- Top 4 Recommendations
 - 1. Equitable COVID-19 Response and Recovery
 - 2. Anti-Displacement and Neighborhood Tenant Preferences
 - 3. Community Opportunity to Purchase Program (COPA) Removed per April 25, 2023 City Council Action
 - 4. Underrepresented Communities on Commissions, including Lived Experience with Homelessness seat on Housing & Community Development Commission

COVID-19 Response

▲ Accomplishments

- \$160.8M paid on behalf of 13,697 households
- COVID-19 eviction protections phased out
- CA COVID-19 Rent Relief Program closed to new applications
- Launched Eviction Diversion program to bridge the rent relief gap


Next steps

- Eviction Help Centers
- Eviction Diversion Program (for active court cases)
- Weekly Collaborative Courthouse Clinic
- Right to Counsel and alternative models study

Tenant Preferences that Mitigate Displacement

Accomplishments

- SB 649 (Cortese) signed into law, took effect January 1, 2023
- FUSE fellow on board

■ Next steps

- Complete disparate impact analysis
- Finalize proposed programs design Anti-Displacement, Neighborhood
- Conduct stakeholder outreach
 - Implementers Affordable housing property managers and owners
 - Users Tenant organizations
- Seek approvals (Commission, CED Committee, Council) in fall 2023

Next steps

- Continue ongoing support for Lived Experience Commissioners
- Assess further support needed in early 2024
- Share lessons learned with City Manager's and City Clerk's Offices





Remaining Recommendations from the Anti-Displacement Strategies

Accomplishments

- Recommendation #1: COVID-19 Recovery, Eviction Relief → complete
- Recommendation #8: Develop YIGBY land use → parameters defined, final Council approval pending (PBCE)

Next steps

- Workplans for the following recommendations:
 - Increase housing quality and prevent code-related displacement (#6)
 - Create a Preservation Report and Policy (#7)
 - Optimize Urban Villages for affordable housing and antidisplacement (#9)



High Priority Anti-Displacement Preservation Work Already Identified

- Issue nonprofit capacity building funds for new affordable housing preservation partners – including Community Land Trusts and new local Community Development Corporations
- Issue acquisition/rehabilitation subsidies and target properties in neighborhoods with high risk of displacement (subject to funding availability)
- Gauge funder interest to develop a Preservation Investment Fund





Preservation Next Steps

- ♠ Research, analyze and confirm priority preservation work for near- and medium-term
- Integrate work into revised Anti-Displacement Strategy
- Report to CED Committee in late 2023 annually
- Integrate near-term preservation programs into the Housing Catalyst Work Plan, report to City Council





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
