- I, Wallace S. Gardner, have lived in the same San Jose home for 44+ years. I raised two kids here. I am opposed to the mayors gun insurance proposal
 - 1. Anti-gun activists never quote the total homicide rate.

2013 UN Global Study On Homicide, P68. From 1993 to 2013 the total U.S. homicide rate steadily decreased. Over half the U.S. Homicides were committed WITHOUT a firearm. Graph page 68.

National Institute of Mental Health 2016 report.

Total suicides = 44,965 Suicide by firearm = 22,963 = 51% Suicide by other = 22,002 = 49%

2. Insurance for gun owners. Anti-gun faction compares this to auto insurance.

I am covered for liability for accidental injury or death by either a car or gun. However, if a third party steals my car or my gun neither my car insurance, home owners or, liability insurance will cover victims of that third parties misuse of my car or gun.

Dear Rules Committee Members,

I support the concept of requiring gun owners to maintain insurance to protect victims and the families of people who are injured or killed by fire arms.

The coverage minimums needs be large enough to cover the lifetime care of a person permanently disabled by being shot with a fire arm. It also needs to cover the lifetime loss of income if the person injured cannot work to provide for his/her family (or if the person is killed). Since the victim might be a young child who could live for 30 to 50 years, the insurance coverage would need to be several million dollars per occurrence with no life maximum limit. Anything less will not provide adequate coverage for a worst case scenario.

Insurance coverage should not prevent the victim or the victim's family from suing the gun owner and/or the person who discharged the weapon.
