Closed Session Report

City Attorney, Nora Frimann announced that the City Council unanimously approved during today's Closed Session, the joining of the Amicus Brief that is also being filed by the Giffords Law Center and the Brady Center to prevent gun violence, regarding the City of Chicago v. Westfourth Sports Inc, Case No. 1-23-1908. It will be coming to Open Session next week on March 5, 2024, regarding the appeal of the decision against the City of Chicago that brought an action against a licensed gun business that was not following federal protocols to determine whether or not gun purchases were being made as straw purchases. The City of Chicago was able to link gun sales of this store in Indiana to gun violence in Chicago. The City of San José has its own Ordinance and efforts to control straw purchases and has a similar interest to the City of Chicago. Therefore, the City of San José is recommending that City Council join the Amicus Brief.
