Dear Mayor Liccardo and Council Members,

Most of us would love to see an iconic feature at the Mineta San Jose International Airport or at the future transit center that will be the largest rail hub outside of New York City with High Speed Rail, BART, and Caltrain at the Diridon Train Station or elsewhere. Perhaps you have some good ideas.

But the ranking performed by SJLTC was flawed since its environmental review considered the benefit of the environment to their project rather than scoring sites based on their project's affect on the environment. Arena Green should have been eliminated because it is an extremely sensitive site.

The Arena Green is a confined narrow park strip that strides the confluence of the Guadalupe River and Los Gatos Creek. Even while impacted by downtown urbanization, the streams still provide habitat and critical riparian corridors for endangered steelhead anadromous fish, migratory birds, and other wildlife negotiating through an urban center on their way to larger and healthier habitats.

Public art is often fraught with controversy. After the City's experience with the Quetzalcoatl Park God, which some see as an important religious and cultural symbol and others see as a pile of dog doo -- that some feel was a deliberate poke in the eye of San Jose leaders by a frustrated artist (spell Park God backwards), I would expect that you would demand a transparent process with a great deal of citizen involvement and oversight. But this has not been the case so far.

SJLTC did present to the City's Art Commission, Parks Commission, and City Council. But their presentations were just that -- presentations. It has not sought direction nor incorporated public input.

The motives behind SJLTC are noble but the process has fallen short of the respect residents deserve especially with a structure to "build civic pride" with a landmark that represents us to the world.

And rather than SJLTC choosing the panel of judges, I suggest the Mayor and Council Members each choose judges in addition to a few technical experts. Perhaps local artists can contribute to the winning design.

The wildlife in our streams should be left in the dark -- not the public.

Dear Chair Flores and commissioners,

Santa Clara Valley Audubon Society and the Sierra Club Loma Prieta Chapters are non-profit organizations that promote the protection and enjoyment of birds and wildlife and the stewardship of the natural habitats and biodiversity that thrives in our region. We are concerned with item D. on tonight's agenda: San Jose Light Tower Site Selection and Next Steps.

The San Jose Light Tower Corporation seeks to embark on an international competition to create an iconic structure in Arena Green, a San Jose City Park. We ask you to 1) recommend a site that is not adjacent to a major river or creek and 2) require clear and effective design guidelines for the design competition. If Arena Green is indeed selected, then adherence to the San Jose Riparian Corridor policy. is essential, and additional design criteria should be imposed.

Artificial light and light pollution are now recognized for its myriad negative effects on ALL living things: plants, animals, and humans - our daily and seasonal clocks respond to artificial light. The brighter the light - the greater the disruption. A September 2018 NEY York Times story - [The Deadly Lure of Light](#) - describes the tragic consequences of the Tribute In Light 9/11 memorial: for one night every September, it attracts birds from their migratory path to peril. The harmful effects of this artificial light expression are mitigated by Audubon volunteers who stay up all night and turn off the light beams when harmful effects become evident. Volunteers can handle such task once a year, but not every day of the year!

A Science Advance article from 2016- [The new world atlas of artificial night sky brightness](#) - shows that Night skies across nearly half the United States are polluted by light. Many of America's metropolises lie along rivers, coastlines and ridges that concentrate large numbers of migratory birds. San Jose is not different - Coyote Creek, Los Gatos Creek and the Guadalupe River flow through the city. Arena Green especially is situated at the confluence of two waterways: Los Gatos and the Guadalupe. One should be very cautious of increasing the amount of artificial light in this location.

The San Jose Light Tower Corporation seeks to embark on an international competition to create an iconic structure in Arena Green, a San Jose City Park. The report claims – in error - that Arena Green has no significant Environmental impact and that it suffices shielding light from aquatic habitats. Please do not accept the report. Instead, please do your civil duty as Parks and Recreation Commissioners and consider the following recommendations to the Parks and Recreation department and City Council:

1. Reconsider site recommendations and select a site that is not adjacent to a major river or creek
2. Require that the City develop wildlife-friendly design criteria for the project
3. Engage the Greenprint Steering Committee and the Parks and Recreation Commission in the evaluation of design criteria and project submissions

As an example, our recent kayak outings in Calero Reservoir led to the discovery of Western and Clark's grebes actually nesting in the Reservoir area and I was the first to document this for the local Audubon Society. What a wonderful experience for all of us to enjoy, along with the many Bald Eagles, Osprey and many other wildlife there and in many other locations we are fortunate to have around our city.

I'm writing today to ask the Commission to recommend to the City Council:

- This Light Tower development be considered elsewhere, further from any of our waterways than is currently planned now
- Please develop and require wildlife-friendly design criteria for the Light Tower Corporation project
- Please engage the Greenprint Steering Committee and the Parks and Recreation Commission in the evaluation of design criteria and project submissions
