Please enter my comments into the public record for the May 27 Rules Committee meeting:

I'm a San Jose resident, and I urge the Council to refer the Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) charter amendment to the November 2026 ballot so voters can decide.

RCV would save millions of dollars because the "instant runoff" feature makes special runoff elections unnecessary. For example, if the county had used RCV, we could've expressed our preferences between Neysa Fligor and Rishi Kumar on the same ballot as all the other candidates, eliminating the need to pay for an additional runoff election.

RCV would increase voter representation. Votes for Assessor plummeted from 467,964 in November to only 219,510 in the runoff. The runoff lost the majority of the votes. In addition to being expensive, special runoff elections tend to have low turnout and poor voter representation. Using RCV in the Assessor race would have more than doubled voter participation in the final decision.

RCV allows voters to more accurately express true preferences. Right now, many voters are being pressured to not vote for Matt Mahan in the governor race, for example, because polls suggest that such

a vote would be "wasted". RCV would've let people vote for Matt Mahan without taking their vote away from other candidates with similar policy positions.

We are San Jose. We are hard-working problem solvers. We are not afraid of improvement. RCV would fix many of the problems that we see with our current elections.

Please give us, the voters of San Jose, the chance to choose RCV.

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Hi San Jose City Council Rules and Open Government Committee Members and Mayor Mahan,

As CEO/Founder of Global Majority Consulting, I am writing to share my strong support to give San José voters the choice to authorize Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) as an option for filling City Council vacancies. I urge you to refer RCV to the voters on the November 2026 ballot.

As you all are aware, special elections to fill vacancies are incredibly costly and yield a very little in return on investment due to low voter turnout. Under current law, when a candidate does not win a majority outright, San José must hold a separate runoff, doubling the administrative cost and leaving residents without representation for months. According to data compiled by the City Clerk and analyzed by SPUR, the cost of the recent District 3 special election totaled approximately \$4 million. The primary round was estimated at \$2 million, and the final runoff cost an additional \$2 million. Despite that massive expenditure, out of District 3's 48,000 registered voters, [only 8,321](#) actually cast a ballot. The millions spent on this single special election cycle could have instead funded critical community services, such as street repaving, expanded library and park hours, homelessness response, or public safety staffing. With at least one likely Council vacancy on the horizon in 2027, this is no longer a hypothetical expense.

Implementing RCV is another way to help reduce San José's budget deficit. We can avoid costly runoff rounds altogether, saving taxpayer dollars while ensuring that winning candidates earn true majority support in a single, decisive election. Most importantly, this ballot measure does not mandate a one-size-fits-all method; rather, it adds another powerful method to the Council's existing toolkit. Voter approval gives our City the opportunity to choose the most fiscally responsible and practical choice for each specific vacancy: appointment, the existing two-round runoff, or a single-round RCV election. The Council would have additional flexibility to exercise when making their decision.


Furthermore, RCV also improves equity and participation in special elections. Eliminating additional election rounds reduces barriers for working families, seniors, and other underrepresented voters who may struggle to turn out to the poll's multiple times in a few short months. RCV also incentivizes candidates to appeal to a broader electorate, resulting in more collaborative campaigns and outcomes that better reflect the collective will of the community.

RCV has been successfully implemented in dozens of jurisdictions across the Bay Area and the entire country, proving to be easy for voters to navigate regardless of age, race, income level, or language spoken. Santa Clara County's Registrar of Voters currently has the technological capability to implement RCV, making it both practical and fiscally responsible.

By giving voters, the option of RCV for vacancy elections, San José can run efficient special elections, safeguard millions of taxpayer dollars, and reinvest those funds directly into essential public services. Dear Honorable Mayor Mahan and Members of the City Council,

On behalf of the Latina Coalition of Silicon Valley (LCSV), **I write to express our strong support for placing the proposed Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) charter amendment for City Council vacancies before San José voters on the November 2026 ballot.**

LCSV has supported Ranked Choice Voting since the City Council considered it in 2021 because we believe it has the potential to increase voter participation, reduce barriers to engagement, and create a more accessible democratic process for underrepresented communities.

As someone who personally participated in San José's recent special election process, I can also speak from firsthand experience about how expensive and time-consuming runoff elections can be for both candidates and voters. Extending special elections across multiple rounds often leads to voter fatigue and significantly lower participation. Consolidating elections into a single process through RCV would help increase engagement while reducing costs for taxpayers.

The 2025 District 3 special election demonstrated the financial impact clearly, costing millions of dollars across two election rounds. At a time when San José faces critical needs related to housing, public safety, homelessness, parks, and neighborhood services, we should be exploring fiscally responsible election models that maintain voter choice while reducing unnecessary public expense.

Importantly, this proposal simply gives voters the option to authorize RCV as an additional tool for future vacancy elections. It expands flexibility for the City without mandating a single approach.

We respectfully urge the Rules Committee and City Council to allow San José voters the opportunity to decide this question in November 2026.

Statement from the Executive Board of the Silicon Valley Young Democrats

RE: SVYD stands in support of Ranked Choice Voting for Vacancies on the City Council

Members of the Rules and Open Government Committee, please approve the memorandum by Councilmembers Cohen, Kamei, Mulcahy, and Tordillos to allow for the use of a Ranked Choice Voting system in special elections for vacancies of the Mayor or Councilmembers.

As discussed in the memorandum, the use of a Ranked Choice Voting system allows for the City to meaningfully reduce the budget impact of special elections. Such a system would shorten lengthy periods wherein residents find themselves unrepresented or represented by unelected appointees instead of a community member of their choice.

Voter familiarity relating to Ranked Choice Voting has risen substantially since the Council's most recent discussion of the policy. An increasing number of jurisdictions across the United States have begun to implement the system including the City and County of San Francisco as well as the Cities of Berkeley, Oakland, and San Leandro in Alameda County. High-profile races utilizing Ranked Choice Voting like that of the 2026 New York City Mayoral election have also supported broader awareness of the system.

Further, there is data to suggest that Ranked Choice Voting results in outcomes that are more representative of the full population's preferences.¹ The discrepancy in voter turnout between Primary and Runoff elections is well recognized, doubly so in off-cycle special elections.² Ranked Choice Voting offers a method of avoiding this concern by allowing candidates and voters to identify and target a single election day for attention and turnout.

For the abovementioned reasons, the Executive Board of the Silicon Valley Young Democrats respectfully request the approval of the memorandum by Councilmembers Cohen, Kamei, Mulcahy, and Tordillos and ask that the City Council strongly consider the implementation of Ranked Choice Voting for special elections.
