Affordable Housing

59 persons living with HIV/AIDS received rental assistance

Respond to Homelessness and its Impact on the Community

- 9 homeless households received rental assistance
- 882 homeless people received outreach and/or shelter services
- 5,455 outreach contacts were made with homeless individuals
- 68 homeless individuals participated in job training
- Hundreds of homeless individuals will benefit from rehabilitation of the Recovery Cafe

Accomplishments Summary (continued)

Strengthening Neighborhoods

- 67,101 low-income residents benefited from facility improvements
- 261 low-income seniors received meals, nutrition, and socialization services
- 154 low-income residents participated leadership development and neighborhood engagement programs
- 1,824 households received safety or accessibility improvements to their home
- 378 homes were improved as a result of enhanced code enforcement services
