SUBJECT: AUTHORIZATION TO NEGOTIATE AND EXECUTE PARKS. **RECREATION AND NEIGHBORHOOD SERVICES 2018-2019 AGREEMENTS** 

#### RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a resolution authorizing the following, subject to the appropriation of funds by the City Council, and on such terms and conditions as deemed appropriate by the City Manager:

- a) Authorize the City Manager to negotiate and execute all agreements, amendments, and extensions to accept funds for the Department of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services identified in the "Compensation Paid to the City of San José" (Attachment A); and
- b) Authorize the City Manager to accept any funds exceeding the figures identified in Attachment A for the specified programs and purposes identified as "Compensation Paid to the City of San José," provided that the City Manager determines that the City is able to provide the services and comply with any additional requirements associated with the increased grant funds. The City Manager shall also bring forward to City Council any items that require approval for budgetary adjustments and appropriation actions necessary for such programs; and
- c) Authorize the Director of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services to apply for, accept, negotiate and execute 2018-2019 agreements and amendments as identified in "Delegation of Contract Authority to Department of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services Director" (Attachment B) consistent with Adopted Budget amounts for the following City programs or services:
  - 1) After School Education and Safety;
  - 2) BeautifySJ Grant Program;
  - 3) Bringing Everyone's Strengths Together Grants;
  - 4) Citywide Aquatics Program;

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- 5) Community Center Reuse Program;
- 6) County of Santa Clara Therapeutic Program;
- 7) Family Camp Facility Use Agreements;
- 8) Friends of PRNS Non-Profit Organizations;
- 9) Grant Revenue Agreements;
- 10) Happy Hollow Park and Zoo:
  - a) Education Programs;
  - b) Private Events;
- 11) Homeless Response Team;
- 12) Leisure and Recreation Fee Class Vendor Agreements;
- 13) Leisure and Recreation Program Facility Use Agreements;
- 14) Little League Agreement(s);
- 15) Martial Cottle Community Garden;
- 16) Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force:
  - a) Grant Revenue;
  - b) Related Sub-Contractor Agreements, where applicable;
  - c) Facility Use;
  - d) Memoranda of Understanding;
  - e) Evaluation Consultant Agreements;
- 17) Park Concessionaires Agreements;
- 18) Recreation of City Kids Program;
- 19) Safe Summer Initiative Grants;
- 20) Senior Health and Wellness Grants;
- 21) St. James / Urban Park Activation Grants; and
- 22) Summer Food Service Program.

#### **OUTCOME**

Delegating to the City Manager and the Department of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services Director the authority to apply for, negotiate and execute these agreements will reduce the transactional time needed to make funding available to recipients and for the City to receive grant funds or other created revenue.

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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The purpose of this memorandum is to request that Council adopt a resolution authorizing the following:

- 1. Authorize the City Manager to negotiate and execute all agreements, amendments, and extensions to accept funds for the Department of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services identified in the "Compensation Paid to the City of San José" (Attachment A), as well as accept funds exceeding the figures for the specified programs and purposes identified, provided that the City Manager determines that the City is able to provide the services and comply with any additional requirements associated with the increased funds; and
- 2. Authorize the Director of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services to apply for, accept, negotiate and execute 2018-2019 agreements and amendments as identified in the "Delegation of Contract Authority to Department of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services Director" (Attachment B), consistent with the Adopted Budget amounts for the specified City programs and services.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The City contracts with community-based organizations, school districts, and other agencies to assist with various programs that support the livability of neighborhoods, offer opportunities for individuals to enjoy life, and strengthen communities of people within San José.

In response to the City Council's request to quicken the City's administrative pace of doing business, including contract development, the Department of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services (Department) prepares this Council memorandum annually to seek authorization to apply for, accept, negotiate and execute agreements.

#### **ANALYSIS**

Delegation of Contract Authority to the City Manager (Attachment A)

In some cases, the contract amount to be paid or received by the City exceeds the City Manager's contract authority. By delegating this authority to the City Manager, the administrative process of making funding available to recipients will be improved. Additionally, efficiency gains for the entire organization will be achieved by significantly reducing City Council and administrative staff time dedicated to preparing and reviewing memoranda for these agreements. The City Manager or designee may only exercise amendment or extension authority if the contract, as amended, is consistent with the 2018-2019 Adopted Budget, and further, provided that City Council has taken all appropriation actions necessary to fulfill the terms of the amendment or extension.

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The proposed agreements for which compensation is paid to the City (Attachment A) for 2018-2019 are contingent on the adoption of the 2018-2019 Operating and Capital Budgets. In the event the amounts approved for these contracts are different than the amounts listed, the contracts will reflect the amounts approved.

In addition, the City Manager will have the authority to accept any funds exceeding the figures identified in Attachment A for the specified programs and purposes identified as "Compensation Paid to the City of San José" provided that the City Manager determines that the City is able to provide the services and comply with any additional requirements associated with the increased funds. The City Manager shall also bring forward to City Council any items that require approval for budgetary adjustments and appropriation actions necessary for such programs.

#### Delegation of Contract Authority to the PRNS Director (Attachment B)

The Department will coordinate with the City Attorney's Office and the City Manager's Office in developing and approving all agreements, and respectfully requests contract authority for the Director of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services (Director) to negotiate and execute the agreements described below.

### Facility Use:

The Department requests contract authority for the Director to negotiate and execute Facility Use contracts and amendments to offer City Leisure and Recreation Programs at non-City sites, for the following programs: Community Center Reuse, Family Camp, After School Education and Safety, Recreation of City Kids, Santa Clara County Adult Probation Department's therapeutic services, and general Facility Use agreements with school districts and other entities.

#### Friends of PRNS Non-Profit Organizations:

A number of non-profit organizations have been created with the mission of sponsoring, enhancing, and financially supporting the Department and its programs. The Department requests authority for the Director to negotiate and execute agreements and amendments with the supportive non-profit organizations, such as, the Emma Prusch Farm Park Foundation, Friends of Family Camp, Guadalupe River Park Conservancy, Happy Hollow Foundation, San Jose Parks Foundation, and Youth Connections Foundation.

#### Grant Programs:

The Department requests contract authority for the Director to negotiate and execute contracts and amendments, consistent with the 2018-2019 Adopted Budget, for the following grant programs: BeautifySJ, Bringing Everyone's Strengths Together, Safe Summer Initiative, Saint James/Urban Park Activation, and Senior Health and Wellness. This authority will also apply to any grant amendments related to these programs subject to the 2018-2019 Adopted Budget and with the stipulation that the City Council has taken all appropriation actions necessary to execute the terms of the agreements.

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Due to the nature of the BeautifySJ Grant Program, the City will enter into a Fiscal Agent Agreement with United Neighborhoods of Santa Clara County for the amount of grant funds appropriated by City Council. Almost all BeautifySJ grantees are neighborhood associations, and not state-recognized entities, therefore, the City contracts with United Neighborhoods of Santa Clara County to distribute grant funds to the associations and subsequently monitor grant funding during the grant cycle.

#### Grant Revenue:

The Department also requests contract authority for the Director to apply for, negotiate, and execute agreements for grants that staff identify throughout the year, which support the department's programs and objectives. These may include grants that are up to \$290,000, and such awards will only be received if the Director has determined the Department is able to provide the services and comply with any additional requirements associated with the grant funds. Examples of past grants that conform to these provisions include the U.S. Tennis Association NorCal Foundation H.I.T.S. (Honesty, Inspiration, Teamwork, Sportsmanship) Grant and the National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA) Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership Program.

## Happy Hollow Park & Zoo

The Department requests contract authority for the Director to negotiate and execute the agreements necessary for the implementation and ongoing support of Happy Hollow Park & Zoo programs, including:

- 1. <u>Happy Hollow Education Program</u>: This is a revenue-generating program that contributes to Happy Hollow Park & Zoo's cost-recovery model. The Department contracts with school districts and other entities as a requirement for allowing the Happy Hollow Education Program to conduct fee-based programs at non-City sites.
- 2. <u>Happy Hollow Events</u>: As part of Happy Hollow Park & Zoo's overall revenue-generating strategy, this program couples park reservations with catering provided by Happy Hollow Park & Zoo's food service. Delegating authority to the Director will allow the Department to enter into event agreements that include catering or entertainment components in the agreements.

#### *Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force (Task Force):*

The Department requests contract authority for the Director to negotiate and execute the agreements necessary for the implementation of the Task Force's Strategic Work Plan. This includes:

- 1. Memoranda of Understanding for partner agency participation in Task Force Technical Team meetings;
- 2. Facility use agreements with school districts or other entities for providing Task Force services;
- 3. Agreements with subcontracted agencies to implement Task Force programs;

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4. Agreements with consultants to evaluate Task Force and BEST programs and services; and,

5. Grant revenue agreements with public and private entities.

#### Park Concessionaires

The Department requests contract authority for the Director to negotiate and execute agreements for concessionaires in City parks and community centers. The Department will establish a pool of pre-qualified concessionaires to sell food products, merchandise, or other concession services. All concessionaires will be issued special permits, and are required to follow all environmental and public health requirements. Locations, hours, and types of concessions will be determined by mutual agreement between the Department and the concessionaire.

#### Services and Programs

The Department requests contract authority for the Director to negotiate and execute agreements for the After School Education and Safety Program; Citywide Aquatics Program; Homeless Response Team; Leisure and Recreation Fee Class Vendors; Little Leagues; Martial Cottle Community Garden; and the Summer Food Service Program. A description of each is provided below.

- 1. <u>After School Education and Safety Agreements:</u> The After School Education and Safety Program is funded by the State's After School Education and Safety Grant, which is awarded to school districts to provide comprehensive after school programming. School districts may select the City of San José as the ASES service provider and an agreement is needed.
- 2. <u>Citywide Aquatics Program:</u> The Citywide Aquatics Program offers affordable aquatics services to our residents by providing programming, operations, and maintenance at six aquatics facilities, four of which are currently operated by qualified providers. The Department has an established pool of qualified providers through 2024. The program plays a significant role in increasing the availability of services and programming at aquatic facilities.
- 3. <u>Homeless Response Team:</u> The Department and the Santa Clara Valley Water District will continue a joint agreement to provide funding for additional Park Rangers to serve on the Homeless Response Team.
- 4. <u>Leisure and Recreation Fee Class Vendor Agreements</u>: The City has an ongoing Request for Qualifications process to qualify and select vendors that will provide feebased recreation leisure classes at City community centers. All vendor agreements are 100 percent supported by participant fees. Vendors that provide recreational and leisure programming play a significant role in Department revenue generation efforts.

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5. <u>Little League Agreements:</u> The Department contracts with many local Little Leagues for their use of fields at City parks. As part of the agreements, the leagues compensate the City for their use of the space, support the maintenance of the fields, and contribute minor capital funds for improving the fields.

- 6. <u>Martial Cottle Community Garden:</u> The proposed agreement will authorize the City to develop and operate a community garden on Santa Clara County parkland within Martial Cottle Park. The County is providing the land at no cost and providing \$200,000 toward the construction of the garden.
- 7. Summer Food Service Program: The Department will participate in the Summer Food Service Program to ensure that low-income children continue to receive nutritious meals when school is not in session. Meals will be provided at Department programs, with services provided by the City or subcontracted meal providers. Costs for these services are reimbursed from the U.S. Department of Agriculture and/or the California Department of Education.

#### **EVALUATION AND FOLLOW-UP**

No additional follow-up actions with Council are expected at this time. Staff will monitor the impact of these actions and report any issues to the Council as needed.

#### PUBLIC OUTREACH

The only program that requires Council action due to the use of public funds equal to \$1 million or greater is the BEST grant program. The BEST program is primarily managed through the City's web-based platform known as WebGrants. This memorandum will be posted to the City's website for public viewing for the June 12, 2018 City Council Meeting.

#### **COORDINATION**

This memorandum has been coordinated with the City Attorney's Office and the City Manager's Budget Office.
