







How do you identify?




results as of 8/4/22 (570 Responses)

Are you working right now?




From survey results as of 8/4/22 (570 Responses)

Workers' Health, Safety & Rights Committee: Priority Strategies

- 1. Outreach and education on workplace rights
 - Expand the City's role, and
 - Connect with other agencies & community orgs to leverage existing capacity.
- 2. Strengthen workers' rights & safety enforcement tools at City of San Jose
- 3. Provide paid sick leave protections
 - □ COVID-19 paid sick leave provide stability & predictability.
 - Enact permanent local paid sick leave law, looking to models of Oakland, SF, other CA cities.
