
Exhibit 5: Location of Development Proposals and Mailing Radii for Hearing and Community Meeting Notices in FY 2017-18

• State requirements

- Property owners
- 300-foot radius
- 10 days' notice
- Newspaper notice (zoning)

• City requirements (6-30)


- Tenants and property owners
- 300- to 1,000-foot + radius
- 14 days' notice (minimum)
- On-site notice
- Online information

- 374 projects
- 109,741 mailings
- \$276,300 in public notice fees

Community meeting notices

- 44 projects
- 39,515 mailings
- \$68,900 in public notice fees

Exhibit 6: Number of Mailing Sent for Hearings and Community Meetings Held in FY 2017-18






Finding 2: The City Should Improve Mechanisms for Reaching Neighborhood Associations and Limited English Speaking Communities

- Regularly involving neighborhood associations early in the process can help identify projects that may warrant additional outreach.
- Establishing procedures for the use interpreters at meetings, and translation of notices can help improve access for limited English-speaking communities.

Finding 3: Further Improvements Can Enhance Public Outreach

- Last updated in 2004, Policy 6-30 should be updated:
 - To account for changes to the Municipal Code, as well as provide clearer guidance for some types of permits, and
 - To provide goals on the availability of information online.
- Hearing notices can incorporate more plain language.
- Develop materials for the community explaining purpose of planning process, as well as to collect feedback from the public.



- Our audit report includes a total of 8 recommendations to ensure outreach policies meet community expectation.
