












### Age Breakdown of Victims





### **Robbery Victimology**

#### Single vs. Multiple Victims



• Suspects targeted single victims in 84% of robbery incidents. Sixteen percent of incidents involved multiple victims.


#### **Frequent Victims**

- 317 individuals listed as robbery victim more than once.
  - 40 individuals victimized 4+ times during the time frame, 39 are Loss Prevention Agents, Security, or store clerks/other employees at targeted business.
  - One store owner had been robbed 4 times since 2013. He was killed in August 2017, during the commission of the 5th incident, which occurred just two months after the prior robbery.





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


**Minor injuries include:** pain, redness, swelling, cuts or lacerations that do not require extensive suturing, bruises, welts, etc.

**Major injuries include:** loss of teeth, fractures, lacerations that require extensive suturing, internal injuries, loss of consciousness, death.



















# Age Breakdown of Robbery Suspects







# Use of Force - Overview

In 2017:

- SJPD responded to 502,229 calls for service
- Officers used force 629 times (= 0.13% of all calls)
- 33 Use of force complaints were filed (=5.2% of UOF)
- SJPD implemented Command Review on Oct. 18, 2017
  - Certain Use Of Force incidents are reviewed by the chain of command through the Assistant Chief or Chief.
  - In conjunction with Body Worn Cameras, Internal Affairs process, and Force Analysis System
  - Goals: Ensure officers are justified in using force and are using appropriate level of force. Take actions to hold officers accountable when use of force is not appropriate.

# Use of Force Review Process

#### Sergeant responds to all UOF (Category I-IV)

- Ensures canvas, photographs, interviews, evidence collected, injuries treated
- Writes supplemental police report documenting actions/observations

#### Lieutenant responds to the scene of Category II-IV

• Writes supplemental police report documenting actions/observations

Category II (when appropriate) & Category III proceed to Command Review.

For Category IV, staff follows the SCC Officer Involved Incident Guidelines (Homicide Unit, DA Office, IA, IPA, City Attorney).





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# Category II & III Review

Category II (when appropriate) & Category III (all)

#### Within 7 Days: Sgt. submits

documentation up chain of command for Command Review Within 14 Days (or as otherwise directed by Chief):

Lt. submits Command Review memorandum with Sgt's packet up chain of command documenting findings. Was Use of Force within policy? If force is deemed inappropriate, a Department Initiated Investigation (DII) is initiated and Internal Affairs investigates the incident.

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### **Statewide Efforts: AB 953**

The Racial and Identity Profiling Act of 2015 (AB 953)

- Became law January 1, 2016, implementation 2018-2022
- Requires collection of data regarding law enforcement stops *ALL California law enforcement agencies must <u>collect and</u> <u>report</u> to the California Attorney General detailed data regarding all stops, which AB 953 defines as a <u>detention or</u> <u>search, and includes a consensual search.</u>*
- Created the State Racial and Identity Profiling Advisory (RIPA) Board
- SJPD already collects data (over 18 years) as well as the UTEP Study





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# What is considered a "stop" under AB 953?

"Any detention by a peace officer of a person, or any peace officer interaction with a person in which the peace officer conducts a search, including a <u>consensual</u> <u>search</u>, of the person's body or property in the person's possession or control."

(Gov. Code, § 12525.5, subd. (g)(2).)





### **Timelines for AB-953**

Law Enforcement Agencies begin collecting stop data:

-July 1, 2018: 1,000+ officers

-January 1, 2019: 667-999 officers (SJPD)

-January 1, 2021: 334-666 officers

-January 1, 2022: 1-333 officers





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### **Statewide Implementation Concerns**

#### **State Law Enforcement Associations**

 California POA, Peace Officers Research Association of California, other law enforcement associations have raised concerns

#### Methodology

- Form seeks Officer's perception, not actual demographics
- Potential for mistakes/bias in characterization





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### **Next Steps**

#### **Monitor Implementation**

- Phase 1 agencies (implementing July 1, 2018)
- Track ease of implementation and lessons learned

#### **Evaluate SJPD Equipment Options, Costs, & Staffing Impacts**

- Technology needs
  - CAD reconfiguration or use Department of Justice mobile solution
- Training/Staffing/IT requirements/Auditing
- Data entry time per stop
- Impacts on patrol time, community policing, traffic enforcement, overtime costs
