Dear Mayor and City Council Members,

Save Our Trails: Connecting Santa Clara County Communities is a California Not-for-Profit Corporation whose mission is "To promote trails in Santa Clara County for the benefit and enjoyment of all."

We, the board of Save Our Trails, advocate for policies that promote and protect the enhancement of San Jose's trails, ensuring they remain accessible and well-maintained for the public. We appreciate

the efforts to clarify the definition of Charter Parks and recognize the importance of providing a consistent approach to designating protected parkland.

We support PRNS' work in defining and interpreting Charter Parks, particularly in including city-owned trails. However, we believe that the proposed limitation of Charter Park status to only a 24 ft wide trail segment is overly restrictive. Many trails traverse areas that should be fully protected, such as the Three Creeks Trail and portions of the Five Wounds Trail. These areas, owned by the City, should be designated as chartered parkland in their entirety, from fence line to fence line, to ensure their long-term preservation.

Furthermore, we urge the City Council to recognize that habitat and open space are integral components of our trail systems. A more comprehensive approach to defining Charter Parks would enhance the environmental and recreational value of these spaces, ensuring that San Jose's residents continue to benefit from well-maintained and protected trails.

We appreciate your commitment to preserving our city's parks and trails and thank you for your consideration of this important issue.
