3.3 Board of Fair Campaign and Political Practices Interviews.

- (a) Interview applicants for appointments to the Board of Fair Campaign and Political Practices.
- (b) Appoint up to two (2) applicants to a term ending March 1, 2029. PLEASE NOTE: APPROVAL OF THIS ITEM REQUIRES AFFIRMATIVE VOTES OF EIGHT MEMBERS (2/3) OF THE CITY COUNCIL. San José Municipal Code Section 2.08.1610.
- (c) If any vacancies remain, direct the City Clerk to continue recruitment efforts and bring forward additional applicants for consideration.

CEQA: Not a Project, File No. PP17-010, City Organizational and Administrative Activities resulting in no changes to the physical environment. (City Clerk)

City Clerk, Toni Taber spoke to the application and interview process regarding the *two* full-term vacancies for the Board of Fair Campaign and Political Practices.

Tom Pavel and Manu Sharma were given up to two minutes to provide an opening statement. The Council asked the candidates a series of questions, and the two candidates were allotted up to two minutes to respond to each question.

Public Comment: None provided.

Action: Upon motion by Councilmember Carl Salas, seconded by Councilmember George Casey, and carried unanimously, Tom Pavel and Manu Sharma were interviewed and appointed to the Board of Fair Campaign and Political Practices for terms ending March 1, 2029. The City Clerk is directed to continue recruitment efforts and bring forward additional applicants for consideration in the future. (11-0-0)

3.4 Cooperation Agreement Between Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the City of San José for Electric Infrastructure Development.

Adopt a resolution authorizing the City Manager or her designee to:

(a) Negotiate and execute the non-binding Cooperation Agreement between Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the City of San José to support the timely development of electric transmission and distribution infrastructure necessary for economic growth and decarbonization goals in North San José and Downtown San José.

(b) Negotiate a binding Implementation Agreement consistent with the Cooperation Agreement's objectives that the parties expect will be brought before City Council in the spring of 2025.

CEQA: Not a Project, File No. PP17-003, Agreements/Contracts (New or Amended) resulting in no physical changes to the environment. (City Manager) [Deferred from 2/25/2025 - Item 3.4 (25-148)]

Kip Harkness, Deputy City Manager, City Manager's Office; Erica Garaffo, Assistant to the City Manager, City Manager's Office; and Lori Mitchell, Director, Community Energy Department, provided the presentation and responded to questions.

Christina Ramos, Senior Government Affairs for PG&E; and Mike Medeiros, Vice President of South Bay Delivery at PG&E, responded to questions from Council.

Public Comment: Brian Darby, Ruth Merino, and Dennis Randall offered public comment.

Motion: Councilmember David Cohen moved approval of the Cooperation Agreement Between Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the City of San José for Electric Infrastructure Development; including the *two* joint memorandums co-authored by Mayor Matt Mahan, Vice Mayor Pam Foley, Councilmember David Cohen, Councilmember Domingo Candelas, and Councilmember Rosemary Kamei, both dated February 28, 2025. Councilmember Domingo Candelas seconded the motion.

Friendly Amendment: Vice Mayor Pam Foley requested that the March 21, 2025 Study Session include information regarding the LS Power project, how it impacts Coyote Valley, and the potential of co-location for the high voltage terminal with Metcalf. The friendly amendment was accepted by the maker of the motion and seconder.

Action: Upon motion by Councilmember David Cohen, seconded by Councilmember Domingo Candelas, and carried unanimously, **Resolution No. RES2025-36** was adopted, authorizing the City Manager or her designee to: (a) Negotiate and execute the non-binding Cooperation Agreement between Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the City of San José to support the timely development of electric transmission and distribution

infrastructure necessary for economic growth and decarbonization goals in North San José and Downtown San José; and (b) negotiate a binding Implementation Agreement consistent with the Cooperation Agreement's objectives that the parties expect will be brought before City Council in the spring of 2025.

Including acceptance of the joint memorandum co-authored by Mayor Matt Mahan, Vice Mayor Pam Foley, Councilmember David Cohen, Councilmember Domingo Candelas, and Councilmember Rosemary Kamei, dated February 28, 2025, recommending the following:

1. Approve the framework for the cooperative agreement between Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the City of San Jose along with the memo submitted by Mayor Mahan and Councilmembers Cohen, etc.
2. Include information regarding the power needs and the risks around power availability as the 159-acre development in Regional Wastewater Facility owned lands moves forward as part of the study session on San Jose Municipal Power on March 21.
3. In the March 21 study session, provide additional information about the risks and benefits of retaining the option of a Municipal Utility in case the PG&E agreement doesn't result in expected outcomes and how the LS Power timeline of completion in 2028 affects San Jose's flexibility.

Also including acceptance of the joint memorandum co-authored by Mayor Matt Mahan, Vice Mayor Pam Foley, Councilmember Rosemary Kamei, Councilmember David Cohen, and Councilmember Domingo Candelas, dated February 28, 2025, recommending the following:

Accept staff's recommendations and direct the City Manager or her designee to include the following provisions in a binding Implementation Agreement with Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E):

1. A City Energy Development Team funded by PG&E to coordinate and accelerate large load projects, consisting of:
 - a. At least two City positions associated with Economic Development and Oversight
 - b. At least four positions within Public Works funded by upfront fees paid for by and credited back to PG&E as projects progress, ensuring a dedicated team with the right non-personal equipment and ability to focus on large load projects
 - c. Funding for Innovation & Process Improvements, including collaboration with innovation partners to streamline permitting, joint trenching, and digital tracking.
2. Clear and enforceable Objectives and Key Results (OKRs) for large load interconnections, including commitments to meet customer's needs and potential consequences when OKRs aren't met.
3. Flexibility in Design & Delivery that may include changes to PG&E's processes to allow: a. Emerging power solutions for data centers; and b. Streamlined build out of infrastructure (e.g., switching & substations)
4. Potential expansion of PG&E's annual permit with measurable success metrics to track and improve day-to-day service delivery for San José's regular PG&E customers.
5. Commitments to proactively partner with the City to achieve approximately 250MW capacity in the first phase of developing the 159 acres of Regional Wastewater Facility economic lands.
6. Deepened investment in San José-based workforce programs, ensuring local residents benefit from new energy jobs created through this partnership.
7. An immediate surge of resources while PG&E transforms its processes to meet the needs of large load and heartbeat customers. (11-0-0)

6. ENVIRONMENTAL & UTILITY SERVICES

6.1 Amended and Restated Storage Services Agreement with Yellow Pine Solar III for Battery Storage Facility.

Adopt a resolution authorizing the Director of the Energy Department or their designee to:

- (a) Negotiate and execute an amended and restated Storage Services agreement with Yellow Pine Solar III, LLC, a subsidiary of NextEra Energy Resources Development, LLC, to purchase resource adequacy and battery tolling rights associated with a battery storage facility for a maximum term of 23 years beginning 2027 through 2050, in an amount not to exceed \$3,756,000 annually and up to \$78,675,000 in aggregate; and
- (b) If appropriate, negotiate and execute a further agreement or amendment with Yellow Pine Solar III, LLC to increase the volume from the same battery storage facility without otherwise changing the material terms, in an amount not to exceed \$1,503,000 annually and up to \$31,482,000 in aggregate.

CEQA: Not a Project, File No. PP17-003, Agreements/Contracts (New or Amended) resulting in no physical changes to the environment. (Energy)

Zachary Struyk, Acting Director, Community Energy Department; and Paul Innamorato, Deputy Director, Community Energy Department, offered the presentation and responded to questions.

Action: Upon motion by Councilmember Bien Doan, seconded by Vice Mayor Pam Foley, and carried unanimously, **Resolution No. RES2025-37** was adopted, authorizing the Director of the Energy Department or their designee to: (a) Negotiate and execute an amended and restated Storage Services agreement with Yellow Pine Solar III, LLC, a subsidiary of NextEra Energy Resources Development, LLC, to purchase resource adequacy and battery tolling rights associated with a battery storage facility for a maximum term of 23 years beginning 2027 through 2050, in an amount not to exceed \$3,756,000 annually and up to \$78,675,000 in aggregate; and

(b) If appropriate, negotiate and execute a further agreement or amendment with Yellow Pine Solar III, LLC to increase the volume from the same battery storage facility without otherwise changing the material terms, in an amount not to exceed \$1,503,000 annually and up to \$31,482,000 in aggregate. (11-0-0)

8.1 Lease Extension and Improvements Agreement with DBH San José, LLC, for the San José Municipal Stadium.

Adopt a resolution to:

- (a) Authorize the City Manager or her designee to negotiate and execute an amended and restated use, operation, and management agreement between the City of San José and DBH San José, LLC, for the property commonly known as the San José Municipal Stadium located at 588 E. Alma Avenue, San José, California including all ancillary documents necessitated to execute the agreement, for a term of 25 years, at a rent of \$40,000 per year for the duration of the agreement and subject to the terms contained in the staff memorandum;
- (b) Allow for capital improvements to Excite Ballpark funded by DBH San José, LLC, subject to City review as a property owner as well as its permitting processes as a regulatory authority, that are required to bring the stadium in compliance with Major League Baseball's Professional Development League standards, as they may change from time to time;
- (c) Authorize the reimbursement by the City to DBH San José, LLC for expenses incurred to renovate the playing field and dugouts totaling up to \$5,000,000 to be paid annually as \$714,285 for seven years beginning in Fiscal Year 2027-2028 and ending in Fiscal Year 2033-2034; and
- (d) Approve the assignment of all stadium naming rights and collection of associated income to DBH San José, LLC for the duration of the lease.

Action: Upon motion by Councilmember Bien Doan, seconded by Vice Mayor Pam Foley, and carried unanimously, **Resolution No. RES2025-38** was adopted, (a) authorizing the City Manager or her designee to negotiate and execute an amended and restated use, operation, and management agreement between the City of San José and DBH San José, LLC, for the property commonly known as the San José Municipal Stadium located at 588 E.
