




- 1 retail location (open to public)

## **Distribution - Zoning**

- Transporting cannabis from:
  - Grower to manufacturer
  - Grower to dispensary
  - Manufacturer to dispensary
- Sending samples of cannabis or cannabis products to testing labs
- Collecting and paying State excise taxes

- Industrial Park (IP)
- Amended buffers (no public access)
- Allow in North SJ, International Business Park, & Edenvale



## **Distribution - Regulatory**

- Transporting cannabis from: grower to manufacturer or dispensary, manufacturer to dispensary
- Sending samples of cannabis or cannabis products to testing labs
- Collecting and paying State excise taxes

- Not open to the public
- Security cameras 24/7
- Employees badged and fingerprinted
- Cannabis receipt protocols
- Good Neighbor requirements



## **Testing Labs - Zoning**

 Test random samples of products for retail sale or manufacture

- Industrial Park (IP)
- Amended buffers (no public access)
- Allow in North SJ, International Business Park, & Edenvale

- Critical for public health & safety
- Not open to the public
- Security cameras 24/7
- Employees badged and fingerprinted
- Cannabis receipt protocols
- Good Neighbor requirements
