Re: San Jose Budget Allocation for GRPC Horticulture, Repairs, Programming, & Measurement

Dear Mayor Liccardo, Councilmembers, and City Clerk,

The Guadalupe River Park Conservancy submits this letter for a one-time consideration of \$54,000 allocation in the upcoming City Budget FY 22-23. Funds would support the hiring of a part-time horticulturalist to provide specialized expertise in botanical care in the Guadalupe Gardens, public programming support, promotion and program measurement, and supplies to address both the needs of enhanced horticulture and repair stewardship elements in the Guadalupe Gardens.

Funds would align with a number of priorities in the Mayor's March budget message:

- Battling blight and supporting parks: specialized horticulture care would enhance existing park assets at the Guadalupe Gardens and encourage more park usage. Repairs to fencing, toolshed, and other Gardens structures would enhance the efficacy and experience of our volunteers.
- Health of the urban forest: support would increase the survivability of our Historic Orchard and
 Heritage Rose Garden, which has undergone significant restoration efforts last year. The increase in
 biodiversity, and the challenges of an extended drought, warrant expertise to ensure the Orchard and
 Rose Garden will provide health and environmental benefits for the next generation of San Joseans.
- Community programming: this allocation request would promote park use, volunteerism,
 neighborhood health, and civic pride, in line with stated Budget Message goals around park activation
 and cultural programming. Strengthening connections between residents and our agricultural history
 and natural landscape would uplift the unique civic and natural resources formative to our city.

To maximize the use of funds from this one-time allocation, the scope would also include horticulture-related public programming to build capacity and education around the planting needs in the Gardens, empower neighborhoods to care for their River Park, public promotion, and measurements that track stewardship and program milestones. We thank the Mayor and City Council for your ongoing leadership and we look forward to your consideration of our request, which we believe aligns with many existing City and community priorities.







RE: Support for REAL Budget Justice Recommendations for FY23 City of San Jose Budget

As a member of the REAL coalition, Catholic Charities supports the REAL budget recommendations.

We appreciate the City's efforts to move some of these priorities forward. At the same time, more needs to be done to promote racial equity and inclusion.

Based on our long and close working relationship with the City to address many of the challenges facing our residents, Catholic Charities encourage the City Council to put more resources into several priority areas:

1. **Food Distribution:** The pandemic is not over. Economic hardship and income inequality are rising due to increased inflation. Our staff and volunteers are seeing increased numbers of families seeking food at our parish drive-through distribution sites throughout San Jose. While we are grateful for the opportunity to seek additional funding for one more quarter to assist in distribution, the need continues to rise. We appreciate the City reaching out to the County for joint talks, but to date the County has not committed to fund food distribution other than through the shelter system and the normal senior nutrition system. Meanwhile tens of thousands of families in San Jose are still going hungry. The nonprofit sector can't solve this by ourselves. We need your help. The City has been a valuable and essential partner in the solution and until the County is willing and able to step up, our neighbors will still need the City's help.

Recommendation: Double the investment of ARPA funds in food distribution while continuing to coordinate, advocate and negotiate with the County to do its part to address hunger in our community.

2. **BEST Prevention and Intervention:** The most humane, efficient and cost-effective way to address criminal justice is to prevent the causes of youth violence and involvement in the system. The City has a proven model of an alternative to the increased cost of policing with the Mayor Gang Prevention Taskforce and the BEST programs. As a BEST partner Catholic Charities stands ready to partner with the City to develop new approaches that are trauma-informed.

Recommendation: Build on those successes by investing more resources in what is working in the BEST programs and scale them. Develop trauma-informed models and mental health supports that have been proven to work in

other communities.

3. Promatoras and Civic Engagement: Catholic Charities is encouraged by the proposed funding of a Promatora pilot in San Jose. One powerful way to engage local neighborhood members in creating a just and compassionate community is by training community members in peer support to help families navigate services and address their needs. Catholic Charities has found that families trust trained neighborhood members to connect them to the community resources they need. It not only improves family wellbeing, but also the health of the community.

Recommendation: Fully fund the Promatora Pilot.

Thank you for your consideration of our recommendations and thank you for your dedicated service to our community of San Jose.

Re: FY23 Budget – Request for 4% Adjustment for Nonprofit Partner Sustainability

Dear Mayor and Members of the City Council:

I write on behalf of Silicon Valley Council of Nonprofits and our over 200 nonprofit and ally members. We ask that you include in the City's Fiscal Year 2023 budget:

- an increase of 4% for renewal contracts with your nonprofit partners, and
- adopt the recommendations made by the nonprofit Racial Equity Action Leadership (REAL) coalition.

As the City's Budget Director points out in MBA#28, "CBOs have been invaluable partners in identifying service needs and extending the City's reach for the delivery of pivotal services in challenging times." We hope it goes without saying that not only were the City's nonprofit partners key responders to the pandemic, but also that the City will continue to rely on nonprofits to be efficient and effective service deliverers and trusted messengers between the City and the community.

We are grateful for the analysis in MBA#28 and the acknowledgement of nonprofits' cost needs, and it is important to point out that nonprofits (and we all) are facing unusually exorbitant increases in operations costs as well as significant challenges in hiring and retention in the current job market; all while, we struggle to return to a new normal in this liminal time of partial recovery and ongoing pandemic response.



Even in good times—because of funder practices that limit overhead and sometimes even require match requirements—nonprofit sustainability is often just an oasis on the horizon. Organizations that build healthy infrastructure—IT and data systems; financial systems; fund development processes; strategic plans; staff capacity building; and safe, efficient, and accessible physical spaces—are more likely to succeed than those that do not. The cost of not succeeding is high:

The effects of such limited overhead investment are felt far beyond the office: nonfunctioning computers cannot track program outcomes and show what is working and what is not; poorly trained staff cannot deliver quality services to beneficiaries. (*The Nonprofit Starvation Cycle*, A. Goggins & D. Howard, Stanford Social Innovation Review (2009).)

Nonprofit instability contributes to community instability. And the converse is true. The organizational health of the same nonprofits that were incredibly nimble during the pandemic and stepped up to respond to community needs will be needed if we are to "build back better."

Over the last two years, the City of San José stepped up to fund nonprofits, funded technical assistance and training for nonprofits; purchased PPE and other essentials for nonprofits, recruited volunteers for nonprofits, and disseminated information to nonprofits. For example, dozens of organizations were provided with rescue funding by the City of San José through the Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF) Nonprofit Grant Program, focused on services to communities in designated zip codes. The City's Local Assistance Center set up a CBO liaison function that worked with SVCN to provide information to nonprofits about its services and plans and to serve as a conduit for input to the City's response to COVID. Whereas some of this support was specific to the pandemic, we would like to see the City continue to support nonprofits much in the way that it regularly supports other small businesses.

We ask that the City continue to be a good partner to nonprofits by addressing the cost increases that we experience year over year—which are particularly pressing this year with a CPI of nearly 5% over the last year—by providing a cost of doing business increase in this year's budget and future budgets as a best



practice. This should include General Fund contracts and pass-through contracts. By way of benchmarking, this year, Santa Clara County provided a minimum of 4% cost of doing business adjustment for its nonprofit partners.

Lastly, we hope the City Council will strongly consider the requests made by members of the Race Equity Action Leadership (REAL) coalition.



We urge the Councilmembers to consider the urgency of the need and the long-term beneficial impact to the community and approve these requests. Without immediate and urgent changes like these, the animals and our community are going to suffer for years to come.

I am the founder of Bay Area Cats (<u>bayareacats.org</u>) and we help community members fix cats in their neighborhood. In the last year, we have received 178 requests for a total of 1213 cats from San Jose, Cupertino and Milpitas. These people and cats can't be helped without trap-neuter-return (TNR) programs and spay/neuter. These 1200 cats will quickly multiply, and one cat reproduces to be ~50 in a year.

Please understand that without spay/neuter, we are going to have kittens and cats breeding uncontrollably on our streets for years to come. All the kittens who are now at the shelter, have mothers that are not fixed because they were turned away due to no spay/neuter. These mothers are pregnant or have given birth already. We can't fix this problem and end the suffering without making TNR an utmost priority.

The San Jose Animal Care center is in dire need of funding. I am writing you today as an animal advocate.

Please consider the additional Concilmembers Mahan's memo (#83 & #91) and Councilmember Davis' memo (#31). I strongly support Councilmember Mahan's proposals for San Jose's Animal Care Center, to help restore operations and staffing to the effective levels needed by the community. I also support the proposals by Mahan and Davis regarding funding for spay/neuter services by partnering nonprofits such as St. Francis Animal Protection Society.

Vets, vet staff, adoption staff, and volunteers are worn thin with the amount of animals coming into the shelter. While other shelters take in animals from one or possibly two cities, the San Jose Animal Care Center is currently taking in animals from six different cities in the bay area. They are the ones doing the most for our bay area citizens and animals, and need the most help.

I believe that these dogs and cats at the San Jose shelter are not being given the proper care, training, and enrichment that they deserve. Dogs and cats do not adapt to shelter environments easily, as much as we'd hope them to do. The least we can offer are walks, and love, and training. They need enrichment that I believe they are not receiving at this time.

SJACC is in desperate need of help. They are in desperate need of funding. They are in desperate need of support-from you. I ask you to strongly consider giving your help through funding at this time.

Re: City of San José Fiscal Year 2023 Budget -- REAL Coalition Proposals

Dear Mayor Liccardo and City Council:

This letter was prepared by the Silicon Valley Council of Nonprofits, in consultation with the Race Equity Action Leadership (REAL) coalition.

REAL Coalition

The REAL community of nonprofit leaders and allies has been meeting since June 2020 to use our positional power to advocate for a more racially-just and equitable society; to establish a peer network of leaders committed to fighting white supremacy and systemic racism in ourselves and our institutions; and to hold each other accountable to the promises we made in the Nonprofit Racial Equity Pledge. The REAL coalition is broadly representative of the nonprofit community including human and community services, behavioral health and health, arts and culture, domestic violence, older adults, food distribution, education, environmental, farming, legal, disability rights, LGTBQ rights, ethnic, immigrant rights, housing and homelessness, criminal justice reform, urban planning, and intermediary organizations, and others. Over 125 organizations have participated in the REAL coalition.

Please consider this letter signed by 41 nonprofit and ally members of the REAL coalition in your deliberations regarding the City of San Jose's Fiscal Year 2023 Budget.

Background

In June 2021, over 90 nonprofits REAL leaders conveyed a letter to the Mayor and City Council requesting that the City of San José use its American Rescue Plan (ARP) funding to advance the recovery of those who have been hardest hit by the pandemic; the proposal was called an Equity Investment Agenda for Recovery. In October 2021, these same leaders submitted a list of more specific, detailed proposals for Council and the Mayor's consideration. In March 2022, REAL leaders submitted feedback to the Mayor's March Budget message. We incorporate these proposals and feedback by reference in this letter.

Additionally, we would like to emphasize the following priorities that the undersigned would like to see reflected in the FY23 budget:

Alternatives to Policing

While we appreciate the earmark for \$800,000 for proposals that may come out of the Reimagining Public Safety (RIPS) process. Please consider these additional recommendations:

- The City should make a financial commitment to staffing infrastructure that
 will further implementation of the proposals and use the earmarked funds
 for this purpose. The City should also commit support to the Trusted
 Response Urgent Support Team (TRUST) in partnership with the County of
 Santa Clara to ensure more individuals and families have access to mental
 health and crisis services without involving law enforcement.
- It would serve the City well to internalize the fact that trauma-informed prevention and intervention is more effective and less expensive than down-stream reactions like policing and incarceration. The City should be resourcing prevention and intervention to at least the same degree as it is resourcing policing.

• On a related note, the current strategic planning process for the Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force (MGPTF), that will likely wrap in the middle of this budget year, is an opportunity. The City Council should consider earmarking funds that could be deployed to move forward the next three years of work; PRNS staff and the cross-sector planning group is working hard to incorporate community voices into what the MGPTF will look like moving forward and how best the City should support and work with youth to prevent violence and system involvement. The City's BEST prevention and intervention framework is currently one of the City's most effective but under-resourced alternatives to policing and is potentially a strong place for future such investment, consistent with RIPS proposals.

Racial Equity

• Consistent with REAL's ARP proposals around racial equity as well as wealth-building, we are eager to see the City make a meaningful investment in the African/African Ancestry community. REAL's October 2021 proposals relating to ARP expenditures recommended an initiative that included funding for a displacement study, a UBI/reparations program, youth development, place-making, government employment pipeline, small business grants and support, and homeownership strategies. Specifically, there is a current opportunity for the City to support funding for planning and development of the African American Cultural Center. REAL supports the Black Leadership Kitchen Cabinet's request for funding for the Center.

Recovery Needs

We appreciate the allocation of \$2 million to the community Recovery Task
Force, although we're concerned that \$2 million won't stretch very far.
Creating a body of community leaders to think through what the residents
of San José need to recover from the harms of the pandemic was a priority
for the REAL members who signed our ARP funding proposals. Ensuring that
this brain trust of dedicated servant leaders has access to resources—to

potentially launch new initiatives or to improve what we're already doing—will make this process all the more meaningful.

Wealth-building

• As we have previously pointed out, there is increasing evidence of the success of cash assistance programs in lifting families and individuals out of poverty. A number of organizations in REAL are already taking leaderships roles in UBI/GBI pilots. There is a current opportunity to leverage potential support from the state to launch a large, regional GBI pilot that is being shepherded by the Lighthouse collective at Joint Venture Silicon Valley. We urge the City to invest in this initiative.

Additional REAL Priorities

• As we have said from the start, the City should use ARP (and other funds) to continue to support those who have been most impacted by the pandemic. Accordingly, we appreciate the continued support for providing groceries and meals to our community, including those who are unhoused, people with disabilities, those who are ineligible for CalFresh, and older adults. We continue to believe that ongoing support for food distribution should be a joint County/Cities obligation and that the City should also address food system resiliency, as it has addressed other resiliency and preparedness needs, as reflected in the Mayor's March Budget Message.

Civic Engagement/Centering Community Voices

 We are pleased to see \$500,000 allocated for a promotora program. This is a good start in creating structures that can bring community voices to City decision-making tables. We encourage additional investment in creating a City-wide civic engagement strategy that centers the voices of lived experience. Thank you so much for your consideration of this feedback and we thank you for your work and dedication to our community. Please do not hesitate to reach out with questions or concerns.



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
