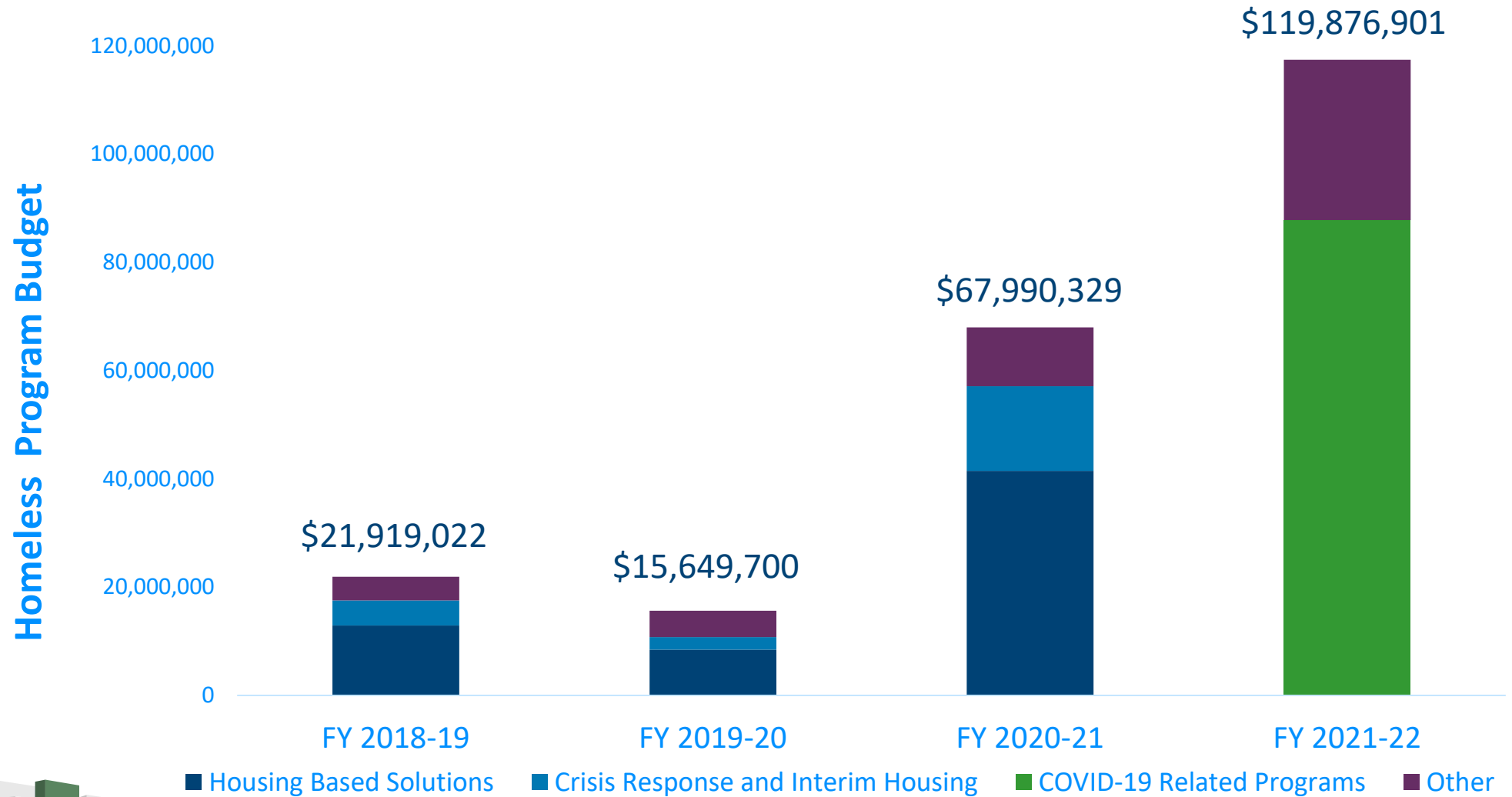

# Fiscal Year 2022 – 2023

- **\$37,659,000** in funding for 24 programs serving San José's **most vulnerable**
  - **\$9,405,000** for 12 programs serving homeless families and children
- **14** community partners

<b>Emergency Housing Expansion</b> (Citywide Roadmap)	Increase production and achieve operational sustainability of emergency housing	30% of people successfully exit into permanent housing from any type of temporary housing
<b>Encampment Services</b> (Citywide Roadmap)	Create safe and healthy living conditions for people who are unhoused	38% of people living in SOAR sites successfully exit into temporary or permanent housing
<b>Shelter</b> (Continuum of Care Systemwide Performance Benchmarks)	Successful Placement into Permanent Housing	30% of people in emergency shelter will exit to permanent housing
<b>Rapid Rehousing</b> (Continuum of Care Systemwide Performance Benchmarks)	Successful Placement into or Retention of Permanent Housing	80% of people in Rapid Rehousing programs will attain or maintain permanent housing
<b>Street Outreach</b> (Continuum of Care Systemwide Performance Benchmarks)	Successful Placement into Permanent, Temporary, Foster Care, Long-term Care, etc.	38% of people will exit to temporary or permanent placements through street outreach
<b>Employment</b> (Continuum of Care Systemwide Performance Benchmarks)	Income Growth for Households in Rapid Rehousing	45% of people in Rapid Rehousing programs will increase their total income at exit





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
