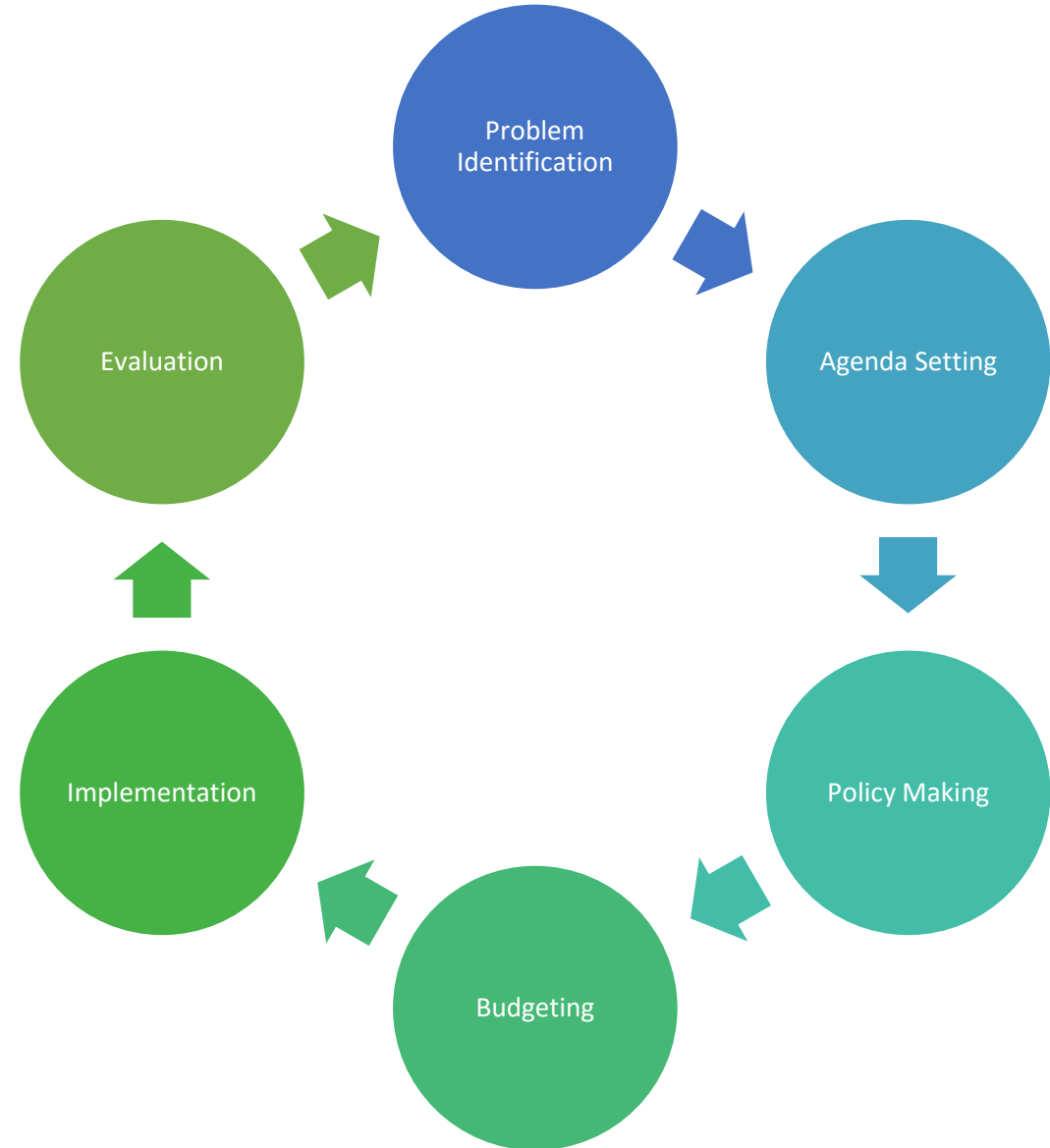
- 2011 – Initial focus on Ordinance work

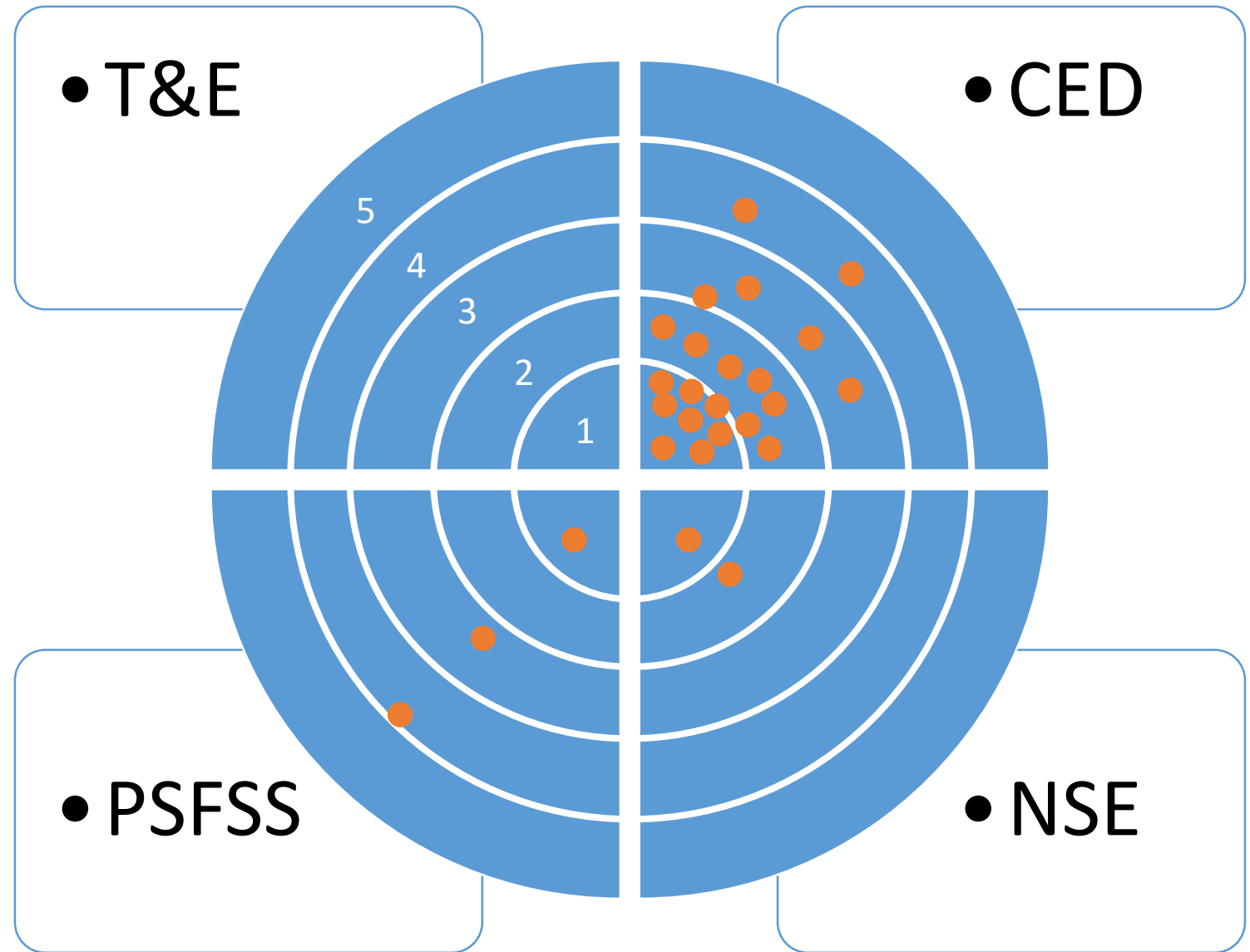

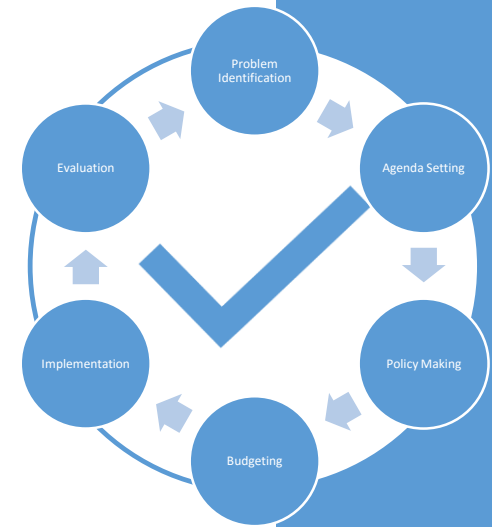
Target Work Load Analysis

- 5 – Less Intense

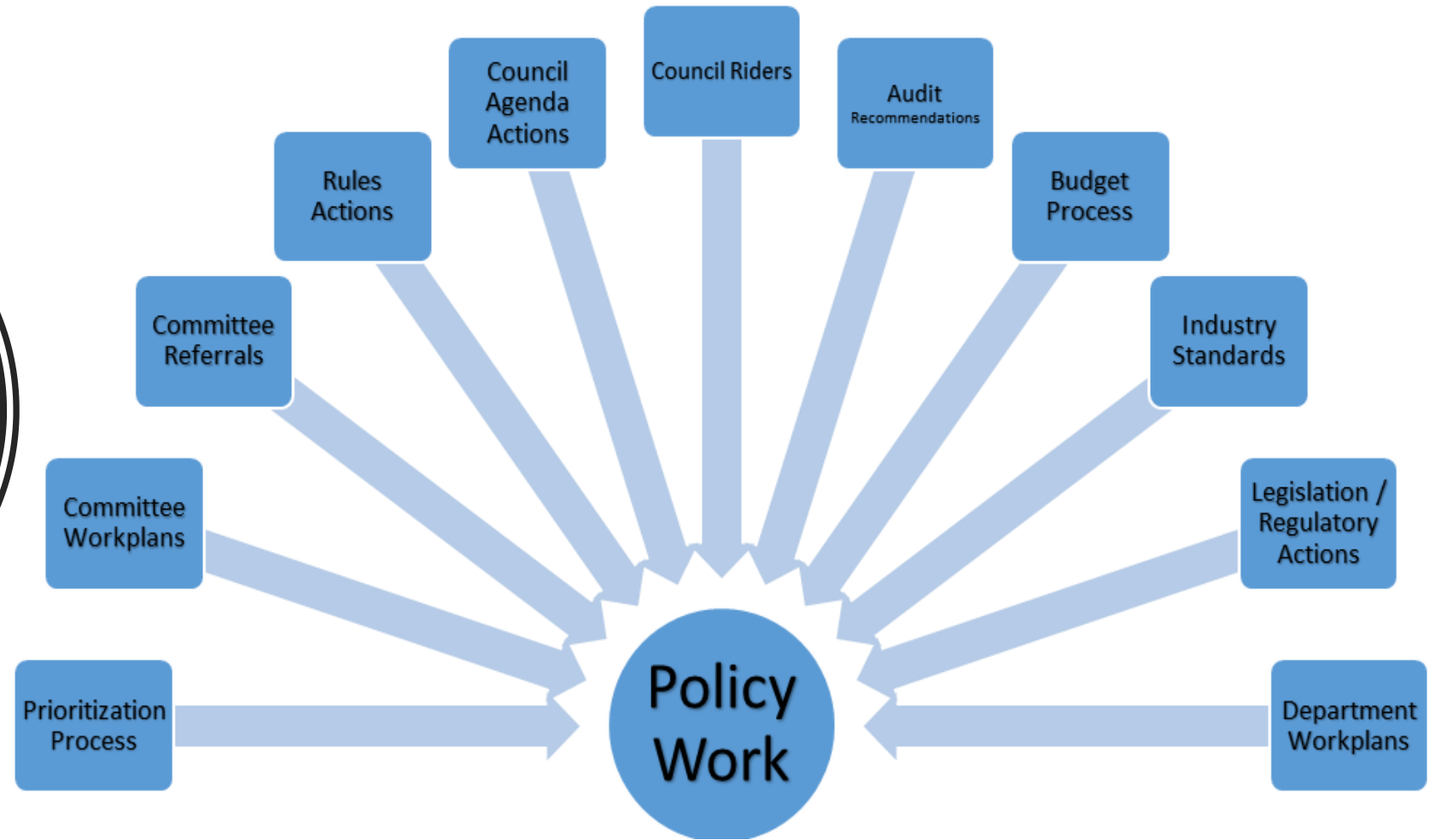
