SUBJECT: SENATE BILL 1421 - POLICE DEPARTMENT PUBLIC RECORDS ACT REQUESTS AND RESPONSE

BACKGROUND

On September 30, 2018, Governor Jerry Brown signed Senate Bill 1421 (SB-1421) into law. The law took effect on January 1, 2019 and amended Penal Code sections 832.7 and 832.8 to expand the number and type of law enforcement records that are releasable under the California Public Records Act (CPRA). This new law now requires that, notwithstanding any other law, certain peace officer personnel records and records relating to specified incidents, complaints, and investigations involving peace officers be made available to the public upon request.

It has become evident that there may be confusion regarding the types of records that can be released, what records the department has released, how much labor is involved in complying with the new law, and whether the department is committed to releasing the records. This memorandum seeks to clarify any confusion.

Retroactive Incidents:

In the first few days of 2019, the San Jose Police Department (department) received expansive requests for policing incident records that took place before the law was enacted (retroactive incidents). However, the legislation did not mention retroactivity, which caused confusion among law enforcement agencies and the public. Some agencies, including San Jose, chose to deny requests for retroactive incidents pending legal clarification. In short order, numerous lawsuits were filed across the state.

In early April 2019, the California First District Court of Appeal found records for retroactive incidents to be releasable. The department followed this guidance – and continues to follow it today – and contacted the previously denied requestors.

The department developed a plan to address the retroactive incidents. This included establishing internal workflow procedures and identifying incidents over the last 20 years that qualify for release under SB-1421. We developed indexes of these incidents and the involved officers to share with requestors and guide our efforts moving forward. Having completed those tasks over

the spring and summer, the department began releasing records for retroactive incidents in August 2019 and continues to release records on a regular basis.

New Incidents:

In addition to retroactive incidents, 12 more incidents have occurred since the law took effect January 1, 2019. Records for all 12 incidents have been requested under the CPRA. These records cannot be released until criminal enforcement processes (i.e. prosecution) have concluded. Criminal enforcement processes have concluded for four of the 12 incidents. The department released records for one incident in January 2020 and is currently reviewing records for the next incident. The department will continue to release records for both retroactive and new incidents on a regular basis.

Staffing:

Prior to the passage of SB-1421 the department's Research & Development Unit had two Analysts addressing public records requests on a part-time basis. The staffing dedicated to this work was equal to approximately 1.5 Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) employees. In the FY 2019-2020 budget cycle, the City Council approved adding five additional positions to address the anticipated new workload related to the passage of SB-1421: Three Senior Police Data Specialists (one ongoing & two one-time), one Forensic Analyst (ongoing), and one Analyst (one-time). This action added a total of \$657,511 in expenses to the FY 2019-2020 budget, of which \$258,553 were ongoing,

The initial recruiting, selection, and backgrounding process filled the Forensic Analyst and the Analyst positions. However, there were some challenges in recruiting for the Senior Police Data Specialist positions. The initial recruitment failed to locate qualified candidates. A second recruitment received one qualified applicant, who was hired. It seemed the job duties and minimum qualifications for Senior Police Data Specialist were not suited to the position and therefore led to unsuccessful recruitments. In response, we converted the two vacant Senior Police Data Specialist positions to Analyst positions. Our ensuing Analyst recruitment was successful and two candidates are currently in the backgrounding process. In addition, the City Manager's Office recently approved two additional temporary Analyst positions. Recruitment background investigations. As an additional asset, the department is initiating background investigations for employees from the City Manager's Office (CMO) to assist with department public records as needed and appropriate during elevated workloads. In total, once all positions are filled and excluding the CMO employees, the department staffing to address public records act requests represents a one-year General Fund cost of approximately \$950,000.

It is important to note that SB-1421 was the first of three major changes to public records law in the span of a year. While this memorandum specifically addresses SB-1421, the department has also implemented workflow procedures and committed staff hours to complying with AB-748, which took effect July 1, 2019 (publishing video and audio of certain force incidents); and, SB-978, which took effect January 1, 2020 (publishing all department policies, procedures, guidelines, and training materials online).

ANALYSIS

Historically the department has tried to respect the privacy interests of public records requestors by not publishing the details of their requests. While that generally serves the public good, it is clear this practice is causing confusion between individuals who have received records and those who are still waiting. This has left some persons believing that the department is not responding to public records requests when, in fact, the department began releasing records for retroactive incidents in August 2019 and new incidents in January 2020. Therefore, the department issues monthly updates to requestors acknowledging that their requests are still being processed.

Before releasing any SB-1421 records, the department provided informational updates to requesters to keep them apprised of our efforts to comply with the new law and, since the release of records in August, also provided a case processing update These updates included:

- A four step action plan outlining the department's approach to processing SB-1421 requests (Attachment A)
- The index of retroactive incidents that have been requested under SB-1421* (Attachment B)
- The index of officers associated with retroactive incidents* (Attachment C)
- A SB-1421 retroactive case processing status update (Attachment D)

* Requestors only received the portions of these indexes relevant to their individual requests.

To date, the department has released the following SB-1421 records:

- Records for the 12/25/18 Officer Involved Shooting (OIS) incident
- Records for the 09/15/17 OIS incident
- Records for the 02/21/14 OIS incident involving the San Jose State University Police Department
- Records for a Great Bodily Injury (GBI) incident that occurred on 4/08/19
- Records from a GBI incident that occurred on 5/08/19
- All qualifying letters of discipline from officers' personnel files (7)
- Body Worn Video of the three most recent OIS incidents (10/31/19, 11/09/19, 1/04/20)

Understanding the volume of responsive incidents, as well as the time required to compile, review, and release records, requires more information than has been reported or discussed in public forums. Therefore, this memorandum will address: the types of incidents that are responsive to SB-1421 requests, the types of records that must be produced for each of those incidents, the redaction work required by law, the timelines imposed by SB-1421, the labor hours required to perform the work, and steps the department is taking to accelerate our performance.

Types of Incidents:

SB-1421 requires release of records in the following general categories of policing incidents:

- Discharge of a firearm at a person by a peace officer (OIS);
- Use of force by an officer against a person resulting in GBI or death;
- A sustained finding that an officer engaged in sexual assault involving a member of the public; and,
- A sustained finding of dishonesty directly relating to the reporting, investigation, or prosecution of a crime, or directly relating to the reporting of, or investigation of, misconduct by another officer.

With regard to the first two categories, the law requires that we release records for these incidents regardless of whether there is any finding of misconduct on the part of the involved officer. Incidents in which officers use deadly force or cause GBI without misconduct account for the overwhelming majority of the incidents.

The department automated the indexing of use of force incidents that cause GBI in 2017. Therefore, GBI incidents prior to 2017 are difficult to track because there is no way to search by that parameter. Some exceptions include Internal Affairs Unit cases which are retained and cataloged back six years and OIS incidents which are cataloged at the Homicide Unit. Therefore, we were not able to locate all the non-firearm GBI's prior to 2017 without additional search parameters. If a requestor can provide sufficient detail to help us locate such an incident, we will add it to the retroactive index.

Types of Records:

SB-1421 requires that all of the following record types be made available to the public:

"Investigative reports; photographic, audio, and video evidence; transcripts or recordings of interviews; autopsy reports; all materials compiled and presented for review to the district attorney or to any person or body charged with determining whether to file criminal charges against an officer in connection with an incident, or whether the officer's action was consistent with law and agency policy for purposes of discipline or administrative action, or what discipline to impose or corrective action to take; documents setting forth findings or recommended findings; and copies of disciplinary records relating to the incident, including any letters of intent to impose discipline, any documents reflecting modifications of discipline due to the Skelly or grievance process, and letters indicating final imposition of discipline or other documentation reflecting implementation of corrective action."

The full statutory language is included above to illustrate the extensive number of records that must be reviewed and produced for each incident. Most requests include hundreds or thousands of pages of written and photographic records plus varying amounts of video and audio evidence.

Required Redaction Work:

The CPRA and SB-1421 includes the following redaction requirements:

"Personal data or information, such as a home address, telephone number, or identities of family members, other than the names and work-related information of peace officers and custodial officers, to preserve the anonymity of complainants and witnesses, or to protect confidential medical, financial, or other information in which disclosure would cause an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy that clearly outweighs the strong public interest in records about misconduct by peace officers and custodial officers, or where there is a specific, particularized reason to believe that disclosure would pose a significant danger to the physical safety of the peace officer, custodial officer, or others."

Additionally, redactions are authorized where, on the facts of the particular case, the public interest served by nondisclosure clearly outweighs the public interest served by disclosure. Weighing the public interest to make redaction decisions requires careful deliberation. Either releasing too much or too little can expose the City to liability, so we redact methodically, we double check our work, and when necessary, we seek legal advice from the City Attorney's Office.

The department expects this process to become faster as we expand the number of personnel involved and as redaction decisions become more routine.

Statutory Timelines to Release Records:

Generally, the new law requires that public records under SB-1421 become disclosable within 60 days of the qualifying police incident. Delays are authorized for records relating to an open investigation or court proceeding, subject to certain limitations. In practice, this means that for incidents in which a criminal enforcement process (i.e. prosecution) is still in progress, the records are not yet eligible for public disclosure. Once the criminal enforcement process concludes, the records become releasable.

The responsive incidents that have occurred since the law was enacted January 1, 2019 are overwhelmingly still under prosecution or consideration for prosecution by the District Attorney. As previously mentioned, only four of the 12 incidents that have occurred since January 1, 2019 are releasable. Records from one of the four incidents have been released. Staff are working on the next incident. As these records become releasable, staff will prioritize their production to meet the 60-day disclosure timeline.

The department has identified 170 retroactive incidents. Of these, 164 were already 60 days past the qualifying police incident the day the law took effect. Not only was there no mention of retroactivity in the law, but there was no accommodation included for how to respond when decades of material suddenly became overdue at once.

The department will continue to process retroactive incidents while prioritizing the newly occurring incidents as they complete their criminal enforcement processes.

Time Needed to Process Records:

The department conducted an estimate of processing time based on the first incident for which records were produced. We anticipate that the process will become more efficient and therefore faster over time. We also intend to identify new redaction technology or services and fill personnel vacancies to expedite our overall processing time. It is important to recognize that this is an initial estimate, based on one incident. The department will repeat this analysis after a sufficient number of incidents have been processed to provide a more accurate estimate.

The following table depicts the hours of labor required to process our first retroactive incident (the OIS on 12/25/18). It does not include the Internal Affairs (IA) records. The IA investigation is still underway for this incident and those records do not yet exist in their completed form.

To process an incident for release, the Public Records Processing Team must perform many steps, including:

- Retrieval of records from storage sites/databases;
- Conversion into redactable software format;
- Initial redactions;
- Quality assurance review of each record;
- Legal review of redactions;
- Corrections as necessary;
- Allow involved officers to view redacted records;
- Upload to software sharing application; and,
- Compose and send messages to each receiving party.

Some factors that may shorten processing time include:

- The first incident involved more crime scenes and subject officers than average.
- Our work pace will improve as we become more proficient and familiar with workflow.
- Some of the GBI incidents that do not involve firearms may be simpler to process.
- Incidents prior to 2016 will not require review of BWC footage as they predate the software.

Some factors that may lengthen processing time include:

- Older incidents require converting antiquated media such as cassettes and VHS.
- Older incidents are more likely to be in hardcopy format and will require more time to convert into soft copy for redaction.
- The number of new incidents that occur and staffing levels will influence how much time is available to process retroactive incidents.

Although this example required 759 hours to process, the department is confident we will reduce the time needed to process each incident over time.

Steps to Improve Processing Times:

The department is taking important steps to accelerate this work. As mentioned previously, the City Council approved five positions in the FY 2019-2020 budget to manage new public records mandates, which increased base staff from 1.5 FTE to 6.5 FTE. Three of the five positions have been hired and two more have been selected and are undergoing pre-employment background investigations. In addition, the City Manager's Office recently approved two additional temporary Analyst positions. Recruitment and selection recently closed, and both candidates are beginning their pre-employment background investigations. We will background and train employees in the City Manager's Office to assist when there is a spike in requests. We have published a *Request for Information* seeking third party vendors, services, or software to accelerate the redaction process.

We continue to explore best practices and process improvements, including surveying several other California cities to understand how they are responding to the law. The department will consider expanding the size of our Public Records Processing Team again next fiscal year as appropriate. However, the Administration will evaluate this potential budget proposal in the context of the overall budget situation and competing funding priorities.

Meanwhile, our staff will continue to release records at regular intervals until the work is done.

CONCLUSION

The public and state legislature have spoken and these expanded public records mandates are now part of the new normal for California policing. Having received no support from the state for these unfunded mandates, agencies are struggling to comply with what amounts to tens of thousands of hours of additional work while not compromising public safety. The department intends to consistently evaluate workflow and implement best practices to create a framework that will satisfy public records requests in this new age. The San Jose Police Department is committed to transparency and complying with SB-1421. The department began regularly releasing records in August 2019 and will continue to release records until all requests have been completed.

Action Plan Message

Example Action Plan – Sent to Requestors in Early June 2019

Ladies & Gentlemen,

Recent and ongoing changes to California's Public Records Act mark this as an extraordinary time for law enforcement agencies in our state. At the San Jose Police Department, we are committed to complying with the Public Records Act, and specifically with this new body of legislation. At the beginning of this year, we received numerous requests for previously confidential peace officer records made public as a result of the passage of Senate Bill 1421 (SB 1421). The requests spanned two decades. The sheer volume and time span of the involved records have been two of the factors which have slowed the release of those records. The purpose of this communiqué is to reaffirm our commitment to identifying and releasing the involved records and to update you on our progress toward that goal.

STEP 1: In accordance with statute, we have acknowledged the receipt of your request and given updates regarding our intended response. You should have received an earlier notice reversing our earlier position and expressing the SJPD's intent to honor requests for records and information relating to police officer conduct occurring prior to January 1, 2019 that are subject to disclosure under SB 1421. We will continue to send you regular updates. This letter is in addition to your regular updates which we will continue to send in compliance with statute.

STEP 2: The Research & Development Unit (R&D) is the unit within the SJPD that is responsible for releasing records to the public. As the Commander of R&D, I am leading the effort to identify the events which qualify for public disclosure and for which we still retain records. My staff is currently vetting a list of records that qualify for release pursuant to SB 1421 to ensure it is accurate. I anticipate being able to release the portions of the list which are relevant to your request during the week of June 17th.

STEP 3: Our next step will be to identify what records exist for each qualifying event. We will share that information once it has been gathered and verified. We will also correspond with each requestor to see if their request can be focused more closely to identify the records that are responsive to their request.

STEP 4: These records were previously ineligible for release so their collection, preparation, and release is a new task for the SJPD. As such, we are establishing new working protocols and hiring additional personnel. I anticipate that these protocols and personnel will be in place about the time that step three is complete. We will process and release the records on a rolling basis as they become available in the most expeditious order we can devise.

<u>A Special Note Regarding Body Worn Video</u>: Critical policing incidents tend to amass tens or hundreds of hours of video. Of that, there may only be a few moments which capture the precipitous event. Because those few moments are highly relevant to the public interest, we intend to process and release those portions of video before addressing the more routine footage. Individual requestors will be afforded the opportunity to narrow the scope of their video requests if our initial offering satisfies their request.

A Status Update regarding the Processing of Records Responsive to the California Public Records Act in Conformance with SB-1421.

CPRA Releases Related to Retroactive SB-1421 Requests

Historically the San Jose Police Department has tried to respect the privacy interests of public records requestors by not disclosing the content or status of their requests with others. While that generally serves the public good, we realize (based on recent communications) that this practice is causing a great deal of confusion between individuals who have had their requests answered and those who are still waiting for their request to be processed. This has left some persons believing that the Department is not responding to public records requests at all. We apologize for that misunderstanding and would like to take this opportunity to clarify the true status of the project.

Previous updates included an index of cases and personnel, and an explanation of our action plan. This update describes the progress that has been made to date, an explanation of how we have ordered incidents for processing, and an overview of our ongoing efforts to accelerate processing and release times.

On January 1, 2019 Penal Code section 832.7 was amended by Senate Bill No. 1421. The amendment expanded the number and type of law enforcement records that are releasable in response to the California Public Records Act (CPRA). The requests received in early 2019 were for records created in the twenty years prior. The large breadth and volume of records made these requests complex and labor intensive to identify and process. As such, the department has been providing each requestor monthly updates while we identified the responsive cases, located the records, developed working procedures, hired additional personnel, and then began processing/releasing records. The Department is now actively releasing records twice a month.

Since we simply can't process all the material simultaneously, we recognize that some requestors are beginning to receive records while others have not yet received any. The Department wants to assure you that the records are either being processed or retained for processing. No existing record will be purged or destroyed prior to being provided to the requestor. The Department is sensitive to the traumatic experiences these records represent and we want you know that even if you have not yet received your records, we are indeed releasing records and we will keep doing so until this work is complete.

We describe the records from prior to 2019 as retroactive records, which are static in number, unlike records for events that have occurred since the passage of SB-1421. The Department has received two distinct types of retroactive requests for records. The simpler requests were for "records from personnel folders" only. Since we retain personnel folders in a centralized location we were able to check these requests with relative ease. Many requests were closed because there were no qualifying documents in the officers' personnel folders. Some requests were closed when the requestors stopped answering our communications. When responsive records were discovered we closed those requests by sending the records to the requestor. We continue to receive these types of requests and are processing them in the order they are received.

The more common request that we have received is for "all records" associated to an event that meets the definitions in SB-1421. "All records" include, but are not necessarily limited to: offense reports, investigative documents, photographs, video footage, audio files, administrative investigations, and related personnel records. Depending on the record age and type, these can be housed in a variety of locations. Every record that we have located is being retained for processing and release. In some cases we did not immediately release a personnel folder document that was associated with an "all records" request because we intended to release those with the rest of the associated incident records. In an effort to accelerate the release of records, we recently released those personnel folder documents even though no other portion of the incident was yet available.

Most qualifying incidents include thousands of pages of written and photographic evidence. The steps to process any given case typically include:

- Retrieval of records from storage sites/databases
- Conversion into redactable software format
- Initial redactions
- Quality assurance review of each record
- Legal review of redactions
- Corrections as necessary
- Allow involved officers to view redacted records
- Upload to software sharing application
- Compose and send messages to each receiving party

It generally takes longer to redact a record than to create it and this process amounts to hundreds of labor hours per incident. It can take more time when we encounter older records on antiquated media or that exist only in hardcopy. Processing of retroactive cases also suffer when labor resources are redirected to process new cases. None-the-less we have answered most of the "personnel folder" requests and have completed our first "all records" case. We are nearing completion of the second "all records" case.

164 retroactive "all records" requests remain unanswered and we desperately wish to accelerate our processing times. This fiscal year we more than doubled the number of persons working on public records requests. Next fiscal year we intend to expand the size of our public records team again. The process is becoming more efficient and therefore faster. We also hope to leverage additional technology and/or third party vendors with the goal of speeding our overall processing times.

The Department will continue releasing records twice a month until this work load is complete. The processing order was created based on how frequently each case was requested, with the most frequently requested cases being processed first. Whenever a new case becomes responsive, it will take precedence over the retroactive caseload. There will be some overlap in case processing depending on staff availability and specialized skills (i.e. more than one case may be in process at a given time). To comply with the language in SB-1421, any case that is still a subject of a criminal enforcement matter will be passed over, but we will return to it when the criminal enforcement matter is resolved.

The San Jose Police Department wants to assure you that we are committed to releasing these records. Like most large agencies in California, we are working hard to address what amounts to tens of thousands of hours of additional labor while still performing our public safety obligations. We will not purge these records, we will continue to release records, and we will improve our processing times.
