

Program Outcomes

68% of parents/caregivers said their child had a positive relationship with SJ Recreation Preschool Teachers

35% of parents/caregivers said their child was more actively engaged in healthy recreation activities because of their participation in SJ Recreation Preschool

57% of parents/caregivers said they felt SJ Recreation Preschool helped prepare their child to do better in school


Program Outcomes


ADULT LITERACY & ESL




