SUBJECT: PUBLIC HEARING ON THE LOCAL HOMELESSNESS ACTION PLAN

AND OUTCOME GOALS FOR THE HOMELESS HOUSING, ASSISTANCE AND PREVENTION PROGRAM APPLICATION

RECOMMENDATION

Conduct a public hearing on the local homelessness action plan and outcome goals for the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program Round 3 grant application to the California Interagency Council on Homelessness.

OUTCOME

The public hearing provides an opportunity for the City Council and the public to comment on the proposed local homelessness action plan and outcome goals, which the City of San José (City) will include in the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program Round 3 (HHAP3) application. The public hearing is required by the state and feedback provided at the hearing will be reflected in the final application, which is due on June 30, 2022. Meeting the deadline enables the City to remain eligible to receive the remainder of the award in the amount of \$23,295,194.14.

BACKGROUND

One billion dollars in California HHAP3 funding has been made available to support a unified response to reduce homelessness across California. City Council approved the City's HHAP3 expenditure plan on April 26, 2022. Also in April, the state released required baseline data to be used to prepare outcome goals for all HHAP3-funded programs. It is required that each city's local homelessness action plan and outcome goals must be heard at a regular meeting of the city's governing body and include the opportunity for public comment before submitting the application to the state by June 30, 2022. This memorandum provides an overview of the local homelessness action plan and outcome goals to be achieved by 2024 required in the City's

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HHAP3 application. An additional \$180 million in bonus funding will be available to cities that meet their funding obligations and achieve outcome goal requirements.

HHAP3 Application Overview

The HHAP3 application is comprehensive and includes four primary sections that must be completed:

- 1. Landscape Analysis of Needs, Demographics, and Funding
- 2. Outcome Goals and Strategies for Achieving those Goals
- 3. Application Narrative Focused on Coordination and Partnerships
- 4. City of San José HHAP3 Funding Plans

Per California law³, the first two sections must be placed on an agenda at a regular meeting of the HHAP3 applicant's governing body to receive public comment before being submitted to the California Interagency Council on Homelessness (Cal ICH). The governing body does not need to take action.

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HHAP3 funds must be invested in programs and services that are Housing First compliant, low barrier, trauma-informed, and culturally responsive. Definitions for these criteria are:

- Housing First: Persons experiencing homelessness should be connected to a permanent home as quickly as possible. Participation in services is not a requirement to qualify or remain in housing. People are required to follow rental agreements and leases, like all tenants.
- Low-Barrier: Programs with minimal barriers for participation that do not establish
 eligibility criteria, such as background checks, beyond what is mandated for health and
 safety regulations.
- Trauma-Informed: An approach to service delivery that recognizes and responds to program participants' previous trauma and provides participants with safety, respect, and choice.
- Culturally Responsive: Services are framed by an understanding of culture and include participants in the design, delivery, and evaluation of services.

HHAP3 grantees must establish a mechanism for people with lived experiences of homelessness to meaningfully inform and shape all levels of planning and implementation. HHAP3 grantees must also demonstrate a commitment to advancing racial and gender equity through identifying and implementing strategies to reduce disparities in the local homeless response system.

Local Homelessness Action Plan

The Housing Department coordinated closely with the County of Santa Clara Office of Supportive Housing to develop a local landscape analysis, which included the current number of people experiencing sheltered and unsheltered homelessness in Santa Clara County, as well as the identification, including demographic and subpopulation data, of individuals and families served by project types in the county. The local homelessness action plan will include the following:

- 1. A local landscape analysis that assesses the current number of people experiencing homelessness and existing programs and funding that address homelessness within the jurisdiction, utilizing any relevant and available data from the Homeless Data Integration System, the homeless point-in-time count, continuum of care housing inventory count, longitudinal systems analysis, as well as any recently conducted local needs assessments. The proposed local (systemwide, which is countywide) landscape analysis of needs and demographics can be viewed in **Attachment A**.
- 2. Identification of the number of individuals and families served, including demographic information and intervention types provided, and demographic subpopulations that are underserved relative to their proportion of individuals experiencing homelessness in the jurisdiction. The proposed local (systemwide, which is countywide) landscape analysis of people being served can be viewed in **Attachment B**.
- 3. Identification of all funds, including state, federal, and local funds, currently being used and budgeted for, providing housing and homelessness-related services to persons experiencing homelessness or at imminent risk of homelessness, how this funding serves

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subpopulations, and what intervention types are funded through these resources. The proposed City landscape analysis of the state, federal, and local funding in Fiscal Year 2022-2023 can be viewed in **Attachment C**.

Outcome Goals

HHAP3 applicants are required to establish outcome goals that prevent and reduce homelessness from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2024, as informed by the findings from the local landscape analysis described above and the base system performance measurements from the 2020 calendar year data in the Homeless Data Integration System. Initial outcome goals should be met no later than June 30, 2024, and outcome goals shall be updated regularly, as funding continues. Cal ICH provided baseline data on April 7, 2022, to assist with the development of the outcome goals. The outcome goals will set definitive metrics, based on the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development's system performance measures.

The Housing Department coordinated closely with the County of Santa Clara Office of Supportive Housing to develop shared systemwide outcome goals, which are not intended to be limited to HHAP3-funded programs. The jointly established outcome goals and metrics can be viewed in **Attachment D** and are summarized below:

While the City and County of Santa Clara had already set significant outcome goals in the regional five-year Community Plan to End Homelessness, Cal ICH requested agencies set very specific targets that may compliment or enhance any goals already in place. The outcome goals

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requested by Cal ICH were established using specific baseline data and quarterly Homeless Data Integration System data will be generated by Cal ICH to monitor progress on outcome goals. The framework for the Community Plan to End Homelessness includes three strategies with dozens of outcome goals that put our region at an advantage when addressing the HHAP3 outcome goal requirements.



The strategies for achieving the Cal ICH outcome goals, specifically for the City, can be viewed in **Attachment E**. These strategies are directly from the Community Plan to End Homelessness with measurements specific to the City:

- 1. Increase the capacity of supportive housing programs for people experiencing homelessness.
 - By 2025, increase the supply of supportive housing by 890 new affordable units and 500 new Rapid Rehousing placements.
- 2. Expand the Homelessness Prevention System by providing targeted financial assistance and supportive services.
 - By 2025, prevent 1,350 households from becoming homeless.
- 3. Double the number of year-round temporary housing beds.
 - By 2024, increase capacity to 1,000 beds.
- 4. Increase street outreach, hygiene services, and transportation options to match the needs of unsheltered residents.
 - By 2024, target 25 large encampments to provide basic needs services and provide direct referrals to shelter and housing to persons living at the encampments.

CONCLUSION

This public hearing provides an opportunity for the City Council and the public to provide comments on the proposed local homelessness action plan and outcome goals to be included in the City's HHAP3 application. The feedback provided by the City Council and the public will

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inform the development of the application. The Housing Department will submit the HHAP3 application by the June 30, 2022 deadline.

EVALUATION AND FOLLOW-UP

Updates on the programs funded by HHAP3 will be provided to City Council in the Housing Department's Annual Report on Homeless Programs that will be scheduled to be heard by the City Council in Spring 2023.

CLIMATE SMART SAN JOSE

The recommendation in this memorandum has no effect on Climate Smart San José energy, water, or mobility goals.

PUBLIC OUTREACH

This item has been posted on the City's Council's Agenda website as a public hearing at the City Council meeting on June 28, 2022.
