

### Face Covering Orders/Guidance Across Region

JURISDICTION	ORDER/GUIDANCE	ENFORCEMENT
Santa Clara County	<p>Issued expanded guidance, strongly urging individuals to wear face masks or coverings when in public and interacting with others, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- While inside or waiting in line to enter an essential business, like a grocery store or pharmacy</li> <li>- When seeking health care</li> <li>- When waiting for or riding transit</li> <li>- When entering facilities allowed to operate under the shelter-in-place order, like government buildings.</li> </ul>	This has been issued as a guidance .
Alameda County	<p>Generally requiring the public and employees in three main settings to wear face coverings:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- While outside or waiting in line to enter essential businesses; When seeking healthcare; And when waiting to ride on public transportation</li> <li>- Employees, contractors, owners, and volunteers at essential businesses must also wear face coverings when at work</li> <li>- Requires employees to wear face coverings when engaged in infrastructure work and Essential Government Functions where the public is present.</li> </ul>	<p>Violation is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.</p> <p>The order went into effect on Friday, April 17, 2020.</p> <p>A grace period in enforcement until April 22, 2020.</p>
Contra Costa County	<p>Members of the public must wear face coverings when:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Working at an essential business</li> <li>- working or visiting essential businesses, such as grocery stores</li> <li>- visiting a healthcare provider or facility</li> <li>- waiting in line or when utilizing public transportation</li> </ul> <p>Businesses must also take reasonable measures to ensure that customers wear masks and avoid serving those who don't.</p> <p>When exercising outside, members are required to carry face coverings and use them when within six feet of others.</p> <p><b>**Masks with one-way valves do not qualify as face coverings because they can release respiratory droplets into the air**</b></p>	<p>Violation of or failure to comply with this Order is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.</p> <p>Health Order went into effect on Wednesday, April 22.</p>

JURISDICTION	ORDER/GUIDANCE	ENFORCEMENT
Marin County	<p>Everyone asked to wear a face mask when interacting with others not a member of their household. Specifically, when:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- inside public spaces</li> <li>- seeking healthcare</li> <li>- waiting for public transportation</li> <li>- common areas of buildings</li> <li>- employees, especially those working with food</li> <li>- drivers/operators of public transit</li> </ul>	<p>Law enforcement is continuing to inform the public. Incompliance is considered a misdemeanor, punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. Violates could face fines ranging from \$50-\$1,000. The health order went into effect on Wednesday, April 22.</p>
San Francisco City/County	<p>Face covering is required for:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Waiting in line to go inside a store</li> <li>- Shopping at a store</li> <li>- On public transportation (or waiting for it)</li> <li>- In a taxi or rideshare vehicle</li> <li>- Seeking healthcare</li> <li>- Going into facilities allowed to stay open, like government buildings</li> <li>- Working an essential job that interacts with the public</li> </ul> <p>Individuals will not be allowed to go into a business or public transportation if they are not wearing a face covering. Individuals do not need to wear a face covering if they are driving themselves or with others in family. When exercising outdoors, face coverings should be accessible.</p>	<p>Failure to comply with any of the provisions of this Order constitutes a public nuisance, and is punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. Police enforcement began April 22.</p>
San Mateo County	<p>Face mask required for residents and essential employees when</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- inside or waiting outside essential businesses, including grocery stores, businesses engaging with food, hospitals, and ride sharing.</li> <li>- waiting for public transportation</li> <li>- carrying out “essential work”</li> </ul> <p>Do not recommend N95 masks.</p>	<p>Violation is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. The order went into effect Friday, April 17, and enforcement began on Wednesday, April 22.</p>

JURISDICTION	ORDER/GUIDANCE	ENFORCEMENT
City of Cupertino	<p>Emergency order requiring individuals to wear a face mask when leaving their homes and taking part in any essential activity:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- when going to essential businesses or essential appointments, including doctor appointments and pharmacy visits</li> <li>- when grocery shopping</li> <li>- when riding or waiting for public transit</li> </ul> <p>The city of Cupertino distributed masks to small businesses for employee use and incoming customers.</p>	<p>Overall goal of enforcement is to educate residents.</p> <p>Administrative citations are possible: \$100 for first violation, \$200 for second violation, and \$500 for subsequent violations.</p> <p>The order went into effect Friday, April 24.</p>
City of Milpitas	<p>Face masks or cloth face coverings required for employees and customers upon:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Entering essential businesses, including grocery stores, pharmacies, health care facilities, gas stations, and hardware stores.</li> <li>- As well as taking part in public activities</li> </ul> <p>This does not include medical-grade masks.</p>	<p>Prioritizing educating the public before enforcement.</p> <p>However, code enforcement officers can issue citations.</p> <p>Fines starting at \$100 to \$500 for three or more violations.</p> <p>The order went into effect on Friday, April 24</p>
