/or 1621, and/or 42 U.S.C. § 3795a), and also may subject me and the award recipient to civil penalties and administrative remedies under the federal False Claims Act (including under 31 U.S.C. §§ 3729-3730 and §§ 3801-3812) or otherwise."

ANALYSIS

The Department has been awarded \$425,769 for the FY 2017 Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force Invited Award. The grant term is July 1, 2017, through September 30, 2018. This grant will fund activities related to the Silicon Valley Internet Crimes Against Children program including salaries, training, and supplies.

The following list provides information on the Spending Plan for the FY 2017 Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force Invited Awards as approved by the OJJDP. These estimates are subject to reallocation and/or change over the course of the grant term; however, the total grant amount to the City will remain the same.

- \$157,913 of the funds will be utilized by the Department for Officers' overtime costs; special pay for an officer assigned to an electronic detection police service dog that can track items such as laptops, SD cards, or thumb drives; and a portion of salary and benefits of an Analyst position to support the ICAC program reporting requirements.
- \$95,241 of the funds will support travel costs to attend trainings and quarterly commander meetings directly related to ICAC functions.
- \$9,995 of the funds will be utilized for program supplies that include, but not limited to, data storage devices and forensic supplies.
- \$162,620 will be used for other costs that include, but not limited to, undercover mobile internet access, forensic tools, software licenses, an electronic detection police service dog, and vehicle operating and maintenance.

The following table summarizes the FY 2017 ICAC Budget.

In order for the Department to continue the use of DOJ Federal ICAC funds, delegation of authority is required to accept the certification and assurances statement for each grant payment reimbursement request. Although the City has already signed the certifications of assurances at the time of the grant application, DOJ will now require Department staff to recertify every time reimbursements are requested. This memorandum is seeking City Council authorization for the City Administration to confirm all appropriate certifications as part of the reimbursement process which is a newly implemented process by DOJ. The certification language is cited above and contains references to 8 U.S.C. § 1373, but since this requirement was not a part of the grant

award condition, it does not apply at this time; however, given the discussions surrounding compliance with 8 U.S.C. § 1373, it is noted in this memorandum for full transparency.

EVALUATION AND FOLLOW-UP

No additional City Council action is expected for this grant.

PUBLIC OUTREACH/INTEREST

This memorandum will be posted on the City's website for the December 12, 2017, City Council Agenda.

COORDINATION

This memorandum has been coordinated with the Office of the City Attorney.

COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION/INPUT

There is no City Commission input regarding these actions.

COST SUMMARY/IMPLICATIONS

Forensic tools may have minor maintenance, repair, or monthly service charges in the future. These expenses beyond the grant term will be absorbed in the Department's existing non-personal/equipment base budget.

This project is being funded by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. There is no cash or in-kind match requirement with this grant.

Congratulations on your recent award. In establishing financial assistance programs, Congress linked the receipt of federal funding to compliance with federal civil rights laws. The Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) is responsible for ensuring that recipients of financial assistance from the OJP, the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS), and the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) comply with the applicable federal civil rights laws. We at the OCR are available to help you and your organization meet the civil rights requirements that come with DOJ funding.

Ensuring Access to Federally Assisted Programs

Federal laws that apply to recipients of financial assistance from the DOJ prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability in funded programs or activities, not only in employment but also in the delivery of services or benefits. A federal law also prohibits recipients from discriminating on the basis of age in the delivery of services or benefits.

In March of 2013, President Obama signed the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013. The statute amends the Violence Against Women Act of 1994 (VAWA) by including a nondiscrimination grant condition that prohibits discrimination based on actual or perceived race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity. The new nondiscrimination grant condition applies to certain programs funded after October 1, 2013. The OCR and the OVW have developed answers to some frequently asked questions about this provision to assist recipients of VAWA funds to understand their obligations. The Frequently Asked Questions are available at <http://ojp.gov/about/ocr/vawafaqs.htm>.

Enforcing Civil Rights Laws

All recipients of federal financial assistance, regardless of the particular funding source, the amount of the grant award, or the number of employees in the workforce, are subject to prohibitions against unlawful discrimination. Accordingly, the OCR investigates recipients that are the subject of discrimination complaints from both individuals and groups. In addition, based on regulatory criteria, the OCR selects a number of recipients each year for compliance reviews, audits that require recipients to submit data showing that they are providing services equitably to all segments of their service population and that their employment practices meet equal opportunity standards.

Providing Services to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Individuals

In accordance with DOJ guidance pertaining to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d, recipients of federal financial assistance must take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to their programs and activities for persons with limited English proficiency (LEP). See U.S. Department of Justice, Guidance to Federal Financial Assistance Recipients Regarding Title VI Prohibition Against National Origin Discrimination Affecting Limited English Proficient Persons, 67 Fed. Reg. 41,455 (2002). For more information on the civil rights responsibilities that recipients have in providing language services to LEP individuals, please see the website <http://www.lep.gov>.

Ensuring Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations

The DOJ regulation, Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations, 28 C.F.R. pt. 38, requires State Administering Agencies (SAAs) to treat faith-based organizations the same as any other applicant or recipient. The regulation prohibits SAAs from making awards or grant administration decisions on the basis of an organization's religious character or affiliation, religious name, or the religious composition of its board of directors.

The regulation also prohibits faith-based organizations from using financial assistance from the DOJ to fund inherently (or explicitly) religious activities. While faith-based organizations can engage in non-funded inherently religious activities, they must hold them separately from the program funded by the DOJ, and recipients cannot compel beneficiaries to participate in them. The Equal Treatment Regulation also makes clear that organizations participating in programs funded by the DOJ are not permitted to discriminate in the provision of services on the basis of a beneficiary's religion. For more information on the regulation, please see the OCR's website at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/equal_fbo.htm.

SAAs and faith-based organizations should also note that the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act (Safe Streets Act) of 1968, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 3789d(c); the Victims of Crime Act of 1984, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 10604(e); the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 5672(b); and VAWA, Pub. L. No. 113-4, sec. 3(b)(4), 127 Stat. 54, 61-62 (to be codified at 42 U.S.C. § 13925(b)(13)) contain prohibitions against discrimination on the basis of religion in employment. Despite these nondiscrimination provisions, the DOJ has concluded that it may construe the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) on a case-by-case basis to permit some faith-based organizations to receive DOJ funds while taking into account religion when hiring staff, even if the statute that authorizes the funding program generally forbids recipients from considering religion in employment decisions. Please consult with the OCR if you have any questions about the regulation or the application of RFRA to the statutes that prohibit discrimination in employment.

Using Arrest and Conviction Records in Making Employment Decisions

The OCR issued an advisory document for recipients on the proper use of arrest and conviction records in making hiring decisions. See Advisory for Recipients of Financial Assistance from the U.S. Department of Justice on the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission's Enforcement Guidance: Consideration of Arrest and Conviction Records in Employment Decisions Under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (June 2013), available at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/pdfs/UseofConviction_Advisory.pdf. Recipients should be mindful that the misuse of arrest or conviction records to screen either applicants for employment or employees for retention or promotion may have a disparate impact based on race or national origin, resulting in unlawful employment discrimination. In light of the Advisory, recipients should consult local counsel in reviewing their employment practices. If warranted, recipients should also incorporate an analysis of the use of arrest and conviction records in their Equal Employment Opportunity Plans (EEOs) (see below).

Complying with the Safe Streets Act

An organization that is a recipient of financial assistance subject to the nondiscrimination provisions of the Safe Streets Act, must meet two obligations: (1) complying with the federal regulation pertaining to the development of an EEO (see 28 C.F.R. pt. 42, subpt. E) and (2) submitting to the OCR findings of discrimination (see 28 C.F.R. §§ 42.204(c), .205(c)(5)).

Meeting the EEOP Requirement

If your organization has less than fifty employees or receives an award of less than \$25,000 or is a nonprofit organization, a medical institution, an educational institution, or an Indian tribe, then it is exempt from the EEOP requirement. To claim the exemption, your organization must complete and submit Section A of the Certification Form, which is available online at <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/pdfs/cert.pdf>.

If your organization is a government agency or private business and receives an award of \$25,000 or more, but less than \$500,000, and has fifty or more employees (counting both full- and part-time employees but excluding political appointees), then it has to prepare a Utilization Report (formerly called an EEOP Short Form), but it does not have to submit the report to the OCR for review. Instead, your organization has to maintain the Utilization Report on file and make it available for review on request. In addition, your organization has to complete Section B of the Certification Form and return it to the OCR. The Certification Form is available at <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/pdfs/cert.pdf>.

If your organization is a government agency or private business and has received an award for \$500,000 or more and has fifty or more employees (counting both full- and part-time employees but excluding political appointees), then it has to prepare a Utilization Report (formerly called an EEOP Short Form) and submit it to the OCR for review within sixty days from the date of this letter. For assistance in developing a Utilization Report, please consult the OCR's website at <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/eeop.htm>. In addition, your organization has to complete Section C of the Certification Form and return it to the OCR. The Certification Form is available at <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/pdfs/cert.pdf>.

To comply with the EEOP requirements, you may request technical assistance from an EEOP specialist at the OCR by telephone at (202) 307-0690, by TTY at (202) 307-2027, or by e-mail at EEOsubmission@usdoj.gov.

Meeting the Requirement to Submit Findings of Discrimination

If in the three years prior to the date of the grant award, your organization has received an adverse finding of discrimination based on race, color, national origin, religion, or sex, after a due-process hearing, from a state or federal court or from a state or federal administrative agency, your organization must send a copy of the finding to the OCR.

Ensuring the Compliance of Subrecipients

SAAAs must have standard assurances to notify subrecipients of their civil rights obligations, written procedures to address discrimination complaints filed against subrecipients, methods to monitor subrecipients' compliance with civil rights requirements, and a program to train subrecipients on applicable civil rights laws. In addition, SAAAs must submit to the OCR every three years written Methods of Administration (MOA) that summarize the policies and procedures that they have implemented to ensure the civil rights compliance of subrecipients. - 14) any other costs associated with the event.

The recipient must also itemize and report any of the following attendee (including participants, presenters, speakers) costs that are paid or reimbursed with cooperative agreement funds:

- 1) meals and incidental expenses (M&IE portion of per diem);
- 2) lodging;
- 3) transportation to/from event location (e.g., common carrier, Privately Owned Vehicle (POV)); and,

None of the following activities will be conducted either under this award or a related third party action: 1) New construction; 2) Any renovation or remodeling of a property located in an environmentally or historically sensitive area, including property (a) listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, or (b) located within a 100-year flood plain, a wetland, or habitat for an endangered species; 3) A renovation which will change the basic prior use of a facility or significantly change its size; 4) Research and technology whose anticipated and future application could be expected to have an effect on the environment; or 5) Implementation of a program involving the use of chemicals, other than chemicals that are (a) purchased as an incidental component of a funded activity and (b) traditionally used, for example, in office, household, recreational, or education environments. The National Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force Program, consists of State and local law enforcement task forces dedicated to developing effective responses to online enticement of children by sexual predators, child exploitation, and child obscenity and pornography cases. Each State and local task force that is part of the national program shall: 1) consist of State and local investigators, prosecutors, forensic specialists, and education specialists who are dedicated to addressing the goals of the task force; 2) engage in proactive investigations, forensic examinations, and effective prosecutions of Internet crimes against children; 3) provide forensic, preventive, and investigative assistance to parents, educators, prosecutors, law enforcement, and others concerned with Internet crimes against children; 4) develop multijurisdictional, multiagency partnerships and responses to Internet crimes against children offenses through ongoing informational, administrative, and technological support to other State and local law enforcement agencies, as a means for such agencies to acquire the necessary knowledge, personnel, and specialized equipment to investigate and prosecute such offenses; 5) participate in nationally coordinated investigations in any case in which the Attorney General determines such participation to be necessary, as permitted by the available resources of such task force; 6) establish or adopt investigative and

prosecution standards consistent with established norms, to which such task force shall comply; 7) investigate, and seek prosecution on tips related to Internet crimes against children, including tips from Operation Fairplay, the National Internet Crimes Against Children Data System, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children's CyberTipline, ICAC task forces, and other Federal, State, and local agencies, with priority being given to investigate leads that indicate the possibility of identifying or rescuing child victims, including investigative leads that indicate a likelihood of seriousness of offense or dangerousness to the community; 8) develop procedures for handling seized evidence for ICAC task force lead agencies and affiliate agencies; 9) maintain reports required by OJJDP and other reports and records as determined by the Attorney General; and, 10) seek to comply with national standards regarding the investigation and prosecution of Internet crimes against children, as set forth by the Attorney General, to the extent such standards are consistent with the law of the State where the task force is located.

The purpose of this project is to enhance and expand the Silicon Valley ICAC Task Force to address technology-facilitated child exploitation in order to prevent, interdict, and investigate ICAC offenses. In order to achieve the project's goals and objectives, the San Jose Police Department (PD) identified these activities for the Task Force: 1) conduct thorough and efficient computer forensic examinations and investigations; 2) continue partnerships with county and Federal prosecutors to increase prosecutions; 3) build capacity in its geographical region to increase the number of agencies involved in the Task Force; and 4) conduct community outreach and education on Internet safety. These activities will work to increase Task Force and affiliate capacity to investigate cases; conduct sound, efficient forensic searches; and increase public awareness about ICAC and prevention and intervention resources. Funding will be used to provide: investigative personnel overtime and training to ICAC members, such as; the National Law Enforcement Training on Child Exploitation, computer forensics training, and National ICAC core training. In addition, the San Jose PD will use grant funds for operational and investigative costs such as software licenses, storage devices, and internet and smartphone service. CA/CF
