


The Delta variant of concern remains highly transmissible and dominant.


The Mu variant of interest is being watched closely – it appears to be more infectious but less transmissible.








### What Has Changed?


- As of September 2021, the City of San José has reached a 92.5% vaccination rate
- Through direct partnerships with health care providers, the City continues to increase mobile vaccination sites that will serve our most vulnerable populations


### **What is Driving Change?**

- An initial increase in cases and risk due to the Delta variant
- Monitor and plan for booster shots for those eligible and eventually the general public

- COVID case rate appears to have peaked and continue to trend downward
- Continue focused and tailored education, information, and outreach methods and strategies including stakeholder outreach and the utilization of Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) systems to reach our most vulnerable populations
- Continue supporting the County:
  - Hyper-focused locations for additional vaccination clinics to serve high-priority census tracts

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


## City Response | WEA Works!

## City Response Deep Dive | Hybrid Work, Facilities, and Resources

### What Has Changed?

- Delayed bringing back additional employees to the worksite until November 1<sup>st</sup>
- Adopted and implemented a City-owned facility Vaccination Ordinance effective September 20<sup>th</sup>

### What is Driving Change?

 Increased cases and risk due to the Delta variant; therefore, need to prioritize safety of employees and the community

- The EOC moved the Activation up from Level 4—Monitoring to Level 3, as the Delta variant continued to impact our area
- Lack of available equipment and staffing to run hybrid meetings, commissions, committees and boards

## City Response Deep Dive | Eviction + Rental Relief

### What Has Changed?

- State eviction moratorium, under AB 832, ends September 30, 2021. Tenants must pay full rent beginning October 1.
- New state law requirements under AB 832 begin October 1; provide additional protection through March 2022.

### What is Driving Change?

 State preemption in AB 832 prevents the City or County from taking further action to protect tenants from eviction until April 1, 2022.

- Two eviction prevention help centers opened (City Hall + Franklin McKinley School District)
- Over 5,700 rental assistance applications received in the local program and 7,200 to the State program
- Outreach
  - 70+ events and rental assistance pop-ups;
  - Paid media campaign in Spanish and Vietnamese outlets
  - Pop-up event with Superior Court
  - Postcards to tenants receiving eviction notice
  - Partnership with landlords of rent stabilized units, outreach to tenants with rental arrears

## City Response Deep Dive | Budget + Advocacy

### What Has Changed?

- CA released draft guidelines for financial assistance for water/electric bill arrearages
- Community + Economic Recovery Budget recommended adjustments going to City Council November 2, 2021
- White House COVID-19 Action Plan released

### What is Driving Change?

 Delta variant driving increases in positive cases at national and global level

- State Legislative Session Ended
  - No vaccine mandate bills moved forward
    - AB 455 (Wicks) or AB 1102 (Low)
  - No Eviction Moratorium Extensions
  - Temporary Brown Act Relief
    - City and Councilmembers submitted letters to State advocating for immunocompromised persons; no amendments accepted
    - AB 361 (Rivas) allows remote meetings during emergency declaration – urgency clause (signed by Governor)
- Federal Government Action Expected on Implementation of the White House Path Out of the Pandemic Action Plan
