PUBLIC NOTICE INTENT TO ADOPT A MITIGATED NEGATIVE DECLARATION CITY OF SAN JOSÉ, CALIFORNIA

Sewer Interceptor Phase VIA Public Project, File No. PP10-160. Approval of the sewer project would result in the installation of new 72- and 84-inch diameter reinforced concrete pipe (RCP) sewer interceptor pipeline and new junction box within the existing public right-of-way of North 4th Street, Commercial Street and under Highway 101 to connect to the existing sewer structures in Zanker Road. The proposed pipeline will run from the intersection of N. Fifth Street and Commercial Street, westerly along Commercial Street to its intersection with N. Fourth Street, then along N. Fourth Street N. northward and under Highway 101, for an approximate length of 4,900 LF. The project is located in Council Districts: 3 and 4.

California State Law requires the City of San José to conduct environmental review for all pending projects. Environmental review examines the nature and extent of any potentially significant adverse effects on the environment that could occur if a project is approved and implemented. Based on an initial study, the Director of Planning, Building & Code Enforcement has concluded that the project described above will not have a significant effect on the environment. The project location does contain a listed toxic site.

The purpose of this notice is to inform the public of the San Jose City Council's intent to adopt a Mitigated Negative Declaration for the proposed project on or after June 13, 2011, and to provide an opportunity for public comments on the draft Mitigated Negative Declaration. The public review period for this draft Mitigated Negative Declaration begins on **May 13, 2011** and ends on **June 13, 2011**. Adoption of a Negative Declaration does not constitute approval of the proposed project. The decision to approve or deny the project described above will be made separately as required by City Ordinance.



DRAFT MITIGATED NEGATIVE DECLARATION

The Director of Planning, Building and Code Enforcement has reviewed the proposed project described below to determine whether it could have a significant effect on the environment as a result of project completion. "Significant effect on the environment" means a substantial, or potentially substantial, adverse change in any of the physical conditions within the area affected by the project including land, air, water, minerals, flora, fauna, ambient noise, and objects of historic or aesthetic significance.

NAME OF PROJECT: Sewer Interceptor Phase VIA Public Project

PROJECT FILE NUMBER: PP10-160

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: Approval of the Sewer Interceptor Phase VIA Public Project will allow the installation of new 72- and 84-inch diameter reinforced concrete pipe (RCP) sewer interceptor pipeline and new junction box within the existing public right-of-way of North 4th Street, Commercial Street and under Highway 101 to connect to the existing sewer structures in Zanker Road.

PROJECT LOCATION & ASSESSORS PARCEL NO.: From the intersection of N. Fifth Street and Commercial Street, westerly along Commercial Street to its intersection with N. Fourth Street, then along N. Fourth Street N. northward and under Highway 101, for an approximate length of 4,900 LF.

COUNCIL DISTRICT: 3 and 4

FINDING: The Director of Planning, Building & Code Enforcement finds the project described above will not have a significant effect on the environment in that the attached initial study identifies one or more potentially significant effects on the environment for which the project applicant, before public release of the draft Mitigated Negative Declaration, has made or agrees to make project revisions that clearly mitigate the effects to a less than significant level.

MITIGATION MEASURES INCLUDED IN THE PROJECT TO REDUCE POTENTIALLY SIGNIFICANT EFFECTS TO A LESS THAN SIGNIFICANT LEVEL

- I. **AESTHETICS.** The project will not result in significant aesthetic impacts, therefore no mitigation is required.
- II. AGRICULTURE AND FOREST RESOURCES. The project will not have a significant impact on agriculture or forest resources, therefore no mitigation is required.
- **III. AIR QUALITY.** The project will not have significant impacts on air quality; however, constructiongenerated dust, if uncontrolled, could result in a significant air quality impact.
 - A. The proposed project includes the following mitigation measures that can reduce construction impacts to a less than significant level. BAAQMD has prepared a list of feasible construction dust control measures that can reduce construction impacts to a level that is less than significant. The following construction practices shall be implemented during construction of the proposed project.

- 1. All exposed surfaces (e.g. parking areas, staging areas, soil piles, graded areas, and unpaved access roads) shall be watered two times per day.
- 2. All haul trucks transporting soil, sand, or other loose material offsite shall be covered.
- 3. All visible mud or dirt track-out onto adjacent public roads shall be removed using wet power vacuum street sweepers at least once per day. The use of dry power sweeping is prohibited.
- 4. Sweep daily (with water sweepers) all paved access roads, parking areas and staging areas at construction sites.
- 5. All vehicle speeds on unpaved roads shall be limited to 15 mph.
- 6. All roadways, driveways, and sidewalks to be paved shall be completed as soon as possible.
- 7. Building pads shall be laid as soon as possible after grading unless seeding or soil binders are used.
- 8. Idling times shall be minimized either by shutting equipment off when not in use or reducing the maximum idling time to five minutes (as required by the California airborne toxics control measure Title 13, Section 2485 of California Code Regulations [CCR]). Clear signage shall be provided for construction workers at all access points.
- 9. All construction equipment shall be maintained and properly tuned in accordance with manufacturer's specifications. All equipment shall be checked by a certified mechanic and determined to be running in proper condition prior to operation.
- 10. All excavation, grading, and/or demolition activities shall be suspended when average wind speeds exceed 20 mph.
- 11. Vegetative ground cover (e.g. fast-germinating native grass seed) shall be planted in disturbed areas as soon as possible and watered appropriately until vegetation is established.
- 12. The simultaneous occurrence of excavation, grading, and ground-disturbing construction activities on the same area at any one time shall be limited. Activities shall be phased to reduce the amount of disturbed surfaces at any one time.
- 13. All trucks and equipment, including their tires, shall be washed off prior to leaving the site.
- 14. Sandbags or other erosion control measures shall be installed to prevent silt runoff to public roadways from sites with a slope greater than one percent.
- 15. Pave, apply water at least three times daily, or apply (non-toxic) soil stabilizers on all unpaved access roads, parking areas and staging areas at construction sites.
- 16. Hydroseed or apply (non-toxic) soil stabilizers to inactive construction areas (previously graded areas inactive for ten days or more).
- 17. Post a publicly visible sign with the telephone number and person to contact at the Lead Agency regarding dust complaints. This person shall respond and take corrective action within 48 hours. The Air District's phone number shall also be visible to ensure compliance with applicable regulations.
- IV. BIOLOGICAL RESOURCES. The project could result in significant environmental impacts to biological resources.
 - A. Construction disturbance of or near nests can result in the incidental loss of fertile eggs or nestlings, or otherwise lead to nest abandonment. Disturbance that causes abandonment and/or loss of reproductive effort is considered a taking by the CDFG. The project proposes to implement the following mitigation measures to reduce the impact to nesting birds to a less than significant level.

- 1. Pre-construction/Pre-disturbance Surveys. If construction is to occur during the breeding season (February 1 through August 31), pre-construction surveys shall be conducted by a qualified ornithologist no more than 7 days prior to the initiation of construction in any given area. Pre-construction surveys will identify active nests of species protected by the MBTA and State Code.
- 2. Avoid the Nesting Season. If possible, potential nesting substrates (e.g., bushes, trees, grass, buildings, burrows) to be removed by the project should be removed between September 1 and January 31, to avoid the nesting season.
- 3. Buffer Zones. If an active nest is found and is greater than half completed, a qualified ornithologist, in consultation with the CDFG, will determine the extent of a construction-free buffer zone to be established around the nest, until nesting is complete. Typical buffer widths are 250 feet for a nesting raptor and 100 feet for other species. The establishment of construction-free buffer zones will ensure that no active nests of species protected by the MBTA and California Fish and Game Code will be disturbed by construction.
- V. CULTURAL RESOURCES. The project will not have a significant impact on cultural resources, therefore no mitigation is required.
- VI. GEOLOGY AND SOILS. The project will not have a significant impact on due to geology and soils, therefore no mitigation is required.
- VII. GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS. The project will not result in a significant climate change impact due to the emission of greenhouse gases, therefore no mitigation is required.
- VIII. HAZARDS AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS. The project could result in significant hazards and hazardous materials impacts.
 - A. The project will include the following mitigation measures upon completion of final design and prior to project construction, which would reduce the risks of potential soil or groundwater contamination or residual pesticides and/or herbicides contamination at the site to future construction workers to a less than significant level.
 - Prior to project development, a soil and groundwater investigation shall be completed to determine if residual contaminants of concern (COCs: petroleum hydrocarbons, volatile organic compounds, metals, or agricultural chemicals) are present in the proposed excavated soil. The analytical results will be compared against applicable environmental screening levels for construction workers and hazardous waste criteria. Based on these results, the investigation will provide recommendations regarding soil handling procedures and disposal of affected soils in the project area including the potential reuse of affected soil during project development. Impacted soil deemed for removal shall be disposed of at a licensed facility. If contaminants are present in the soil and/or groundwater, the extent of the impact shall be evaluated to determine if the appropriate regulatory agency (i.e. Regional Water Quality Control Board or Department of Toxic Substances Control) should be contacted and regulatory oversight sought.
 - 2. A site management plan shall be developed to establish management practices for construction worker safety while handling contaminated soil, groundwater, or other materials if encountered during excavation and construction activities.

- 3. A hazardous materials licensed contractor shall conduct construction earthwork activities with properly trained employees in areas where contaminated soil or ground water are present. Employees conducting earthwork activities at the site must complete a 40-hour training course, including respirator and personal protective equipment training. Each contractor working at the site shall prepare a health and safety plan (HSP) that addresses the safety and health hazards of each phase of site operations that includes the requirements and procedures for employee protection.
- B. Excavation of the project alignment could result in exposure of construction workers to soils and groundwater contamination with lead
 - Prior to project development, a soil investigation shall be completed to determine whether ADL has affected soils that will be excavated as part of the proposed project. The investigation for ADL shall be performed in accordance with the Caltrans' *Lead Testing Guidance Procedure* (dated March 16, 2001). The analytical results will be compared against applicable environmental screening levels for construction workers and hazardous waste criteria. Based on analytical results, the investigation will provide recommendations regarding soil handling procedures, management and disposal of affected soils in the project area including the reuse potential of ADL-affected soil during project development. The provisions of a variance granted to Caltrans by the California Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) on September 22, 2000 (or any subsequent variance in effect when the project is constructed) regarding aeriallydeposited lead shall be followed, and will reduce this impact to a less than significant level.
- IX. HYDROLOGY AND WATER QUALITY. The project will not result in a significant hydraulogy or water quality impact, therefore no mitigation is required.
- X. LAND USE AND PLANNING. The project will not result in a significant land use or planning impact, therefore no mitigation is required.
- XI. MINERAL RESOURCES. The project will not have a significant impact on this resource, therefore no mitigation is required.
- XII. NOISE. The project will not have a significant noise impact, therefore no mitigation is required.
- XIII. POPULATION AND HOUSING. The project will not have a significant impact on population and housing, therefore no mitigation is required.
- **XIV. PUBLIC SERVICES.** The project will not have a significant impact on public services, therefore no mitigation is required.
- XV. **RECREATION.** The project will not have a significant impact on this resource, therefore no mitigation is required.
- XVI. TRANSPORTATION / TRAFFIC. The project will not have a significant traffic impact, therefore no mitigation is required.
- XVII. UTILITIES AND SERVICE SYSTEMS. The project will not have a significant impact on utilities or service systems, therefore no mitigation is required.

XVIII. MANDATORY FINDINGS OF SIGNIFICANCE. The project will not substantially reduce the habitat of a fish or wildlife species, be cumulatively considerable, or have a substantial adverse effect on human beings, therefore no mitigation is required.

PREFACE

Section 21081.6 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requires a Lead Agency to adopt a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program whenever it approves a project for which measures have been required to mitigate or avoid significant effects on the environment. The purpose of the monitoring and reporting program is to ensure compliance with the mitigation measures during project implementation.

On ______, 2011, the Mitigated Negative Declaration was adopted for the Sewer Interceptor Phase VIA Project. The Final Initial Study concluded that the implementation of the project could result in significant effects on the environment; therefore, mitigation measures were incorporated into the proposed project or are required as a condition of project approval. This Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program outlines these measures and how, when, and by whom they will be implemented.

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

RESPONSES TO COMMENTS ON THE INITIAL STUDY FOR THE SEWER INTERCEPTOR PHASE VIA PROJECT

Letter from Caltrans dated June 10, 2011 (Letter 1)

Comment 1A: As lead agency, the City of San Jose (City) is responsible for all project mitigation, including any needed improvements to state highways. The project's fair share contribution, financing, scheduling, implementation responsibilities and lead agency monitoring should be fully discussed for all proposed mitigation measures. The project's traffic mitigation fees should be specifically identified in the environmental document. Any required roadway improvements should be completed prior to issuance of project occupancy permits. While an encroachment permit is only required when the project involves work in the State Right of Way (ROW), the Department will not issue an encroachment permit until our concerns are adequately addressed. Therefore, we strongly recommend that the lead agency ensure resolution of the Department's California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) concerns prior to submittal of the encroachment permit application. Further comments will be provided during the encroachment permit process if required.

Highway Operations

The MND should clearly state the hours of construction activities, specifically along US 101 and Zanker Road, and elaborate what would be the traffic impacts during construction hours. Also, a queuing analysis for US 101 off-ramp at Zanker Road must be provided by the City to the Department.

Response 1A: The project is proposing to intercept and divert flow from an existing 60-inch brick sanitary sewer line to a new reinforced concrete pipe (RCP) sewer interceptor line to be installed within the existing right-of-way of Commercial Street, North Fourth Street (under a portion of Interstate 880) and finally under U.S. Highway 101. The proposed project would not impact traffic trips, nor would it impact the U.S. Highway 101 off-ramp at Zanker Road.

Hours of construction are provided in Section 4.12 of the IS/MND. Construction would be limited to the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Monday through Friday for any on-site or off-site work within 500 feet of any residential unit. Construction outside of these hours may be approved through a development permit based on a site-specific construction noise mitigation plan and a finding by the Director of Planning, Building, and Code Enforcement that the construction noise mitigation plan is adequate to prevent noise disturbance of affected residential uses. During boring work under U.S. Highway 101, which is anticipated to last four months, hours of construction will be 24 hours a day, seven days a week.¹

Comment 1B: Traffic Safety

An encroachment permit will be required from the Department for this project.

Response 1B: The comment is noted. An encroachment permit will be obtained for work within the State right-of-way, as necessary.

Comment 1C: Geotechnical

The Department recommends the City change the MND, Section 4.6.2 "Environmental Checklist and Discussion" "Geology and Soils,1b" (see page 39), checkbox from "Less than Significant Impact" to "Less than Significant Impact with Mitigation Incorporated" in accordance with the discussion in Section 4.6.1.2 "Seismicity and Seismic Hazards" (see page 38).

Response 1C: The project site is located in a seismically active region. Therefore, in accordance with City practice, the proposed project intends to incorporate standard engineering and design practices, as mentioned in Section 4.6.2.2 of the IS/MND. The proposed project would not require further mitigation measures.

Comment 1D: <u>Environmental Planning</u>

Erosion control measures must not introduce plant species listed as noxious or invasive. Precautions must be taken to not spread noxious or invasive plant species, if these species are found in or adjacent to the construction areas. Such precautions include, but are not limited to, daily inspection and cleaning of equipment. Also, precautions include the development and implementation of eradication strategies, should noxious or invasive plant species be found in the construction areas.

- **Response 1D:** The project will comply with the City of San Jose Grading Ordinance, including erosion and dust control during site preparation and with the City of San Jose Zoning Ordinance requirement for keeping adjacent streets free of dirt and mud during construction. The following specific BMPs will be implemented to prevent stormwater pollution and minimize potential sedimentation during construction:
 - 1. Restrict grading to the dry season (June 15 through October 15) or meet City requirements for grading during the rainy season.
 - 2. Utilize on-site sediment control BMPs (such as fiber rolls, sand bag barriers, sediment traps, silt fences, straw bales, and storm drain inlet protection) to retain sediment on the project site;
 - 3. Utilize stabilized construction entrances and/or wash racks;
 - 4. Implement damp street sweeping;
 - 5. Provide temporary cover of disturbed surfaces to help control erosion during construction;
 - 6. Provide permanent cover to stabilize the disturbed surfaces after construction has been completed.

The project will not use species listed as noxious weeds. Precautions will be taken if invasive species are found in or adjacent to the construction areas. These include the inspection and cleaning of construction equipment and eradication strategies to be implemented should an invasion occur.

Prior to grading, any infested areas will be cleared of vegetation and all vegetative material destroyed off-site, taking care to prevent any seed dispersal in the process. Native seed from a local source (within the same watershed if practicable) will be planted on all disturbed ground outside of the roadway areas.

The proposed project does not include ramp closures for U.S. 101 or Interstate 880. Therefore, mitigation measures have not been included in the IS/MND document.

Comment 1E: Cultural Resources

The Cultural Resources study and mitigation measures outlined in the MND satisfies environmental legal compliance for cultural resources within State ROW for the Department. Should construction activities within State ROW take place as part of this project, these mitigation measures shall be implemented for an archaeological discovery. If there should be an inadvertent archaeological or burial discovery within State ROW, the Department's Office of Cultural Resource Studies shall be immediately contacted at (510) 286-5618. A staff archaeologist will evaluate the finds within one business day after contact. The Department requires review of any potential data recovery plans within State ROW.

- **Response 1E:** The comment is noted and does not raise any questions regarding the environmental analysis. The procedures outlined will be followed in the event of an unanticipated discovery.
- Comment 1F: Encroachment Permit

Work that encroaches onto the State ROW requires an encroachment permit that is issued by the Department. To apply, a completed encroachment permit application, environmental documentation, and five (5) sets of plans clearly indicating State ROW must be submitted to the address below. Traffic-related mitigation measures should be incorporated into the construction plans during the encroachment permit process.

Response 1F: The comment is noted. An encroachment permit will be obtained for work within the State right-of-way, as necessary.

Letter From Caltrans Dated June 21, 2011 (Letter 2)

Comment 2A: <u>Right-of-Way</u>

1. The Draft MND states the project will not have significant traffic impacts; therefore, no mitigation is required. Section 3.2.3, on page 9, lists numerous impacts to traffic (e.g., reduction of traffic to one lane, closing of two intersections for up to two months, etc.). Because there are significant traffic

impacts listed in the Draft MND, the statement that the project will not have significant impacts to traffic is false and must be corrected.

- 2. The change in alignment would require either: (a) an Encroachment Permit for work within or below the State ROW; or (b) an alteration of any existing Joint Use or Consent to Common Use Agreements. Any new crossing of the ROW will require a new Encroachment Permit or Joint Agreement.
- **Response 2A:** The project is proposing temporary restriping and detours for various local City roadway segments in the project area during construction. The temporary nature of the limited roadway access would avoid any significant traffic impacts, and mitigation measures would not be required in accordance with CEQA.

The project proposes excavations in relation to the proposed boring under U.S. 101. The boring holes are located within the Caltrans right-of-way and will require approval from Caltrans in the form of an encroachment permit, which will be processed in advance of the work.

Letter From VTA Dated June 15, 2011 (Letter 3)

Comment 3A: VTA, in conjunction with Caltrans, is conducting planning, engineering, and environmental studies for the U.S. 101 Express Lanes Project. Because the proposed pipeline would cross U.S. 101 at 4th Street and Old Bayshore Freeway, it is important that VTA be provided the pipeline alignments and profiles when available so that we can review them for any potential conflicts with the U.S. 101 Express Lane Project.

VTA is also interested in reviewing the alignments and profiles of the pipeline along 4th Street that runs under I-880 to determine if the pipeline would impact any future work on I-880.

To follow-up on the Department's letter to you, dated June 10, 2011, we add these additional comments on the MND referenced in the subject heading.

Right-of-Way (ROW)

1. The Draft MND states the project will not have significant traffic impacts; therefore, no mitigation is required. Section 3.2.3, on page 9, lists numerous impacts to traffic (e.g., reduction of traffic to one lane, closing of two intersections for up to two months, etc.). Because there are significant traffic impacts listed in the Draft MND, the statement that the project will not have significant impacts to traffic is false and must be corrected.

2. The change in alignment would require either: (a) an Encroachiment Permit for work within or below the State ROW; or (b) an alteration of any existing Joint Use or Consent to Common Use Agreements. Any new crossing of the ROW will require a new Encroachment Permit or Joint Agreement.

Thank you for including the California Department of Transportation (Department) in the environmental review process for the above-referenced project. We have reviewed the proposed project's MND and are pleased to offer the following comments.

As lead agency, the City of San Jose (City) is responsible for all project mitigation, including any needed improvements to state highways. The project's fair share contribution, financing, scheduling, implementation responsibilities and lead agency monitoring should be fully discussed for all proposed mitigation measures. The project's traffic mitigation fees should be specifically identified in the environmental document. Any required roadway improvements should be completed prior to issuance of project occupancy permits. While an encroachment permit is only required when the project involves work in the State Right of Way (ROW), the Department will not issue an encroachment permit until our concerns are adequately addressed. Therefore, we strongly recommend that the lead agency ensure resolution of the Department's California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) concerns prior to submittal of the encroachment permit application. Further comments will be provided during the encroachment permit process if required; see the end of this letter for more information regarding the encroachment permit permit process.

A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN JOSE FINDING THAT THE DESIGN-BUILD PROCUREMENT PROCESS FOR THE DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION OF THE 60-INCH BRICK INTERCEPTOR PHASE VI-A PROJECT WILL SAVE MONEY AND RESULT IN FASTER PROJECT COMPLETION THAN IF THE CITY USED A TRADITIONAL DESIGN-BID-BUILD PROJECT DELIVERY SYSTEM. APPROVING THE ISSUANCE OF A REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS AND THE EVALUATION CRITERIA AND PROCESS BY WHICH THE CITY SHALL SELECT A DESIGN-BUILD ENTITY FOR THE PROJECT, AND AUTHORIZING THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WORKS TO ISSUE ADDENDA TO THE REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS TO ADD ANY ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS AND TO MAKE SUCH OTHER REVISIONS TO THE REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS THAT ARE CONSISTENT WITH THE SCOPE AND SELECTION CRITERIA AS APPROVED BY COUNCIL

WHEREAS, Section 1217(e) (7) of the Charter of the City of San José ("City") authorizes the City to negotiate and award a design-build contract for a public works project that meets the following criteria: (1) the design-build contract for the project will cost more than \$5,000,000, and (2) the City Council finds that the design-build procurement process would save money or result in faster project completion; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 14.07 of Title 14 of the San Jose Municipal Code requires a design-build entity to be procured under Charter Section 1217(e)(7) pursuant to a competitive request for proposals ("RFP") process and sets forth the procurement procedures; an

WHEREAS, Section 14.07.310 of Chapter 14.07 of the San Jose Municipal Code requires the City Council to do each of the following before issuing an RFP for a design-build entity: (1) make findings that the cost of the proposed design-build contract is

likely to exceed \$5,000,000, and that the design-build procurement process is likely to save money or result in faster project completion than if the City used a procure process involving its normal competitive bidding procedures, and (2) approve the RFP and the criteria and process by which the City shall select a design-build entity; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to proceed with an RFP in accordance with the abovereferenced Charter and Municipal Code provisions to select a design-build entity for the 60-Inch Brick Interceptor Phase Vi-A Project ("Project"); and

WHEREAS, the City further desires to authorize the Director of Public Works to issue addenda to the RFP to add any additional requirements and to make such other revisions to the RFP that are consistent with the scope and selection criteria as approved by Council; and

WHEREAS, City staff has submitted a memorandum to Council for this item, dated November 23, 2015, that outlines the design-build procurement process and shows that said procurement process will likely result in faster completion of the Project than the traditional design-bid-build procurement process ("Council Memorandum");

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN JOSE THAT:

<u>Section 1.</u> Compliance with the requirements of Section 14.07.310 of Chapter 14.07 of the San José Municipal Code:

- A. The City Council hereby finds that the Council Memorandum demonstrates the following facts to be true:
 - The preliminary estimated cost of the design-build contract for the Project is at least \$32,000,000; and

- The expected cost savings to be achieved from using the design-build project delivery system is approximately \$2,000,000; and
- The expected time savings to be achieved from using the design-build project delivery system is approximately three months.
- B. Based on the above facts, the City Council hereby makes the following findings:
 - The cost of the proposed design-build contract for the Project is likely to exceed \$5,000,000; and
 - The design-build project delivery system will result in cost savings and faster completion of the Project than if the City used a traditional designbid-build project delivery system.
- C. Based on the above findings, the City Council hereby determines that the requirements of Section 14.07.310A of the San José Municipal Code are satisfied.

<u>Section 2.</u> In accordance with Section 14.07.310B of the San José Municipal Code, the City Council hereby approves the RFP and the criteria and process by which the City will select a design-build entity, as set forth more specifically in the Council Memorandum.

<u>Section 3.</u> The Director of Public Works is hereby authorized to issue addenda to the RFP to add any additional requirements and to make such other revisions to the RFP that are consistent with the scope and selection criteria as approved by Council.
