Citywide Residential Anti-Displacement Strategy

- **▲** Top 4 Recommendations:
 - 1. Equitable COVID-19 Response and Recovery
 - 2. Anti-Displacement and Neighborhood Tenant Preferences
 - 3. Community Opportunity to Purchase Program (COPA)
 - Underrepresented Communities on Commissions, including Lived Experience with Homelessness seat on Housing & Community Development Commission (Commission)





COVID-19 Response: State Emergency Rental Assistance

- ◆ For San José, as of September 17, 2022:
 - \$128.1M paid on behalf of 10,702 households
 - \$107.8M (84%) to 9,152 Very and Extremely Low-Income households*
 - 49.3% of applicants are Latino/a/x-headed households
 - 62.6% are Extremely Low-Income households*

*Very Low-Income (VLI) households earn 31-50% of Area Median Income Extremely Low-Income households earn ≤ 30% of Area Median Income





Legal Challenge to CA COVID-19 Rental Assistance Program

- ▲ Lawsuit against state Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) brought in June 2022
- ▲ Legal Aid and Tenant Advocacy Orgs allege HCD ran program in an "opaque and discriminatory manner"
- ♠ Also alleged many denials were unjust, tenants provided with inadequate information and no meaningful way to appeal
- ♠ Preliminary Injunction issued against HCD mid-July barring the program from issuing final denial decisions





Eviction Diversion and Settlement Program

- Temporary, targeted program to intervene in evictions of tenants based on non-payment of rent
- ♠ Currently administered by City and Sacred Heart Community Services
- ◆ Voluntary program for tenants at imminent risk of eviction and who meet other criteria
- ▲ Federal monies used to fund program must be obligated by September 30, 2022



Unlawful Detainer Court Clinic

- ▲ Launched weekly holistic unlawful detainer clinic at the Superior Court Courthouse on June 1st
- ♠ Clinic Partners: Court, County, Self-Help Center, Sacred Heart, Destination: Home and the Project Sentinel Court Mediation Program
- ◆ Open to tenants and landlords in UD (eviction) actions
- ♠ Assistance with court filings or legal referrals, access to mediation services and other resources to help resolve the Court action, avoid judgment and work towards stable housing
- Goal to have Clinic be a permanent part of the UD process





Eviction Diversion Efforts

- ♠ 4th Quarter FY 2021-22 results of staff work at Eviction Prevention Help
 Centers and at Court:
 - 625 households assisted in-person completing or appealing rent relief applications; 2,241 assisted by phone
 - 239 households received legal services (10 in-person, 229 by phone)
 - 18 outreach events and community engagements
 - at least 60 households assisted at Court
- ♠ Eviction Diversion and Settlement Program
 - 68 cases since May launch
 - \$295K paid out or promised to property owners so far, stabilizing 19 tenant households

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
