PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION FY2019/2020: LIBRARY

Transform our highest impact program and expand quality through the provision of training and support to informal care providers and "family, friend, and neighbor" caregivers

Storytime

Implementation of new curricula based on EEQS for implementation within in all Library storytime programs serving more than 140,000 children ages 0-5 annually.

Wee Connect! And Stay & Play Reach the growing population of informal or family, friend and neighbor (FFN) caregivers and connect them to library/community resources and support, thereby helping to ensure that the infants, toddlers, and preschoolers in their care are on track for success in school and in life.

Workforce Development and Training Evaluate, design, and launch a child care provider training program, utilizing our prior experience and current best practices focusing on at-home, license-exempt providers.



Helping San José's Students Achieve Their College and Career Goals

Went live April 2nd, 2019

54 Registered Users

15 Students have completed the curriculum

Each user may earn up to a \$500 scholarship

Funds to support post-secondary education

Allocated up to \$60,000 for first round of scholarships











COLLEGE AND CAREER - ACTION ITEM TWO

Coordinate the development of SJ Promise with the County Office of Education, School Districts, philanthropic partners, and develop a medium-term strategic plan that develops the City's role in SJ Promise and identifies options to develop a micro-scholarship program.

- Developed micro-scholarship pilot with SJ Aspires program
- SJPL Foundation engaged consultant WestEd
- FY19/20:
 - Build pathways from college readiness programs to local
 Promise programs
 - Develop coordination between local Promise programs

COLLEGE AND CAREER - ACTION ITEM THREE

Create closer collaboration with work2future and SJ Works by developing data sharing and program referrals between programs and Departments.

SJ Works 4.0

- 375 Paid Internships
 - 234 recruited from High School career and technical education classes and placed with employers within:
 - Advanced manufacturing
 - Business /Financial Services
 - Construction
 - Health Care and Social Assistance
 - Information and Communications technology
 - 141 with City and Nonprofits
- 627 Older Youth placed in Employer–Paid Job Opportunities

COLLEGE AND CAREER - ACTION ITEM THREE

Create closer collaboration with work2future and SJ Works by developing data sharing and program referrals between programs and Departments.



SJ Works 5.0

- Implement 1,000 Youth Summer Job Placement Opportunities
 - PRNS MGPTF 150 subsidized
 - Work2Future 225 subsidized and 625 unsubsidized
- Connect participants to Library resources
 - partner and link participants to Library pilots (SJ Engage and SJ Aspires)
 - host resume building and interviewing skills workshops

DIGITAL LITERACY - ACTION ITEM ONE

Increase the number of digital devices available to residents through City departments.



FY 18/19 Pilot Activities:

- Tech for Good Project:
 - AT&T's program w/ PRNS
 - 100 digital devices for youth and seniors in high-needs neighborhoods
 - Implementation in FY 19/20
- Mount Pleasant Device Checkout:
 - Pilot laptop checkout machine
 - 12 laptops for SJPL card-holders
 - Free access to wi-fi & MS Office suite
 - Potential expansion in FY 19/20

DIGITAL LITERACY - ACTION ITEM TWO

Continue implementing and expanding the City's Coding 5k Challenge, with a goal of serving 5,000 unduplicated students annually by 2020.



Highlights from FY18/19

- Goal of 5,000 unduplicated students met earlier than projected
- 5,005 total students in FY18/19!
- Pilot partnership with Moreland School District to provide C5K instruction to 400 students.
- 2 full-day summer camps at SJPL
 2018
- Camps expanded to 7 sites in Summer 2019.

- Coding 5K Toolkit
- Expansion of Coding 5K programs to PRNS
- Expansion of school district pilot partnership
- Expansion of summer camp program
- Adult coding programs
- Wonder Workshop coding pilot

DIGITAL LITERACY- FY19/20 WORK PLAN

[NEW] Develop and adopt transparent quality standards, assessment, and reporting expectations for City-operated programs in partnership with school districts.

Create an awareness campaign to better inform residents of the value of digital tools and services, and to promote City led quality programming.

Craft and implement a family and older adult engagement plan to increase digital literacy and comfort in these important demographics.

Develop a City Education Policy:

- Reviewed by NSE in November 2018
- Outreach to 60 community organizations and interviews with key stakeholders
- Incorporation of Early Care and Education priority
- Return for Council Review in Fall 2019

Schools/City Collaborative:

 Initiate new regular meeting schedule and workplan with the Mayor's Office, City Staff, SCCOE and District Superintendents

Joint School/Library Card Initiative:

- Increase K-12 student access to print and electronic resources
- Agreements with Moreland, Mt. Pleasant, San Jose Unified, and Union School Districts
- Issue library cards to every student (total of more than 40,000 children and teens)
- Strengthen relationship between City and school districts
