Collaborative Courts in Santa Clara County

- Collaboration between justice, social service, and health systems
- Priority populations are those with behavioral health needs
- Offer alternatives to jail time & coordinate community services in order to reduce recidivism, support recovery, increase family stability, etc.
- □ Some connections to community or safety-net programs

Dependency Wellness Court (DWC)

- Superior Court, Department 66, Judge Hendrickson
- Dedicated voluntary substance abuse treatment court for parents involved in the child welfare system, separate from their Dependency Court hearings
- Multidisciplinary team including SUTS assessors, SUTS case manager, Parent Mentors,
 Domestic Violence specialist, SSA Eligibility Worker, DFCS Social Worker Liaison,
 Mental Health liaison, First Five, CASA, and attorneys
- □ DWC occurs every Tuesday and Thursday all day
- □ Participants appear in DWC on average every three weeks until graduation or child welfare case dismissal

Behavioral Health Treatment Court (BHTC)

- □ Collaboration between Superior Court (Dpt. 61, Judge Manley), Behavior Health Services Department, Public Defender, District Attorney, service providers
- □ Clinicians screen, engage, assess, and make treatment recommendations to for clients who are incarcerated and those who are present at Superior Court.
- □ Clients are connected to BHSD intensive outpatient programs which offer:
 - psychiatric evaluations and medication management;
 - mental health treatment & substance abuse treatment;
 - case management services;
 - □ linkage to appropriate community resources such as medical, faith based, housing, benefits assessments; and vocational/job training in lieu of jail time.



Other Collaborative Courts

- □ Palo Alto Review (PAR) Court
 - In operation since 2012, and is similar to BHTC, but not principally focused on individuals with mental health and/or substance use disorders
 - Referrals to/from North County Alternative Sentencing (NCAS) program
- □ Community Outreach Court
 - □ Partnership with Superior Court, Dpt. 61 & Located at the County Reentry Resource Ctr.
 - □ 3rd Tuesday of each month, 5:30 7:30 PM
 - □ Eligible Cases: Traffic or Transit tickets; Court ordered and/or Dpt. Of Tax & Collections fines & fees affiliated with quality-of-life convictions
 - Homeless and/or low-income, connected to services
