Installation of Stop Signs

- Council Policy 8-1
 - Establishes criteria used to determine if stop signs should be installed
 - Policy based on State Law (Caltrans)
 - Policy updated in 2001 increased opportunity for schools, high pedestrian/bicycle activity



Factors Considered in Council Policy

- Vehicle Conflicts
- Crash History
- Proximity to Schools
- Special Conditions



Proposed Policy Updates

Administrative

Update terminology and criteria to reconcile with adopted *Complete Streets Standards*, *Transportation Analysis Policy*, and consolidation of Boards/Commissions



Proposed Policy Updates

- Policy Warrants
 - Expand time period for crash review
 - Eliminate cap on warrant points for vehicle conflicts and proximity to schools
 - Consider street network and proximity to other stop signs or traffic signals on local streets
- Flexibility for low-volume Arterial/Collector streets to be analyzed using Local Street criteria
