City Manager, Jennifer Maguire announced that the City of San Jose's Clean Energy Department, in partnership with Silicon Valley Clean Energy, was recently awarded \$6 million of \$12 million of a charging and fueling infrastructure grant from the Federal Highway Administration to install electric vehicle or EV charging stations in underserved communities throughout the county of Santa Clara. This project will install 237 EV charging ports in San Jose and neighboring cities within the Silicon Valley. The ports will be installed at 12 City owned libraries, community centers, and parks.

<u>Public Comment</u>: Angel Aliano (SVCN) and Juritzi (SIREN) provided public testimony regarding the item.

Councilmember David Cohen spoke to the importance of community safety regarding fire protection. He suggested adding something into the Cities legislative priorities to articulate that. Such as having partnerships with the county, state, and federal government on funding for fire suppression, support for fire prevention, particularly in the urban wildlife interface zones in the City.

<u>Motion</u>: Councilmember David Cohen moved approval of the staff recommendation. *Including the following additional language regarding fire prevention and suppression: Seeking state support for fire prevention and suppression in our city, particularly on urban wildlife interface zones.* Collaborate with the county and state to ensure hillsides *are prepared. Seek funding for vegetation control.* Councilmember Peter Ortiz seconded the motion. <u>Substitute Motion</u>: Councilmember Bien Doan moved approval of his blue memorandum, dated, January 14, 2025. The Substitute Motion failed for a lack of seconder.
