


## San José Unemployment Rates

## **Positive News**

- 2.7 million more jobs
- Strong GDP growth rate
- National Unemployment rate
   below "full employment" rate (5%)
- 3.2% inflation





Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Program Highlights

- Served 1,228 young adults and adult clients
- 80% Black Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC), 82% reside in low-resource census tracts (LRCTs) and 60% unstably housed
- Co-locate with agencies in LRCTs
- Job fairs in LRCTs/San José City College
- In-person outreach in LRCTs



## **Highlights**

- 83% of WIOA placements in high-wage, high-growth occupations
- Information and Communication Technology, Healthcare, Finance, Advanced Manufacturing, and Construction/Trades
- Network and software engineers, accountants, system and data base administrators, manufacturing engineers & technicians, business analysts, project managers, etc.

## San José Works Highlights

- 829 clients placed 375 paid work experience plus 454 with unsubsidized employment
- 100% are related to high-wage, high-growth occupations
- 82% referred by Youth Empowerment Alliance
  Alliance/Department of Parks Recreation and
  Neighborhood Services (PRNS) and/or live in
  priority neighborhoods
- 93% retention, 80% BIPOC, 87% reside in LRCTs





## San José Works Highlights





- Mentorship Program 75 clients mentored with Intuit, Bank of America, Tata, 7 City Departments, etc.
- Youth Ambassador Program 15 returning students supported training and job coaching
- Entrepreneurship Program Includes capstone projects with local small businesses
- 92 graduating seniors 32 employed, 45 in postsecondary education, 15 in career services

## **Looking Ahead**

- Expand AI partnership with Roku
- Pilot to create additional service access
- Co-location with partners (e.g. East Side Union High School District)
- Support City's Homeless Implementation Plan:

Pilots at Bill Wilson Center, San José Conservation Corps, Hunger at Home, and Metro Ed

Pathways to Self-Sufficiency

- Explore partnership to serve currently in custody young adults
- Conduct eight community-based job fairs
- Expand co-location with agencies in LRCTs
