#### Goals

- Work with the City for the adoption of a policy requiring equitable dispersion of affordable/supportive housing and related services throughout all City Council districts.
- 2. Require the City's reviewers and decision makers to consider the density of affordable/supportive housing as part of the review and approval process to prevent over-concentration.

#### Lesson from History


The concentration of services and facilities for the chronically homeless and the synergy of problem behaviors can overwhelm the carrying capacity of a neighborhood. The term concentration implies that at some point the number of facilities will overwhelm the permanent population. When that carrying capacity is reached, the economic demographics begin to deteriorate and, ultimately, a struggling community emerges.

#### Councilmember Peralez's Memo (from February 2019)

Although Downtown is in the growth boundaries of our Envision San José 2040 General Plan, District 3 residents are starting to feel the oversaturation within their neighborhoods. As shown in the figures, there are still opportunities to ensure that affordable housing is developed more equitably throughout the City, such as exploring that developers be mandated to build onsite if an area lacks affordable housing. The effort to find avenues in every district should be exhausted both through the will of the Councilmembers and through our policies. Continued shortage of affordable housing in certain areas will further segregate our communities, deepen our growing economic inequality, and threaten the cultural livelihood that makes San José the great city that it is.
