Measure T Ballot Language

Disaster Preparedness, Public Safety and Infrastructure Bond To:

- Upgrade 911 communications, police, fire, and paramedics facilities to improve emergency and disaster response;
- Repair deteriorating bridges vulnerable to earthquakes;
- Repave streets and potholes in the worst condition;
- Prevent flooding and water quality contamination;
- Repair critical infrastructure;

Shall San Jose issue \$650,000,000 in general obligation bonds with an average levy of 11¢ per \$1,000 of assessed value, averaging \$34,208,000 annually until repaid, requiring community oversight and annual audits.

- Vote Certification: Dec. 6, 2018






Measure T Organizational Chart



Measure T DOT Street Repairs

388 miles of Residential Streets in the worst condition

- Commences in 2020 construction season
- Leverage all funding sources to maintain all residential streets w/appropriate treatment
- Maintain "good" condition on Major Streets
- 8 year estimated maintenance horizon with
 2020 construction season as first year





Measure T Fire Department –

2 new Fire Station Locations

Fire Department is evaluating multiple information sources to determine optimal placement of two existing and two new fire stations:

- 2016 Standards of Cover assessment
- Envision San Jose 2040 General Plan
- Current response time performance analysis
- Auto-aid response time performance
- Transportation systems developments
- Other



Measure T Finance

- Working with departments to develop the bond sizing
- Financing Team is assembled and commencing work
- Bond issuance will include:
 - New Money Measure T authorization Amount TBD
 - New Money Remaining Authorization from 2000 Measure O (Libraries) and 2002 Measure O (Public Safety) - \$9.23 million
 - Refunding of all outstanding GO Bonds \$323.11 million
- Estimated Timeline
 - Council approval of bond issuance June 2019
 - Bond Sale and Closing July 2019



Measure T Project Delivery

- DOT implements street repaving work
- DPW leads all other categories
- Combination of design-build, low-bid and best value
- Labor Compliance and Small/Local participation to be promoted through Public Works Academy
- Project Labor Agreements where applicable



Measure T Next Steps

- Continue workplan development, project scoping, land acquisition
- Return to Council in June with update and workplan review
- Prepare to issue bonds in July 2019
- Convene Citizen's Oversight Committee by end of 2019
