
History of St. James Park


1848: St. James Park established as a 7.6-acre space in Downtown San José.

1848-1990s: Site of significant civic events, including speeches from presidential candidates.

1990s-2000s: Increased social challenges led to reduced community use.

2000s-Present Day: Residents do not actively use St. James Park outside of specifically planned activation efforts.





St. James Park Revitalization Strategy

Approved by City Council in 2015

- Establish a sustainable funding model for park maintenance and activation.
- Develop a strong public-private partnership for ongoing stewardship.
- Transform the park into a safe, vibrant, and welcoming space.
- Coordinate efforts with the Levitt Pavilion project to boost community impact.
 - Levitt Pavilion is an important piece of the park's revitalization strategy.

St. James Park Master Plan (Capital Vision)

Began in 2017, approved by City Council in 2020

Why?

- To implement a revitalization strategy
- Challenges: aging infrastructure, lack of activation
- Goal: create a safe and vibrant urban park for all ages and abilities

Key Park Features:

- Levitt Pavilion
- Enhanced green space and play areas
- Public art and historic preservation
- Safety and accessibility improvements



Project Timeline and Key Milestones

2013: City Council approved exploring partnership with Levitt Foundation for a pavilion.

2015: City Council approved St. James Revitalization Strategy.

2016: City Council authorized support for Levitt Pavilion and moving forward with EIR.

2018: 25% design plans completed.

2020: City Council certified EIR and approved the St. James Park Master Plan.

2023: 65% design plans completed (delayed due to the pandemic).

2024: City Council approved an amendment with CMG to get 100% design plans.



Current: 90% design plans in review.

2025: (TODAY) City Council asked to approve Tri-Party Agreement.

2026: 100% design plans expected to be finalized by Q1 2026.



San José Levitt Pavilion

What is a Levitt Pavilion?

- National nonprofit model for free, high-quality outdoor concerts
- Success in other cities (examples: Los Angeles, Arlington, Denver, Bethlehem)

Why does it matter for San José?

- Brings new cultural and economic benefits
- Increases park use and activation new amenity
- Advances equity and access through free live music



Tri-Party Agreement

Key Partners

National Levitt Foundation

- Established in 1963 to support arts, culture, and education.
- Funds and supports free outdoor music venues across the U.S.

Levitt Pavilion San José (FLPSJ)

- Local nonprofit formed to bring a Levitt Pavilion to St. James Park.
 - Raise funds for construction
 - Support pavilion operations
 - Provide free public concerts



Building Community Through Music

- National network of outdoor venues and concert sites
- Underused public spaces -> thriving community destinations
- Significant social impact and economic impact
- Consistent programming
- High-caliber entertainment featuring array of music genres
- Shared prosperity through lawn activation
- Levitt model is long-term funding
- Ongoing support resources, trainings, peer learning





















Friends of Levitt Pavilion San José Concert Series Fundraising 2022-2024

Tri-Party Agreement Highlights

Approval unlocks critical project funding.

Funding and Fundraising:

- ~ \$20M total cost, built as a Public Works project, Phase 1 of Master Plan.
 - \$15M from City developer fees dedicated to this project.
- FLPSJ will raise at least \$5M for construction.
- Levitt Foundation pledged \$1.1M for operations and programming over first five years.
- Rare project with significant partner funding.

Operations and Community Impact:

- Shared operations and maintenance through 2041.
- FLPSJ manages venue for an initial 5-year term, with up to three 5-year extensions.
- 50+ free concerts annually, enhancing Downtown vibrancy.
- FLPSJ will make the venue available for community use beyond Levitt events.
