Hello again,

I sent the email below the separator on May 18 in support of using Measure E funds for quick-build interim housing to bring our unhoused neighbors indoors sooner rather than later. They cannot wait for permanent housing to be built. They will continue to deteriorate and some will die on the streets. Don't sacrifice the good for the perfect. Measure E funds for the humane treatment of our unhoused neighbors.

Allow me to share with you one more story of another unhoused neighbor in my neighborhood. Daniel 41-years-old. He has the mental acuity of a 6-year-old. You cannot converse with him. That's because he's been addicted to illegal drugs for 25 years. His family tried to help. Repeatedly. They have given up. He mostly lives on the street – when he's not in jail. He prefers jail in the winter when it's cold so he breaks the law so that he can be taken indoors. A couple of months ago, he was in the porch of the Five Wounds Rectory Office and would not leave when asked. His erratic behavior led the pastor's assistant to call the police. When they arrived, Daniel kicked one of the officers in the leg. It took six officers to hold him down to hook him up. He is small but had superhuman strength from whatever he was high on. He was locked up for a day or two before being dumped back on the street to make his way back to Little Portugal. Daniel doesn't just need a roof over his head. He needs rehabilitative services. Intensive rehabilitation. Even with help, will he ever be able to function in society? He deserves a chance. He needs to be compelled to receive the services that could afford him a chance. And a roof over his head -- now.

Hello, my name is Davide Vieira and I am a resident of East San Jose in favor of quick-build housing as a way to house our unhoused neighbors sooner rather than much later. I also volunteer at St. Isabel's Kitchen at Five Wounds Church.

Please allow me to introduce you to some of our unhoused neighbors who live on the streets near Five Wounds Church.

Bruno has lived on the street in our neighborhood for many years. He was bitten on his foot by a spider this year. The bite got infected. He couldn't wear a shoe, so he limped around with just a sock on his injured foot. That's because someone stole his bike. He went to Valley Medical Center and spent 12 hours there to no avail. They sent him away after having lost him for three hours when he was in plain sight all along. He had no money to get back to the neighborhood. A kind nurse got him an Uber. Bruno's foot only got worse. He went to Regional Medical Center and was admitted for three days. He was treated and recovered. He could have lost his foot.

Angel is a senior who has lived in her pickup in the neighborhood for years ever since she was injured on the job and couldn't work anymore. She has serious health problems. This past winter, she was admitted to the local OWL. That was great because she could at least get some sleep indoors out of the cold. But the OWLs closed at the end of April. Angel is back on the street in her pickup. What's unique about Angel is that, even though she has nothing but her pickup and monthly SSI, she goes around collecting leftover food from local nutrition programs in the neighborhood to distribute at the encampments in the area. She collects and passes out clothes and toiletries too. That's how she spends her days. She's been waiting for a housing voucher for years. But she still holds out hope. When she gets a house, she plans on sharing it with others.

Anthony looks like Moses. He is dirty and disheveled. I cannot even venture a guess as to the last time he bathed. His legs are dry and chapped. He is constantly scratching his skin. But he is as polite a person as you will ever meet. It's obvious that he has mental health issues. But all he needs and all he asks for is the food that he receives at our soup kitchen.

Carlos is bipolar. His parents have a TRO against him because he can become aggressive and even violent when he's not on his medication. Which is often. He has caused serious property damage in the area over the years. He stalked a female employee at a local community center. Another TRO. When he is on his medication, though, he is approachable and considerate. Someone stole his shoes while he slept recently. He was walking the neighborhood in stocking feet. I saw him with new shoes the next day.

Michael rides his bike. He rides his bike everywhere. All day. We give him a couple of lunches because that's all he will eat all day. He has bad teeth, so he can't eat fruit like apples or pears.

These are our neighbors. They deserve shelter. If that's what quick-build housing can provide them, then that's a start. They have already lived on the street for far too long. Don't let them die there. The perfect is the enemy of the good. Please use Measure E funds to more quickly house our unhoused neighbors.

Dear Honorable Mayor and City Council:

The Community & Companion Animal Project ("CCAP") supports the Mayor and City Manager's proposed Fiscal Year 2023-2024 budget increases for Animal Services and appreciates how the budget reflects the recognition of challenges facing Animal Services and responds to the concerns voiced over the past year.

Converting the temporary overstrength position of Supervisor Shelter Operations to permanent status, and adding more full-time positions, a night shift and a dedicated senior resource for facilities repair and maintenance will improve the shelter's ability to provide greatly needed support to our community and increase live outcomes for the animals.

The night shift is a critical addition, as it will enable the shelter to provide care for underage kittens, the highest volume and most vulnerable animals at the shelter. The allocation of monies for support of adoption and rescue outcomes is also essential. It will allow more animals in need to move to organizations that can provide the specialized care necessary for such animals to be placed for adoption.

While the proposed budget for Animal Services represents substantial progress, we believe the following matters are still in need of additional funding and attention.

• The data produced and used by the shelter to direct its operations, measure its performance and predict future community needs is incomplete and/or inaccurate. The shelter needs a dedicated IT Business Analyst to review and develop systems and

processes for the collection, use, and transparency of data, including the collection of critical missing data integral to development of a long-term strategy, such as the number of animals turned away at intake and the reasons admission was denied.

- Expanding and staffing the Trap, Neuter & Return (TNR) program for community cats is mandatory. During May the shelter accepted 743 kittens and as of June 6th was holding 340 kittens, representing the majority of the animals in the shelter. The shelter, rescue organizations, and fosters are at or over capacity and animals are being turned away. Friendly community kittens are being found throughout San Jose; there is no place for them to go and it is still the beginning of "kitten season". This problem results directly from the reduction in TNR services in 2019 by Animal Services and its termination of all TNR services in May 2022. It has recently reinstated TNR, but on a very limited basis, relying heavily on rescues and volunteers to transport cats outside of the county for spay and neuter services. Since the reduction of TNR service began, the cities served by Animal Services have been experiencing an increasing cat population that will continue to grow exponentially unless a robust TNR program is established and maintained.
- Reinstating low cost spay/neuter and vaccination services is also essential. Pet overpopulation results in unwanted animals that are abandoned or otherwise become strays. Unvaccinated animals spread disease. The economy and the shortage of vets has made it difficult for many people to neuter and vaccinate their pets. The reinstatement of low cost spay and neuter services will greatly reduce animal suffering. It will also reduce the number of animals brought to the shelter, which will increase the live release rate. Fewer animals in the shelter increases an animal's probability of adoption and the shelter's ability to house the animal. This effect was recognized by John Cicirelli when he was Assistant Director of Public Works. The following is his quote from a May 31, 2016, article in sanjoseinside entitled "San Jose Councilman Proposes No-Kill Shelter":

"One of the most significant contributors to our high save rate has been preventing animals from being born through low cost and free spay-neuter services. We have learned that this is one of the best ways to invest in our community and achieve our goal of reducing the number of stray animals."

 The shelter needs a full time animal behaviorist. A dedicated position would enable the shelter to structure enrichment, socialization, and behavior modification programs to offset the stressful conditions of the shelter environment on the animals. An animal behaviorist would also provide post-adoption support and owner-retention programs, increasing positive outcomes. The challenges facing the shelter will not be resolved overnight. The proposed budget increases represent positive forward movement, but much more needs to be done. Animal Services requires oversight at the City Council level, and your participation in making sure Animal Services meets the current and future needs of the community is vital.

We urge you to approve the proposed increases for Animal Services.

This email recommends a partial version of MBA 46, specifically a 1.0 FTE trap-neuter-release coordinator. This position would prevent the burn-out and resignation of key volunteers who are carrying this workload on top of their regular employment.

Background

In March 2023, Council directed staff to estimate the cost of a comprehensive trap-neuter release program that utilized volunteers and additional shelter veterinarians and health techs to address the growing cat population crisis. The staff memo highlighted that hiring veterinarians is difficult and that the shelter presently provides about 50 to 56 spay/neuters each week: 20 are contracted at Nine Lives in Redwood City, with the remaining 30 to 36 at the shelter spread over three days. Volunteers with the ad hoc cat trapping community provide all other services: trapping, transport, coordination of 56 weekly appointments, services to and supplies for trap training to property owners or colony managers, as well as sheltering of cats pre- and post-surgery prior to release at their home colonies. From time to time, the shelter drives cats to Redwood City for their morning appointments, while volunteers bring them back to San Jose where they are reclaimed by their colony managers, stored in private homes, and then returned to field the next day.

The coordination of these appointments and transports fall to two volunteers. Appointments require substantial schedule scrambling because cats are not trapped until the night before their appointment since there is nowhere to shelter the trapped cats for multiple days. Sometimes the targeted cat does not cooperate resulting in an empty surgery spot which must be filled by reaching out to everyone in the volunteer network to get another cat trapped by another volunteer going out to the field later that same night. After trapping volunteers store the cats in their homes or garages and transport is arranged to the San Jose shelter parking lot where Redwood City-bound cats are moved into either the shelter's van or private passenger cars. Sometimes City staff is available to drive the city's van; sometimes multiple private drivers take the animals in passenger cars – a total of 140 miles per driver (\$90 with IRS standard deduction). At least once, the Assistant Director of the Shelter made the trip to Redwood City. Four days per week, the volunteer coordinators work TNR as a split shift from about 4 to 11 pm and 7 am to 8 am to make certain every precious spay/neuter appointment is filled and trappers have all the tools they need. These experienced volunteer coordinators also have regular salaried employment. This level of volunteer effort is not sustainable. A paid coordinator is needed.

While there are several non-profit rescues that work with TNR cats, none is in a financial position to hire a coordinator. They have exhausted their current resources and financial

reserves paying market rate for spay/neuter surgeries the shelter did not provide since March 2020 and the start of COVID.

Why Trap Neuter Release Is Important

Large colonies of community cats reside all over the city. Some are fed, while others search dumpsters or hunt in our parks and creeks. With COVID, spay/neuter stopped and the populations exploded. Cats will breed up to three times per year. Many pet cats have been abandoned and they joined the colonies.

San Jose led the way for many cities with TNR because it is the best way to keep cat colony populations small. Residents have communicated they don't approve of mass killings and researchers have learned that after a mass killing, new strays re-populate the area and the cycle repeats. The best way to keep colonies small is with active feeder and colony management and spay/neuter TNR services.

Without spay/neuter and active management cat colonies get too large from unfettered reproduction. The colony outgrows its food source and begins to expand to adjacent properties where they may not be welcome. When this happens, trapping and release (TNR) is not typically implemented by the property manager. Some try to shoo them away. Apartment managers have threatened casual feeders with eviction if they feed any cats. Some trap the cats and abandon them elsewhere. Some resort to lethal means B/B or pellet guns or poison. Poison placed in the colony cat food bowl is also available for pet cats, dogs and children. The poison concentrates in animals that eat it, making them sick, but not dead. Sickly animals are easy for coyotes and birds of prey to catch. This makes the coyotes sick and more susceptible to diseases like mange and likely to seek human food rather than hunt. Birds of prey are exquisitely sensitive to the poison and just die. Frustrated property owners with enormous colonies are offered no help from animal control. They depend exclusively on the volunteer cat trappers and their volunteer coordinators and drivers.

As the cat populations continue to grow with this inadequate response to the problem, the colonies' size and limited food sources make then more susceptible to the highly contagious fatal pan-leukopenia virus and the leptospirosis bacteria which ultimately impairs cat kidney function. There are some parts of San Jose where the pan-leukopenia is endemic in the soil due to the large colonies and it is not uncommon for unvaccinated pet kittens and cats to succumb from exposure to the soil and droppings from roaming colony cats. With the declining access to veterinary services, more and more pet owners are foregoing vaccinations and their boosters. The pan-leukopenia virus does not affect humans but does affect some other mammals in the feline family, suggesting bob-cats, mountain lions and the Happy Hollow Jaguar are at risk from explosive colony expansion. In contrast, leptospirosis is spread by contact with concentrations of urine and seems to thrive in wet areas like streams and marshes (or well-watered turf). The bacteria affect long-term kidney function in cats, but can cause serious multiple organ failure in dogs. The disease can jump to humans. Large cat colonies, especially near water sources, can increase likelihood of transmission. The shelter does back of the envelope mapping of locations

that pan-leukopenia is located but no concentrated effort is made to reduce colony reproduction in these areas, so the diseases are spread through expansion of the colonies into larger and larger areas.

From my perspective as a park advocate, I can see where small colonies of three or four cats have exploded to 30 cats and kittens in our parks and along our trails. The kittens are great little "chicken nuggets" for raccoons and coyotes. Dead cats are sometimes found in the parks or along the trails, but happily residents don't usually find them. Most often, they are hauled away by predators for snacking in their den. We don't need large populations of raccoons and coyotes in our parks nor do we need large populations of cats in our parks playing havoc with the birds. Coyotes have been spotted all over the city and observed killing cats; the coyotes use the creeks to travel and are commonly seen traveling along the trails unless the trail is encamped. When cat colonies are allowed to grow without any attempt to limit reproduction, more coyotes are attracted to this easy food source.

SUMMARY

With each intact male and fertile female cat, the park system, trails, and natural eco-system are at risk from the exponential population growth due to their breeding. While the City is providing 56 spay/neuter appointments per week, they acknowledge that's a fraction of what was available pre-COOVID and a fraction of what is needed. Volunteers are trapping, mapping, working directly with the community and coordinating to leverage the patchwork of services providing support to the City. The patchwork system is leading to burn-out of the volunteer coordinators and transporters. It is unsustainable. **Please approve a 1.0 FTE TNR coordinator.**

Today at 4:00pm my neighborhood once again is covered in smoke, a fire from the brushes located in the encampments off the freeway. This happens numerous times in District 7.











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Dear City Clerk:

I am a San Jose resident and am writing to state my strong support for the increases for Animal Services in the Mayor and City Manager's proposed Fiscal Year 2023-2024 budget. I appreciate how these increases recognize the challenges faced by Animal Services and respond to concerns voiced by the community over the past year.

Converting the temporary overstrength position of Supervisor Shelter Operations to permanent status, and adding more full-time positions, a night shift and a dedicated senior resource for facilities repair and maintenance will improve the shelter's ability to provide greatly needed support to our community and increase live outcomes for the animals.

The night shift is a critical addition, as it will enable the shelter to provide care for underage kittens, the highest volume and most vulnerable animals at the shelter. The allocation of monies for support of adoption and rescue outcomes is also essential. It will allow more animals in need to move to organizations that can provide the specialized care necessary for such animals to be placed for adoption.

While the proposed budget for Animal Services represents substantial progress, I believe the following matters are still in need of additional funding and attention.

The data produced and used by the shelter to direct its operations, measure its performance and predict future community needs is incomplete and/or inaccurate. The shelter needs a dedicated IT Business Analyst to review and develop systems and processes for the collection, use, and transparency of data, including the collection of critical missing data integral to development of a long-term strategy, such as the number of animals turned away at intake and the reasons admission was denied.

Expanding and staffing the Trap, Neuter & Return (TNR) program for community cats is mandatory. During May the shelter accepted 743 kittens and as of June 6th was holding 340 kittens, representing the majority of the animals in the shelter. The shelter, rescue organizations, and fosters are at or over capacity and animals are being turned away. Friendly community kittens are being found throughout San Jose; there is no place for them to go and it is still the beginning of "kitten season". This problem results directly from the reduction in TNR services in 2019 by Animal Services and its termination of all TNR

services in May 2022. It has recently reinstated TNR, but on a very limited basis, relying heavily on rescues and volunteers to transport cats outside of the county for spay and neuter services. Since the reduction of TNR service began, the cities served by Animal Services have been experiencing an increasing cat population that will continue to grow exponentially unless a robust TNR program is established and maintained.

Reinstating low cost spay/neuter and vaccination services is also essential. Pet overpopulation results in unwanted animals that are abandoned or otherwise become strays. Unvaccinated animals spread disease. The economy and the shortage of vets has made it difficult for many people to neuter and vaccinate their pets. The reinstatement of low cost spay and neuter services will greatly reduce animal suffering. It will also reduce the number of animals brought to the shelter, which will increase the live release rate. Fewer animals in the shelter increases an animal's probability of adoption and the shelter's ability to house the animal. This effect was recognized by John Cicirelli when he was Assistant Director of Public Works. The following is his quote from a May 31, 2016, article in sanjoseinside entitled "San Jose Councilman Proposes No-Kill Shelter":

"One of the most significant contributors to our high save rate has been preventing animals from being born through low cost and free spay-neuter services. We have learned that this is one of the best ways to invest in our community and achieve our goal of reducing the number of stray animals."

The shelter needs a full time animal behaviorist. A dedicated position would enable the shelter to structure enrichment, socialization, behavior modification and offset the stressful conditions of the shelter environment on the animals. An animal behaviorist would also provide post-adoption support and owner-retention programs, increasing positive outcomes.

The challenges facing the shelter will not be resolved overnight. The proposed budget increases represent positive forward movement, but much more needs to be done. The importance of shelter should not negate the importance of affordable housing. Without available and low barrier affordable housing, temporary shelter becomes nothing more than a way to hide away the individuals and families who are in need of housing. It does not provide a long term solution.

Everyone is owed safe and secure housing by their community, without any caveats. I urge the city council to vote for the plan proposed by Davis, Torres, and Ortiz, which finds funding for shelter while maintaining the previous fund allocations for affordable housing.
