The City Council, or less than a quorum, may adjourn any regular, special or adjourned meeting to a later date, time and place specified in the order of adjournment. If all members are absent, the City Clerk may declare the meeting adjourned to a stated date, time and place. ## CITY OF SAN JOSE CODE OF CONDUCT FOR PUBLIC MEETINGS IN THE COUNCIL CHAMBERS AND COMMITTEE ROOMS

The Code of Conduct is intended to promote open meetings that welcome debate of public policy issues being discussed by the City Council, their Committees, and City Boards and Commissions in an atmosphere of fairness, courtesy, and respect for differing points of view.

### 1. Public Meeting Decorum:

- (a) Persons in the audience will refrain from behavior which will disrupt the public meeting. This will include making loud noises, clapping, shouting, booing, hissing or engaging in any other activity in a manner that disturbs, disrupts or impedes the orderly conduct of the meeting.
- (b) Persons in the audience will refrain from creating, provoking or participating in any type of disturbance involving unwelcome physical contact.
- (c) Persons in the audience will refrain from using cellular phones and/or pagers while the meeting is in session.
- (d) Appropriate attire, including shoes and shirts are required in the Council Chambers and Committee Rooms at all times.
- (e) Persons in the audience will not place their feet on the seats in front of them.
- (f) No food, drink (other than bottled water with a cap), or chewing gum will be allowed in the Council Chambers and Committee Rooms, except as otherwise pre-approved by City staff.
- (g) All persons entering the Council Chambers and Committee Rooms, including their bags, purses, briefcases and similar belongings, may be subject to search for weapons and other dangerous materials.

### 2. Signs, Objects or Symbolic Material:

- (a) Objects and symbolic materials, such as signs or banners, will be allowed in the Council Chambers and Committee Rooms, with the following restrictions: § No objects will be larger than 2 feet by 3 feet.
  - No sticks, posts, poles or other such items will be attached to the signs or other symbolic materials.
  - The items cannot create a building maintenance problem or a fire or safety hazard.
- (b) Persons with objects and symbolic materials such as signs must remain seated when displaying them and must not raise the items above shoulder level, obstruct the view or passage of other attendees, or otherwise disturb the business of the meeting.
- (c) Objects that are deemed a threat to persons at the meeting or the facility infrastructure are not allowed. City staff is authorized to remove items and/or individuals from the Council Chambers and Committee Rooms if a threat exists or is perceived to exist. Prohibited items include, but are not limited to: firearms (including replicas and antiques), toy guns, explosive material, and ammunition; knives and other edged weapons; illegal drugs and drug paraphernalia; laser pointers, scissors, razors, scalpels, box cutting knives, and other cutting tools; letter openers, corkscrews, can openers with points, knitting needles, and hooks; hairspray, pepper spray, and aerosol containers; tools; glass containers; and large backpacks and suitcases that contain items unrelated to the meeting.

### 3. Addressing the Council, Committee, Board or Commission:

- (a) Persons wishing to speak on an agenda item or during open forum are requested to complete a speaker card and submit the card to the City Clerk or other administrative staff at the meeting.
- (b) Meeting attendees are usually given two (2) minutes to speak on any discussion item and/or during open forum; the total amount of time allocated for public testimony for each public speaker or for an agenda item is in the discretion of the Chair of the meeting and may be limited when appropriate.

- (California Government Code Section 54954.3; Council Policy 0-37) Applicants and appellants in land use matters are usually given more time to speak. Speakers using a translator will be given twice the time allotted to ensure non-English speakers receive the same opportunity to directly address the Council, Committee, Board or Commission.
- (c) Speakers should discuss only the agenda item when called to speak for that item, and only topics related to City business when called to speak during open forum on the agenda.
- (d) Speakers' comments should be addressed to the full body. Requests to engage the Mayor, Council Members, Board Members, Commissioners or Staff in conversation will not be honored. Abusive language is inappropriate.
- (e) Speakers will not bring to the podium any items other than a prepared written statement, writing materials, or objects that have been inspected by security staff.'
- (f) If an individual wishes to submit written information, he or she may give it to the City Clerk or other administrative staff at the meeting.
- (g) Speakers and any other members of the public will not approach the dais at any time without prior consent from the Chair of the meeting.

Failure to comply with this Code of Conduct which will disturb, disrupt or impede the orderly conduct of the meeting may result in removal from the meeting and/or possible arrest.

The recent memo, going around from City Clerk Toni Taber, on ending the Zoom public process, seems a bit sudden. There will only be, 3 more, SJ public meetings, for people to make public comments, on Zoom, about this issue.

This San Jose city govt decision, seems a bit, overbearing, lacking public input, and is not working towards, open, participatory practices, as a local community democracy. Is this item agendized for committee or council.?

It seems, it would be, a more positive, sustainabile, and empathetic community process, by allowing deliberation & public comment, for at least, the next few weeks, before SJ city govt, then better deciding upon, a final verdict.

At Richmond/East Bay protests, this past weekend, to tell the Chevron corporation, to divest and practice ceasefire ideas, for the future of Gaza, Israel, and the mid east - organizers were telling protest participants, to wear masks, as Covid-19, is again simply rising, in the SF Bay Area, at this time

Instead of acting, with the suddenness, and odd reasoning, of state and federal thinking, with Covid 19 issues wouldn't it make more sense, for San Jose local govt, to allow public comment, an open community dialogue, for a few, additional weeks, in February, to respect, the current covid 19, that is going around.

And to also give the public time, to better voice their ideas & feelings, how Zoom has been, an interesting new system, to develop and grow, public meeting dialogue.

I feel, by the end of February, with a bit more public weigh in and understanding, along with the most recent Covid 19 uprising, probably starting to subside, it would then make more sense, as a more full community process, to consider ending, the Zoom public meeting process.

As difficult, as the time was, I think we've become accepting, of some of the innovations, from the era of Covid 19 era—like the ideas of outdoor dining. Ideally, if San Jose city govt, is going to end, Zoom public comment, shouldnt a better reasoning offer, at the end of winter time, and the beginning of Spring or Summer—when Covid 19, and flu like symptoms, become more dormant.

I read the memo from the City Clerk about removing the option for remote participation for public commenting. I'm upset that the city would massively decrease accessibility and the ability for people to engage in our government. Remote, and later hybrid, participation in government meetings was one of the few good things to come out of the pandemic. It is tragic to lose that. And it is tragic to allow a racist fringe (calling in from who knows where) to have any influence in how easily San Jose residents can participate in their

democracy. We should never again allow racists to cause the disfranchisement of members of our community. In this case, hate speech is being used to prevent verbal public comment of community members who do not have the privilege of attending city meetings in person.

The hate speech at meetings has been absolutely vile and awful to listen to, but giving people access to participate in democracy is really important. I commend the City Clerk and staff for all the work they've done to mute the offending callers while still moving through the legitimate callers. And I commend the City Clerk, and everyone on the City Council, for bearing with the vile comments, and allowing this flexible degree of civic engagement and being a beacon for public accessibility to comment during public meetings... until now.

Sending email public comments just isn't a good substitute for being able to comment verbally via phone or computer. There is no guarantee that your email will get read by all councilmembers. Emails sent during the meeting certainly won't get read until it is too late. Therefore your email comments cannot be reactive to what is said during verbal presentations, or what is said during council discussion (for items like Orders of the Day and Consent, where council discussion happens first, and you cannot predict what the council might discuss, or what changes to the agenda they might propose). Some people might not be able to type well (or at all) or be comfortable sending emails. Emotion cannot be conveyed as well through written text.

I respectfully ask that you reconsider making this change to restrict remote participation in meetings. Barring that, I respectfully ask you to consider some or all of the following:

- Allowing remote public comments at meetings at least through February 13th.
- Add items to the February 7th ROGC meeting, and the February 13th Council Meeting, for Council to discuss and adopt this policy. Allow remote public comments at those meetings.
- (If legally allowed) Always allow remote public comment for certain items: Orders of the Day, Consent, and similar items where the Council has discussion before public comment, and items that have verbalonly reports.
- (If legally allowed) Always allow remote public comment for Open Forum.
- Allow citizen advisory committees to continue offering remote public comment.

Finally, I respectfully ask that you not wait until July to reconsider the policy. Instead, I suggest that a task force be formed, as soon as possible, to study the issue of how to restore remote verbal participation at government meetings, in a way that would significantly reduce or eliminate hate speech from getting through (but in an open, auditable, accountable, and not-100% automated way so that legitimate public comments are not suppressed). The task force could consist of the City Clerk's office, IT staff, citizens who have A/V and software/IT experience, citizens (such as non-remote workers; people with disabilities; and disabilities rights advocates) to represent demographics who find it difficult to participate in meetings in-person; and local nonprofits that specialize in issues of open governance, civic engagement, and/or free speech. The Task Force should not contain any tech executives, or anyone else who could benefit financially from the outcome of the task force.

For the tech side of that task force, I would suggest reaching out to <u>Open Source San Jose</u>, a nonprofit and entirely volunteer organization that has already been building tools for increasing civic engagement in San Jose.

The recent memo, going around, from the City Clerks office, on ending the Zoom public process, seems a bit sudden. There will only be, 3 more, SJ public meetings, for people to make public comments, on Zoom, about this issue.

This San Jose city govt decision, seems a bit, overbearing, lacking public input, and is not working towards, open, participatory practices, as a local community democracy. Is this item agendized for committee or council.

It seems, it would be, a more positive, sustainabile, and empathetic community process, by allowing deliberation & public comment, for at least, the next few weeks, before SJ city govt, then better deciding upon, a final verdict.

At Richmond/East Bay protests, this past weekend, to tell the Chevron corporation, to divest & practice ceasefire ideas, for the future of Gaza, Israel, and the mid east, organizers were telling protest participants, to wear masks, as Covid 19, is again simply rising, in the SF Bay Area, at this time.

As there may be, a recent rise, in Covid 19 cases, throughput the state of Ca instead of using the suddenness & odd reasoning, of previous state and federal thinking, with Covid 19 issues wouldn't it make more sense, for San Jose local govt, to allow public comment, an open community dialogue, for a few, additional weeks, in February.

This would respect, the current Covid 19 rise, that may be going around. And to also give the public time, to better voice their ideas & feelings, how Zoom has been, an interesting new system, to develop and grow, public meeting accessibility & dialogue.

I feel, by the end of February, with a bit more public weigh in and understanding, along with the most recent Covid 19 uprising, probably starting to subside, it would then make more sense, as a more full community process, to consider ending, the Zoom public meeting process.

As difficult, as the time was, I think we've become accepting, of some of the innovations, from the Covid 19 era like the ideas of outdoor dining. Ideally, if San Jose city govt, is going to end, Zoom public comment, shouldnt a better reasoning offer, at the end of winter time, and the beginning of Spring or Summer when Covid 19, and flu like symptoms, become more dormant.

Perhaps, we can end Zoom, at the end of June summer break. Or perhaps, at Easter break, in the spring. It would give the people of San Jose, a more appropriate amount of time, to prepare for such a change. And seems a more appropriate end, to an important product & tool, in San Jose, during the difficult Covid 19 era.

People like, Margaret O'Connell, and Tessa Woodsmansey, may be very upset, for Zoom to be taken away. As Zoom meetings, can also be of much help, for older people, to attend public meetings, who are immune compromised. Or for older/disabled people, that have a difficult time, to get to meetings.

We may want to slam the door shut, on the Covid 19 era. But Zoom has been, an interesting, useful tool, that may simply need, a more formal public consideration or send off.

To acknowledge, and to better address, the faults named, about current Zoom use, within the recent SJ city govt memo, about this item instead of, an unceremonious, immediate end to Zoom, decided by only, a small number of persons, within SJ city govt

I hope this letter, can be of help, towards a process, of open, friendly, good community dialogue. And perhaps to offer, a more formal ending to Zoom, in a few weeks, or in a few months.

As the Regional Manager of GSMOL- Golden State Manufactured Home Owners League, representing thousands of Mobile Home Park residents, I have attended these meetings for two decades.

For two decades, I have been the face of Mobilehome Park issues in San Jose.

Because I am unable to attend the 2-8-24 HCDC meeting in person, I will not be able to speak. My voice, and that of other residents and GSMOL officers, will be silenced.

This is not just.

To eliminate our access by zoom or phone because of the actions of a tiny handful of folks who are engaging in hate speech, is unfair and draconian.

The San Jose Spotlight:

"San Jose is nixing virtual public comment at all meetings, sparking concerns around free speech and access to city government.

Starting Tuesday, only residents attending city meetings in person will be able to provide public comment. People watching remotely via Zoom can no longer call in to voice their opinions. Officials say the decision is because a handful of people have abused the virtual tool to spew hate speech."

## Mayor Matt Mahen:

""While I share my colleagues' desire to remove hate speech from our meetings, I don't support eliminating one of the best new tools we have for expanding public participation in our civic life," Mahan told San José Spotlight. "Everyone should have the ability to engage in our civic discourse — single mothers who can't leave their job at 2 p.m., caretakers who spend their days making sure our grandparents are taken care of, neighbors who are immunocompromised and unable to attend in-person events."

I fully concur with Mayor Mahen on both parts of his statement:

- 1) Hate speech is deplorable in any forum but especially in a public forum and particularly in a forum discussion public policy and legislation.
- 2) That said, disenfranchising, online participants by allowing their constitutionally protected speech during an open forum expressly meant for public comment is not the way to protect attendees from offensive speech. Such speech can be terminated relatively quickly via zoom or other online meeting tools. In my opinion, no one is protected from the discomfort of speech they find distressing. Further in my opinion, the public and political harm of suppressing political discussion/debate by disallowing online public comment is far greater than the harm to attendees by the discomfort or offense by brief and curtailed hate speech. (There is a constitution right to free public speech. There is no corresponding right to protection from discomfort or offense.

Please continue to all online comment at all public meetings. Please also provide a moderator to rapidly terminate either the speech or the attendance of any spewing hate speech at such a meeting.

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San Jose City Clerk,

I urge you to take action and ban city authorized travel to Israel. In 2022, the City Council blocked then Mayor Sam Liccardo from traveling to Qatar due to concerns about that country's human rights record, yet said nothing when he made a taxpayer-funded official trip to Israel in 2019. As Israel's extreme violations of human rights grow day by day, I ask that you act consistently and institute a policy ending official City travel to Israel. Today, residents of San Jose are hurting, witnessing families and innocent civilians being killed by Israel in Gaza, the West Bank, and East Jerusalem. Over the past 100+ days, Israel has killed over 27,000 Palestinians, besieged educational, cultural, and medical institutions in Gaza, and committed countless human rights violations against the Palestinian people. According to the United Nations Human Rights Office in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, these violations include the targeted destruction of civilian infrastructure, the intentional deprivation of food, water, and healthcare from the civilian population of Gaza, and the indefinite detention of Gazans without trial.

In 2019, the City Council rejected then Mayor Liccardo's trip to Qatar based on a report by Amnesty International that Qatar had committed human rights abuses. Here is how

Amnesty International described Israel's human rights record before that country began its military invasion of Gaza:

"Israel's continuing oppressive and discriminatory system of governing Palestinians in Israel and the Occupied Palestinian Territories (OPT) constituted a system of apartheid, and Israeli officials committed the crime of apartheid under international law."

The Amnesty International report further noted that Israel has "imposed arbitrary restrictions on freedom of movement and closures that amounted to collective punishment" and employs "torture and other ill-treatment" against Palestinian detainees. These are serious and ongoing human rights abuses that require our City to act consistently and institute a policy against official travel to Israel to avoid lending legitimacy to these unconscionable acts.

We cannot ignore the humanitarian crisis in Gaza. We need to see concrete action from the San Jose City Council to pressure Israel as it carries out a genocide with the U.S.'s financial and diplomatic backing. I ask that you safeguard our city's commitment to human rights just as you did in 2022. Ban city authorized travel to Israel now.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

- 1. Approve the San José State University (SJSU) Investiture Flag Raising Ceremony and Celebration event scheduled on Wednesday, February 21, 2024, as a City Council sponsored Special Event and approve the expenditure of funds; and
- 2. Approve the SJSU Investiture Tower and Rotunda Lighting (February 20 to February 25, 2024) as a City Council sponsored Special Event and approve the expenditure of funds; and
- 3. Approve and accept donations from various individuals, businesses, or community groups to support the event; and
- 4. Place the item on the Tuesday, February 27, 2024, Council Agenda for action.

### **BACKGROUND**

On February 1, 2005, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 72517 which requires Councilmembers to submit a memorandum to the Rules Committee regarding proposed City Council sponsored Special Events and the proposed use of any funds. The SJSU Investiture Flag Raising and Lighting Ceremony will be held on Wednesday, February 21, 2024, in the City Hall Plaza and is sponsored by Mayor Matt Mahan and Councilmember Omar Torres.

This special event will be incorporated into SJSU's Investiture activities to acknowledge Cynthia Teniente-Matson taking the helm of SJSU. The Investiture Flag Raising Ceremony is yet another

opportunity to strengthen the City of San José and SJSU relationship. It symbolizes a significant milestone in the university's history as President Teniente-Matson assumes her role, emphasizing a new era of leadership.

The ceremony fosters community engagement by bringing together university stakeholders, city officials, and residents, and promoting a sense of unity and shared commitment to the region's educational and civic goals. The Investiture Flag Raising serves as a public affirmation of the symbiotic relationship between San José State University and the City of San José, fostering mutual support and collaboration for the benefit of the entire community.

### **ANALYSIS**

The display of the San Jose State University Flag is permitted under Council Policy 2-1, Section C.3 - Flags Displayed in Conjunction with Official Ceremonial Items: "Other flags may be displayed in conjunction with official actions, ceremonial items, or proclamations of the City Council.

To further enhance the celebrations taking place, the City Hall Tower and Rotunda will be lit in blue and yellow and provide an opportunity for students, faculty, and the community to come together to take photos and enjoy the display of San José State University pride. City Council Policy 7-14, City Hall Event Lighting Policy, Sections B.1, B.3 and C.1 allow Rotunda and Tower lighting in conjunction with proclamations for official actions or ceremonial items as approved by City Council, and to commemorate a key achievement, initiative, event or sporting event involving San José State University.

Approval by the City Council of the event will ensure compliance with the Council's prior direction regarding Council Special Events. In observance of existing fundraising disclosure requirements, Mayor Mahan and Councilmember Torres will report any cash or in-kind donations received for the event on their Disclosure of Fundraising Report (DFR-1). Approval of this memorandum will enable the Mayor's Office, Council District 3, city departments and the Office of the City Clerk to proceed with the event. Any cash donations received will be processed pursuant to the City's normal financial and budgetary procedures.

### **BACKGROUND**

Lighting City Hall green will honor and acknowledge the NVIDIA GTC Conference. The conference takes place from March 17 to March 21, 2024, and commemorate the return of the conference to Downtown San Jose for the first time since 2019.

During the GTC conference, approximately 20,000 attendees are expected to descend on Downtown San José. These attendees are expected to contribute to the local economy by patronizing small businesses, booking hotel rooms, and increasing ridership on public transit.

The City of San José is actively spearheading initiatives to expand its artificial intelligence ecosystem and propel Silicon Valley into the future. Through strategic partnerships with tech companies and academic institutions, San José is fostering innovation in AI research and development. This concerted effort underscores the City's commitment to positioning itself as a leading hub for cutting-edge technology, driving economic growth and societal advancement in the region. The NVIDIA GTC Conference is yet another part of this effort to expand San José's AI ecosystem.

This effort to light City Hall serves as a visible and impactful gesture of recognition for the conference, underlining the city's appreciation for the technological advancements and innovation around artificial intelligence showcased by NVIDIA.

The green lighting serves as a symbol of collaboration between the city and NVIDIA, showcasing the mutual commitment to fostering innovation and technological progress.

During the week of NVIDIA's GTC Conference, other buildings throughout San José are expected to be lit up in green, acknowledging NVIDIA's presence in the city. These buildings include but are not limited to: San José Civic, SJC Airport, The Tech Interactive, San Pedro Square Arch, Post Street, 87 Highway Sensing You Art Display.

Adding City Hall to this list of buildings lighting green enhances the conference's visibility, creating a memorable and iconic backdrop that reinforces the city's reputation as the Capital of Silicon Valley during the event.

### **ANALYSIS**

City Council Policy 7-14, City Hall Event Lighting Policy, Sections B.1 and C.1 allows Tower lighting in conjunction with proclamations for official actions or ceremonial items as approved by City Council. It also allows for extended lighting beyond one cycle between sundown and sunrise.

Approval by the City Council of the event will ensure compliance with the Council's prior direction regarding Council Special Events. In observance of existing fundraising disclosure requirements, Mayor Mahan will report any cash or in-kind donations received for the event on their Disclosure of Fundraising Report (DFR-1). Approval of this memorandum will enable the Mayor's Office, City departments and the Office of the City Clerk to proceed with the event. Any cash donations received will be processed pursuant to the City's normal financial and budgetary procedures.
