SUBJECT: CITY COUNCIL PARKING AND TRANSPORTATION DEMAND MANAGEMENT STUDY SESSION

RECOMMENDATION

Schedule a City Council Study Session entitled *Parking and Transportation Demand Management* for <u>Friday, August 27, 2021 from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m.</u> in the Council Chambers and approve the Study Session agenda.

PURPOSE OF STUDY SESSION

This study session will be conducted as a panel convening a diverse group of people (including academics, local developers, community-based organizations and City staff) to discuss the topic of Parking and Transportation Demand Management (TDM). The discussion will focus on how modernizing and updating City policies and codes on parking and TDM can support housing and commercial affordability, climate change, and equity goals.

OUTCOME

By the end of the session, the Mayor and Councilmembers will have a better understanding of how modernization of the City's existing parking and TDM policies and codes can better advance the goals and policies of Envision San Jose 2040 General Plan and Climate Smart San Jose. This item is informational only and Council is not asked to take any action on this item.

BACKGROUND

This study session is a joint effort between the Department of Planning, Building and Code Enforcement and the Department of Transportation under the umbrella of the American Cities Climate Challenge (ACCC) and multi-departmental Climate Smart San Jose team. Over the past

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two years, the City has been reevaluating its TDM policies to improve consistency with Climate Smart San Jose and General Plan transportation and land use goals. At present, off-street minimum parking requirements are based on outdated transportation models aimed at satisfying peak parking demand. However, these requirements are largely inconsistent with the City's expressed goals including housing and commercial affordability, decreased traffic congestion, greenhouse gas emissions, and walkability, safety, and urban infill opportunities.

To compliment the evaluation of minimum parking requirements, staff is reviewing the TDM requirements in the Zoning Ordinance (San Jose Municipal Code Title 19). TDM is a set of measures that encourage and make it easier for people to take transit, carpool, bike, walk, or otherwise shift away from driving alone. City staff will be proposing updates to the TDM measures in the future in order to reduce drive-alone trips, parking impact, and traffic congestion generated by new development projects. Staff will propose updates to the City's TDM standards to Council in the future to take advantage of new mobility options such as micromobility, mobility-on-demand, and shared transportation services, major transit projects and bike infrastructure improvements, and urban infill projects in San Jose. In addition, the updated TDM standards to be proposed for later Council consideration will be aligned with the City, region, and state's shared focus on addressing climate change and air quality, including galvanizing efforts to reduce vehicle travel (vehicle miles traveled, or VMT.) These updates are anticipated in the Fall of 2021.

ANALYSIS

A study session agenda accompanies this memo. The format of the session will include a panel representing a diverse group of stakeholders (including academics, local developers, community-based organizations and City staff) to discuss the topics of TDM. The session will take place in the City Council Chambers and will allow for virtual participation and in-person participation if authorized by the August meeting date. The Mayor, Council members and participants will be provided with background information to help frame the conversation. The format will allow for initial presentations by a number of members of the study group panel, followed by questions and informal dialogue. This is an informational meeting and no action by the Council is requested at the Study Session.
