The high rise that I reside in has spent over \$100,000 on theft, and vandalism to our building. Our largest retailer, Safeway is vacating after 10 years, rumored that the cost of theft made them not profitable. First and foremost, I think that it is imperative that anyone involved in finding a solution to the ever growing homeless problem should start by watching the YouTube documentary Seattle is Dying. It clearly identifies the problem as one of drug addition and not simply of providing housing. It is impossible to solve a problem that has not been clearly identified. This issue is complex with many levels. The level that I am speaking of is the very visible, hoarding type street dwellers. As their numbers have increased so has crime. This documentary offers a solution.

No one jurisdiction can tackle this problem on their own. It will require a countywide effort of Law Enforcement, County Health Services, and the District Attorneys office.
