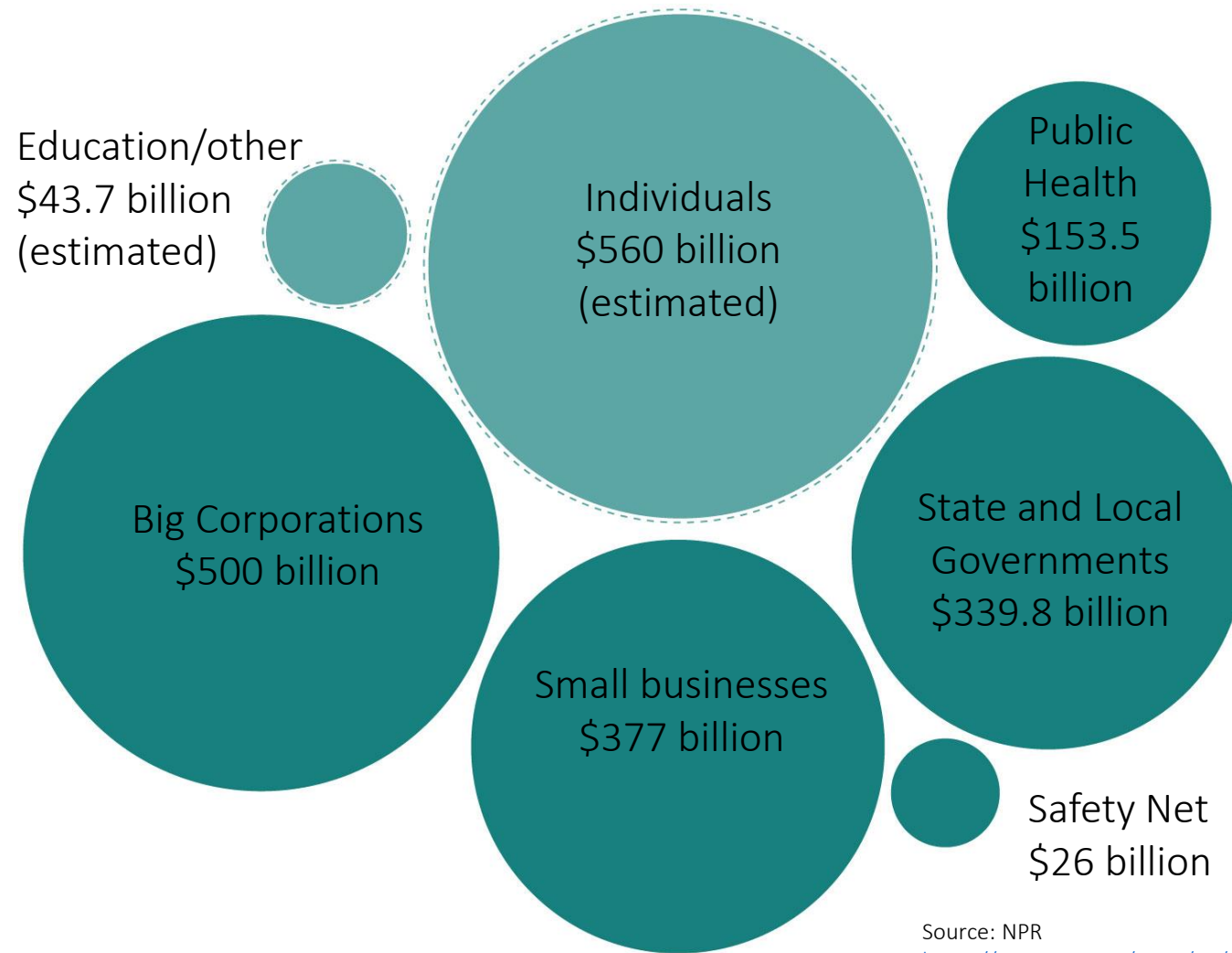


COVID-19 State and Federal Funding

California Resources	Details
SB 89	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Up to \$1 billion• Funds for increasing hospital bed capacity, medical equipment, and local government efforts to prevent spread among homeless.• San Jose Allocation: \$3.9 million
Special Fund for Economic Uncertainties	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• \$1.3 billion.• Funds to secure PPE, medical supplies, hospital surge capacity.• Governor anticipates FEMA to reimburse.

Federal Funding	Amount
1. Supplemental Appropriations	\$8.3 billion
2. Families First Coronavirus Response Act	\$3.4 billion
3. Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act	\$2.2 trillion

CARES Act – City of San Jose Highlights

CARES Act – Overall	City of San José Estimated Allocation
Coronavirus Relief Fund - \$150 Billion to all states and cities with population more than 500,000.	Amount TBD
FAA - \$10 billion for airports throughout the nation	Amount TBD
FEMA – Additional \$45 billion for state, local needs	TBD, depends on reimbursement
HUD – Community Development Block Grants - \$5 billion	At least \$5.26 million, additional funds TBD
HUD – Emergency Solutions Grants - \$4 billion	At least \$2.68 million, additional funds TBD
HUD – Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS - \$65 million	\$209,000
Department of Justice – Byrne Justice Assistance Grants - \$850 million	\$866,000
Economic Stabilization Loans - \$425 billion	Local governments are eligible

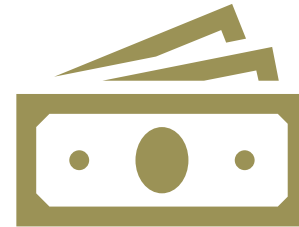
CARES Act – Community Highlights	Details
Direct Assistance	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Subject to income limits• \$1,200 for individual or \$2,400 per couple• +\$500 per child
Unemployment Insurance	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Expands to gig workers, self-employed.• Additional 13 weeks and \$600 per week more
Small Business Assistance Paycheck Protection Program	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Zero-fee loans of up to \$10 million per employer• Defers principle and interest on this loan for up to a year• Forgives up to eight weeks of average payroll and other costs if the business retains its employees and their salary levels
Food	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• \$450 million for Emergency Food Assistance. Second Harvest Food Bank beneficiary.• \$15.5 billion for SNAP
Childcare	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• \$3.5 billion for child care for first responders and health care workers.• Funds will go to CA Department of Education.
