We are writing this correspondence to communicate our dissatisfaction with the ways in which City Council Members and staff have interfered with the work of the Charter Review Commission regarding public safety and community oversight. On September 7, 2021, City Manager Jennifer Maguire_issued a memo to the Chair of the Charter Review Commission positing a conflict between the work The Commission is doing and the work of the Reimagining Public Safety Community Advisory Committee (RPSCAC). This memo was issued without the benefit of correspondence from anyone on RPSCAC. On September 13, 2021, many community leaders took time out of their busy schedules to voice their disagreement with the City Manager's assertion and urged the Charter Commission to continue their work on police oversight in their recommendations.

In a memo dated October 27, 2021, <u>a similar memo</u> was issued Vice Mayor Chappie Jones and Councilmember Sergio to the Rules and Open Government Committee, again without contacting anyone on the RPSCAC. We believe that this is a waste of government time and resources and disrespectful to the time that community members have spent on this process. This charter commission has already done the work, held public meetings, developed solid recommendations and received public input. It was not a secret, the council had time to make a clarification in scope, and doing it now makes it appear they are just trying to silence the public and commission on the issue of police accountability. You may be pleased to know that members of the RPSCAC have been following developments of the community oversight discussion within the Commission and have prepared input to present to Commission members. One of the members of our steering committee, Laurie Valdez, has already solicited feedback from families that have been impacted by police violence and have prepared recommendations to submit to commissioners regarding this process.

We are in a crucial moment within this country; An unprecedented opportunity to address the forms of systemic racism and oppression that have plagued people of color for centuries. Any undue outside disruptions to processes led by the community are disrespectful. Disruptions from elected officials and city staff are intolerable. We respectfully request that you stay out of the way of the people's business. Again, the efforts are not duplicative, we are reaching different audiences, and operating on different timelines. If there are procedural rules that are in question, we request that you view them in light of the overwhelming support of community members to get this done.

Dear Charter Review Commission,

On behalf of the undersigned community-based organizations, we are writing to express our support for the deliberations of the City of San José's Charter Review Commission (CRC) on the development of a Community Public Safety Oversight Commission.

We believe if properly designed, such a Commission may serve a constructive role in developing effective solutions to evolving public safety needs over time and may provide critical public oversight that could help communities regain confidence in law enforcement.

Moreover, we believe that a proposal for such a Commission is an appropriate role of the CRC as it works to make recommendations for key structural changes in City governance. Many of our organizations are directly involved in the Re-imagining Public Safety Community Advisory Committee (RiPS), and have been engaged in the conversations with the CRC on this matter. We see the CRC conversations about structural changes as a complementary, timely, and helpful component to the policy and systemic reform focus of RiPS.

While we understand the concerns identified in the letter from City Manager Jennifer McGuire, we were not contacted by her, nor do we support her conclusion that "Conducting two separate public processes on police oversight could potentially confuse members of the public who want to engage on this issue." It is our collective responsibility to ensure community voices are heard and represented in these processes and we commit to maintaining contact and coordination to ensure there is alignment on a final proposal.

We understand that the necessity and opportunity to create effective change will not fall on any one committee's shoulders, but all of us as one community. Our organizations want to create a community where residents feel involved in addressing public safety concerns, and therefore we support the CRC's efforts to develop a proposal for a Community Public Safety Oversight Commission.
