










Financing Proceeds - \$682.8 Million






Revenue from Other Agencies - \$642.9 Million

Blending of Technical and Equity Considerations to Develop the CIP


- The technical analysis necessary to identify new or deferred infrastructure rehabilitation needs is increasingly being supplemented by consideration of equity. For example:
 - Rehabilitation of Sanitary Sewer Pipes incorporation of race and income data as a factor to help prioritize the future rehabilitation of deteriorated sanitary sewer pipe, to the extent legally permissible.
 - Local and Neighborhood Pavement Maintenance Program cross-referenced the selected pavement maintenance zones with census tracts designated by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission as "Equity Priority Communities" (EPC). Results confirmed that 287 out of 356 miles (roughly 80%) of local and neighborhood streets designated in EPC areas will be maintained by the end of 2024.
 - Other Traffic Capital Projects Traffic Signal, Safety/Vision Zero, Bike Facilities and Grant projects target resources toward equity areas (next slide).

Traffic Signal, Safety/Vision Zero, Bike Facilities and Grant projects

 Over 50% of Traffic CIP budget allocations for safety-related projects have been made in equity score areas of 8-10. Approximately 32% of projects were implemented in 12% of the City where the combined equity score is 8 or above.
